From Our Hood in the Woods THE MOST HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY AND JOSEPH Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

A very blessed and grace-filled CHRISTMAS SEASON to each of you, your family, and all your loved ones.

AND...*CHRISTMAS IS NOT OVER!!!* Even though you might see some Christmas trees go out on the curb in the very near future...WE ARE JUST BEGINNING THE CHRISTMAS SEASON in our Roman Catholic faith community! And what better way than to focus and align ourselves with the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

Fr. Edward Looney, a priest of the Diocese of Green Bay, Wisconsin writes in his article, *What Does The Holy Family Teach Us*?:

"The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York houses a beautiful triptych of the Holy Family called the "Mérode Altarpiece," painted by Robert Campin. The left of the three-paneled piece of art captures an open door of two bystanders peering into the main panel of the Annunciation, while the far-right panel depicts St. Joseph in his carpentry shop. This artistic masterpiece captures who the Christian is as they examine the life of the Holy Family and the extraordinary events surrounding their life and calling from God. Catching a glimpse of that home in Nazareth, where the Christ Child grew in age and wisdom into his adult years, we experience how the Holy Family informs family life in the third millennium. In the biblical stories of Jesus, Mary and Joseph we see their example of virtuous living."

As Fr. Looney states, this artistic masterpiece captures who we are called to be as disciples of Christ, as we examine the life of the Holy Family by considering our own family relationships and dynamics. And by taking time during this Christmas Season to catch "...a glimpse of that home in Nazareth...we experience how the Holy Family informs family life in the third millennium."

Certainly, there are many challenges today for our families: at the very moment, the continued Covid-19 pandemic hits us in the face with continued masks and social distancing. And, along with the benefits of social media has come the

flip side of social media in which face to face, heart to heart, soul to soul communication is easily replaced with emojis, SMS language, or "text or chat speak." We even find a polarization of political ideologies that has separated many of us to the point that most American families face the tension of these differing views especially at holiday gatherings.

And if this were not enough, of course, there is the horrific phenomenon of the mass shootings of gun violence attacking the very basic concept that "life is sacred." Confusing are students, startling our parents, challenging our school administrations and teachers, and redefining the role of our police; the whole experience has started creating a whole new climate of suspicion, and awareness which students never before had to consider when entering their school lives each day.

And in the midst of it all – we still have family life.

Pope Francis established the Year of the Family on March 19, 2021, the Solemnity of St. Joseph. This marks the fifth anniversary of the publication of his Apostolic Exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia*, which means "The joy of love" and explores the beauty and joy found in family life.

The Year of the Family will conclude on June 26, 2022, on the occasion of the tenth World Meeting of Families in Rome with the Holy Father. *Pope Francis established the Year of the Family to help strengthen faith and live God's joy more fruitfully in family life.*

Each of the readings this weekend tries to help strengthen our faith and teach us how to live God's joy more fruitfully in our family lives: from our first reading of Sirach reminding us that the importance of family begins in "a house raised in justice," (which certainly has been under fire in our own days with how some parents are raising their children), to where Colossians reminds us that "...the peace of Christ must control our hearts"...and "...the word of Christ dwell in us richly..." important aspects of family life.

The Gospel of Luke illustrates the continued struggles of family relationships and commitments, as we see a very challenging moment found in the Holy Family, ultimately sharing that Mary's resolution through her own faith in God and love for her family "kept her pondering and keeping all of these moments within her heart...with Jesus we hear out of respect and going back to live in his family setting "advancing in wisdom and age and favor before God and human beings."

Let us pray for our own family, for other families, for our parish family of OLOW and our Family of Parishes, Downriver #3 (until we have a name!), and for family life in general: may we be inspired and encouraged by the values of the Holy Family in all that we say, live and do.

