

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends in Christ:

January 30 to February 5, 2022 Is **Catholic Schools Week.** We recognize the contribution and success of Catholic Schools in providing safe, in-person, quality education and faith formation. It will be a week of school Masses, open houses, and special events for students, teachers, administration, staff, families, parishioners and community. Check out www.wnycatholicschools.org for more information and the Bison Children's Scholarship Fund at bisonfund.com for financial assistance. Annunciation Church



provides tuition assistance to neighboring Catholic Elementary Schools for students whose families are active in our parish.

Wednesday, February 2, 2022 is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord or Candlemas Day commemorating Mary and Joseph coming to the Temple for Mary's purification. She offers two turtle doves. Jesus is presented or consecrated to the Lord like Hannah did with her son Samuel (1 Samuel 1:24-28) during a sanctuary service at Shiloh. Simeon and Anna are inspired at the temple and foresee Jesus as the hope and salvation of Israel (Luke 2:25-38). Simeon's prayer becomes Compline, Night Prayer, in the Liturgy of the Hours. "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory for your people Israel." Candles will be blessed during the 9 AM Mass. Wednesday, 2/2/2022 is also World Day for Consecrated Life. According to St. Pope John Paul II, its purpose is "to help the entire Church to esteem ever more greatly the witness of those persons who have chosen to follow Christ by means of the practice of the evangelical counsels" as well as "to be a suitable occasion for consecrated persons to renew their commitment and rekindle the fervor which should inspire their offering themselves to the Lord." Many people are living consecrated lives without knowing the name and without recognition. They offer their day, its joys, sorrows and sacrifices, to God and pray for God's grace and strength to sustain them.

Thursday, February 3, 2022 is the **feast of Saint Blaise**, Bishop and Martyr, early in the 4th century. He is associated with healing of ailments of the throat. Throats will be blessed during morning Mass. "**Blessing of Throats**" is a sacramental. According to the Catechism of the Church sacramentals do not confer the grace of the Holy Spirit in the way that the sacraments do, but by the Church's prayer, they prepare one to receive grace and dispose a person to cooperate with it. For the faithful, Sacraments and sacramentals sanctify almost every event of their lives with the divine grace which flows from the Paschal mystery of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of

Christ. From this source all Sacraments and sacramentals draw their power. Blessing of throats and prayers for healing are appropriate at this time of care and concern.

FIRST CORINTHIANS AND THE STEWARDSHIP OF SOCIAL MEDIA

"Love is patient, love is kind ..." As familiar as these words are, they never seem to stray into the territory of becoming trite or silly. At their core they communicate a truth about us and about our Creator that never fails to inspire.

But despite the fact that you've probably heard it at many weddings over time, First Corinthians isn't just for newlyweds. It wasn't written for married folks. It's for every single one of us, in every state of life and every social situation, in every country and culture and language across the globe.

Which means that First Corinthians is even for the online world. It's for Facebook and Twitter and Instagram and all the other platforms I'm forgetting (there seems to be a new one every day, doesn't there?).

A sense of division — whether rooted in politics, culture or anything else — is growing in our world, and it's never more obvious than when we observe interactions online. It is far easier, after all, to remember what love is when a human being of flesh and blood stands before us. When all we see is an avatar or a profile picture on a screen — especially accompanied by an opinion with which we vehemently disagree — even the most loving Christians can throw First Corinthians out the window.

As everyday stewards we know that we are charged to be not only gracious but grateful. We receive others but we also give thanks for what they bring to us — even if that's an opportunity to "strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts."

So before the next time you post anything online, I suggest giving First Corinthians a read — and remember, love never fails.

I'VE HEARD PEOPLE CALL JESUS' CONCEPTION BY THE HOLY SPIRIT BEING "IMMACULATELY CONCEIVED." IS THAT WHAT THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION IS?

While these two events are often confused, they are not the same thing. We celebrated the conception of Jesus on March 25th, the feast of the Annunciation. While that was surely miraculous, it isn't what we refer to as the "immaculate conception." The Immaculate Conception is Mary's conception, and we typically celebrate it on December 8th. If the 8th happens to be a Sunday, the Church moves the feast to December 9th. It is a holy day of obligation. Why does the Church consider it so important to celebrate?

Mary's conception is immaculate because she was conceived without original sin. The angel Gabriel acknowledges this when he hails Mary as "full of grace" (Luke 1:28). Scripture scholars identify several theological ideas that confirm this. In the Old Testament, the sacred, pristine Ark of the Covenant held the presence of God. The presence of God is now held within a new "arc" — the womb of Mary. Genesis 3 also prophesies of a woman who would oppose the devil and whose child would crush the devil's head. Christ is the "New Adam." This passage sets up Mary, then, as the "New Eve." Jesus and Mary are the beginnings of a new creation, one we all can participate in through the grace of our baptism. After all, God's love is more "original" than our sin!

NARRATED MASSES

The meaning of the word "liturgy" is "public worship" and it is also sometimes called the work of the people. Under this heading we will find the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. These two parts make up the central prayer of the Catholic Church, the Mass. Our Pastoral Council and Liturgy Committee has asked for a renewal of our understanding of the Mass as a parish. During Ordinary Time in February, Fr. Gene will offer one narrated Mass each weekend, describing the meaning and action of the prayers. The dates and time are as follows: February 5 at 5 PM, February 13 at 8 AM, February 20 at 11 AM and February 27 at 5 PM. Through this narrated Mass we hope to impart a deeper understanding of our relationship to each other and with the Divine.






