

From Our Hood in the Woods EPIPHANY OF THE LORD & NATIONAL MIGRATION WEEK My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I couldn't help but chuckle the other day when this picture showed up on my Facebook feed from a friend:



Not only are the Magi "socially distanced" with the angels falling in behind, but there is a plastic saran wrap curtain between those on the outside of the manger with Mary, Joseph and Jesus behind the plastic inside the manger.

In many ways it can be described as "whimsical," and yet, there certainly is a reality of what we ourselves have experienced in these last two Christmases.

We could very easily excuse ourselves to "socially distance" our lives from the important message this beautiful part of the Christmas narrative known as the Feast of the Epiphany, of the Coming of the Three Magi/Kings/ Astrologers brings. We could also place a certain "saran wrap" between us, the Holy Family and these three Magi in what each of us is challenged to do once we move beyond the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

As Pope Francis once wrote:

"The destiny of every person is symbolized in this journey of the Magi of the East," the Pope said in his Jan. 6 homily of 2014. "Our life is a journey, illuminated by the lights which brighten our way, to find the fullness of truth and of love which we Christians recognize in Jesus, the Light of the World."

With being surrounded by the "pandemic muck" we need this star...desperately...this light to illuminate the fullness of truth with so many confusing voices, and the fullness of

love in a society growing more and more dangerous and violent, even leading to the concern that we will develop a certain moral "numbness" or relational "apathy" toward our other sisters and brothers.

The Magi knew the dynamic of danger and violence in the Christmas story once they entered Jerusalem, and sensed the wicked, insecure, and malevolent ways of King Herod. The words at the end of this part of the Christmas story should not be lost on us in Matthew 2:12: "And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way."

As Sr. Mary M. McGlone, who serves on the congregational leadership team of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet wrote:

As we begin this new year, the Magi might be inviting us too to read the stars, to look for epiphanies of God among us and to allow mystery to shake us out of our status quo and beyond the borders of our comfortable relationships and thought patterns...

Like the Magi, we may not know exactly what we are looking for, but if we set our sights high enough, God will not hesitate to lead us into new epiphanies where we will meet God among us in unexpected and wildly rich ways.

Let us depart 2021 and enter with our hearts through another way into 2022: **to look for** the epiphanies of God amongst us... **to allow** the mystery of God to shake us out of our status quo...**to go beyond** the borders of our comfort zones...**to open ourselves**, as the first reading of Isaiah says today: to the "radiance of God at what we see…with our hearts throbbing and overflowing in the splendor of God…" and in the second reading of Ephesians 3: **to experience** the stewardship of God's grace in the people and situations we come upon in 2022.

I want to wish each of you and your families a very blessed and grace-filled 2022 hopefully in a year that will contain the

much needed peace, joy, hope and love of the Christ-child.

As we enter 2022, I invite you to reflect on the words of St. Teresa of Calcutta: "Do something beautiful for God. Do it with your life. Do it every day. Do it in your own way. But do it!"

And perhaps in following the star that the Magi followed, may we take time to consider:

Will my New Year's resolutions help me grow closer to Christ?

Am I doing something to challenge myself in 2022? What practical steps will I take to meet my goals? Who will hold me accountable for my actions?

May the LORD bless you and keep you! May the LORD let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! May the LORD look upon you kindly and give you peace!

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question:

What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer:

This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: *How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled?* If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).



The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 - January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.


After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded

the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."

Reflections On Scripture OLD TESTAMENT READING

The prophet Isaiah foresaw a time of great joy for Israel when nations and kings would come to Israel praising the Lord. How do you show gratitude to the Lord for the great joys of your life?

NEW TESTAMENT READING

It was revealed to Paul that God intended to save all people (Jews and Gentiles) through his Son, Jesus Christ. Paul tried to convey the significance of this revelation to the Ephesians by using the language of "coheirs" and "copartners." What does this language signal to you?

GOSPEL READING

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.

Amoris Laetitia Family

On March 19, 2021, the Church celebrated the fifth anniversary of the publication of Pope Francis's Apostolic Exhortation Amoris Laetitia, on the beauty and joy of love in the family. On the same day, Pope Francis launched the year, "Amoris Laetitia Family," which will conclude on June 26, 2022, during the Tenth World Meeting of Families in Rome.

Family Love: Vocation and Path to Holiness is the official prayer for the Tenth World Meeting of Families and can be said in honor of the Amoris Laetitia Family Year. The prayer thanks God for the gift of family and asks God that families would be witnesses to the love of Christ.

I am asking Jason to place it in the bulletin (including the two paragraphs above), and on our social media so we can start praying next weekend and at daily Masses at the end of the prayers of the Faithful.

FAMILY LOVE: VOCATION AND PATH TO HOLINESS