I close with the Year of the Family Prayer:

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, in you we contemplate the splendor of true love; to you we turn with trust. Holy Family of Nazareth, grant that our families too may be places of communion and prayer, authentic schools of the Gospel and small domestic churches. Make us mindful of the sacredness of the family, and its beauty in God's plan. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, graciously hear our prayer. Amen.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED Question:

I have been away from the Church for a few years and really want to get active again, not so much for me, but for my children. Is this a bad reason to come back to Church?

Answer:

If you are on your way to the supermarket, and you are forced to detour from your usual route because of road work, does the food you buy taste different? Is the meal less filling? Are the vegetables less tasty? Of course not. In our faith journey, there are many detours called sin. Some are greater than others, some are even a bit longer. But God's grace comes to us in ways we understand and recognize and need. Your children leading you back to the Church is not as important as the fact that you are back.

This is an opportunity for you to renew, strengthen, and deepen your faith. Regardless of how we get to Church, or what draws us closer to God, the fact is we are there. Do what you need to do to get right with God and the Church. Go to confession, begin good family religious practices, and be involved in the ministries your parish offers. Be more than a lukewarm parishioner. Be the kind of Catholic you want your children to be.

LIVE THE LITURGY

Merry Christmas! There is something sacred about sun when it dances upon a field of newly iced snow. Lights and colors bounce around in myriad ways flashing prisms of beauty as if in tune with the rhythm of a melodic dance. The Word became flesh and now dwells among us. Humanity can now dance. We sparkle with the beauty and radiance of God and can now walk through life with confidence knowing that we have been divinely kissed. It is a sacred moment, a holy marriage between God and His sons and daughters. All is bright and all is well. Today we celebrate who we are in Christ and rest safely in God's care. God's presence, revealed in the humble birth of His Son, dances in our hearts, calling us to beauty, truth, purpose, and love. Today we know, without doubt, that we are not the product of the rambling offerings of a universe that created itself. We are loved, treasured, and blessed. We have a Savior who can show us the way. Accept him.

Give your Preschool or Kindergarten child the gift of Faith

This year Our Lady of the Woods was blessed with the addition of a Religious Formation Program for preschool and

kindergarten children that faithfully complements our existing Children's Liturgy and Grades 1 through 8 Faith Formation program.

Most preschool and kindergarten children have very little or no ability to read. However the children are able to receive the doctrine message through the use of hands-on models made for small hands. Children journey through the life of Jesus and life in the Church by experiencing Scripture and the Liturgy through the sense of touch that awakens wonder and eventually the realization of the relationship that children already have with God. These little models and sensorial materials are gathered in a prepared environment called the Atrium. This method of religious education has been in use for over 50 years and is known as the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd which is founded on the Montessori method of education. To help foster family support, the children take home a weekly Parents' Guide. It is a brief information sheet in an Encounter, Grow, Witness format that summarizes the presentation(s) the child experienced that day.

This school year Our Lady of the Woods is offering the start of a second session that will begin on Monday, January 10, 2022 through May 2, 2022. Sessions are from 4:30 pm until 6:00 pm. All children, ages 4 and 5, in the Family of Parishes and the Downriver Area are welcomed. WHY DO WE NEED THEM IN OUR PARISH?



Reflections On Scripture

OLD TESTAMENT READING

The prophet Isaiah offered a song of praise in seeing the Lord's return and the salvation of his people. How will you celebrate today the birth of the Messiah?

NEW TESTAMENT READING

The opening prologue of the Letter to the Hebrews is similar in poetic structure and theology to the prologue of the Gospel of John (today's Gospel reading). Both texts place heavy emphasis on the divinity of Jesus. In the birth of Jesus where do you see his divinity present?

GOSPEL READING

"He so loved us that for our sake He was made man in time, through Whom all times were made; was in the world less in years than His servants, though older than the world itself in His eternity; was made man, Who made man; was created of a mother, whom He created; was carried by hands which He formed; nursed at the breasts which He had filled; cried in the manger in wordless infancy, He the Word without Whom all human eloquence is mute (St. Augustine, Sermon 188)."
