


THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

From Our Hood in the Woods BAPTISM OF THE LORD

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Today, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. In some parts of our world it ends our liturgical Christmas Season (although other places wait until February 2nd, The Presentation of the Lord in the Temple").

It should remind us that 1) Jesus walked the path of our human journey with us in many ways, including in the moment of baptism, and 2) we should reflect on this very important moment within each of our own lives: its graces and power.

Certainly, most of us who were baptized as babies would not, more than likely, remember this specific occasion. But our Catechism points out a very important moment that each of us needs to take in, study, understand, and appreciate: "1213 Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (vitae spiritualis ianua), 4 and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: "Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word."5

What words need to "jump out" and "shout" <u>AT US</u>? "BASIS OF THE WHOLE CHRISTIAN LIFE"... "GATEWAY TO LIFE IN THE SPIRIT"... "THE DOOR WHICH GIVES ACCESS TO THE OTHER SACRAMENTS"... "FREED FROM SIN"... "REBORN AS CHILDREN OF GOD"... "BECOME MEMBERS OF CHRIST"... "INCORPORATED INTO THE CHURCH... "MADE SHARERS IN HER MISSION"... "THE SACRAMENT OF REGENERATION THROUGH WATER IN THE WORD"...

This understanding of our baptism should help open for us the gospel from Luke today and the other readings when we hear proclaimed:

"After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

And so through each of our own baptisms, based on Jesus' baptism in Luke, each one of us hears from God: "You are my beloved...with you I am well pleased."

Isaiah 42 reinforces this, when we hear in this first reading: "...my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit...I have grasped you by the hand: I formed you, and set you as a covenant of the people...

And in the second reading of Timothy: "He saved us through the bath of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he richly poured out on us through Jesus Christ our savior, so that we might be justified by his grace and become heirs in hope of eternal life."

The other day, after the baptism of one of our babies in the parish, I was invited to the family's home. Through celebrating this baptism and the baby being nurtured and held by so many present, the Vietnamese culture exploded forth with coming together...with the joy of family life...with reverent prayer...with the tangible respect of the priesthood, with phenomenal joy (and a sumptuous feast of delicious food to fully augment the celebration!).

As I pondered the surroundings and the importance of our sacrament of baptism and how it was being manifested, a certain epiphany of the importance of family life shone forth in fostering the sacraments. As I saw the baby being held, shared and carried amidst the celebration, I kept encountering the dynamics and the re-echoing of the sanctity of family life that is often being lost in so many homes and places today.

That is why I invite you to go to the WORLD OF FAMILIES website, where we read:

"On March 19th, 2021, the Church celebrated five years of the publication of the apostolic exhortation, **Amoris Laetitia** on the beauty and joy of love in the family. On that same day, Pope Francis launched the Year "**Amoris Laetitia Family**" which will conclude on June 26th, 2022 on the occasion of the X World Meeting of Families in Rome with the Holy Father.

As an initiative of Pope Francis, the Year "Amoris Laetitia Family" aims to reach EVERY FAMILY AROUND THE WORLD through several spiritual, pastoral and cultural proposals that can be implemented within parishes, dioceses, universities, ecclesial movements and family associations.

The goal is to offer the Church an opportunity for reflection and an in-depth appreciation of the apostolic exhortation, "Amoris Laetitia," in order to concretely experience its richness.

The pandemic experience around the world has highlighted for us the central role of the family AS THE DOMESTIC CHURCH and the importance of COMMUNITY TIES between families. Such ties make the Church an authentic "family of

The family deserves a year of celebrations, so that it can be placed at the center of commitment and care from every pastoral and ecclesial reality."

There are many dangers and struggles for families these days: family life today is extremely vulnerable and faces "compromising" values and confusion on the importance of roots and traditions... it impacts our faith lives, including the grace-filled moments of the sacraments. And the "domestic church" of our families impacts the spiritual life of our parish.


One of the more painful moments in my priesthood is when I find children and young people who do not "want" to serve as acolytes or in other ministries in our parish.

I remember well the times my brother and I served at several Masses; it was considered an honor...a privilege... and even after we were in high school, if there were no altar servers, or only one, we would go and serve. Did we always want to? *NO!* Were we upset at times that our Mass attendance was "rattled" because now it also entailed going up to serve? *YES!* Did we sometimes feel that WE HAD DONE "OUR TIME"... and it was now someone else's "job"? *DEFINITELY!*



ST. HILARY OF POITIERS | JANUARY 13



Born a pagan, St. Hilary (c. 367) studied - c. philosophy and the meaning of life, eventually making his way through the bible. He became a convert and was appointed bishop of Poitiers in 353. Sometimes referred to as the Hammer of the Arians, St. Hilary defended the Nicene Creed against a popular heresy, Arianism. He was exiled to Phrygia for opposing Roman emperor Constantius II, who preferred the heresy which denies Christ's divinity. From Phyrgia St. Hilary fought with his pen, zealously writing against the heresy.

Eventually he was allowed to return to Poitiers, but did so by a circuitous route, preaching

against Arianism all the way. St. Hilary was likely the first writer of hymns in the West, his writings on the Trinity, Psalms and Gospel of Matthew survive today. St. Hilary was created Doctor of the Church, a title given to those who provided important contributions to theology and doctrine, in 1851 by Pope Pius IX.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question:

At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer:

When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers, and this is symbolized by the white garment.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - I HOPE I AM LIKE HIM

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. "One worthier than I is coming," he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God's will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let's examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God's plan?

What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.



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
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
