


And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart.

Learn about becoming Catholic



Each year at the Easter Vigil mass, parishes welcome new members into the Catholic Church through a process of education, faith sharing, and rituals known as the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA). The process is designed for those adults and children over the age of seven who are:

- not baptized
- baptized in another tradition
- baptized Catholic, but with no further religious training or reception of the sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation

It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails ...

1 Corinthians 4-8

By teaching that marriage between two baptized persons is a sacrament, the church is saying that the couple's relationship expresses in a unique way the unbreakable bond of love between Christ and his people. Like the other six sacraments, marriage is a sign or symbol that reveals the Lord Jesus and through which his divine life and love are communicated. The sacraments were instituted by Christ and were entrusted to the Church to be celebrated in faith within and for the community of believers. The rituals and prayers by which a sacrament is celebrated serve to express visibly what God is doing invisibly. For this sacrament, the

Church requires that a couple make their unions public, so to speak. They stand before their faith community (a priest and at least two witnesses) and publicly exchange their vows. The church says that the significance of what couple is doing is a public matter – becoming a newly formed family with responsibilities and privileges the civil and the religious community. Civil society recognizes the new social unit of a family, and the Church recognizes a new social unity within the parish and a new public witness to Jesus' love for his Church (cf. CCC 1656).

Students participate in weekly mass, daily prayer and seasonal opportunities for reception of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.



The Nativity of the Lord

Is 52:7-10 | Heb 1:1-6 | Jn 1:1-18

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The day we have been awaiting has arrived: Christ is born! All of our Christmas preparations - wrapping gifts and preparing holiday meals to be shared among family and friends - are meant to glorify and reflect God's own work for and in us. That is, God's greatest gift of himself, clothed in mortal flesh, who would one day offer himself as the bread of life: "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." Jesus came to the world in the form of the most helpless of us all, a newborn infant, so that through him we would be reconciled to the Father, for "to those who did accept him he gave power to become children of God." We celebrate the Incarnation of the Lord, for Christ is our salvation! It is through Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit that we are adopted into God's family and receive the fullness of his grace. The fullness of God's truth is revealed in Jesus Christ. "The Lord has made his salvation known"; "he has spoken to us through the Son." Let us give thanks and rejoice this day!

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Good News of Jesus Christ is not meant to be kept to ourselves. Today's Gospel reading reminds us that John the Baptist testified to the light of Christ before Christ had yet publicly appeared. Sharing the Good News is not optional! Even the earth proclaims the Good News in Isaiah, "announcing salvation, and saying to Zion, 'Your God is King!" Indeed, Christ the King - God in human flesh - has arrived. Just as John was sent before the Lord to proclaim his coming, so are we charged: Sent out to the world to go and announce the Gospel of the Lord, "so that all might believe."

WITNESS How might you go out and proclaim the coming of the Lord? Don't forget: sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ isn't limited just to speaking to others. It includes living as Christ did - feeding the hungry, caring for the sick and the poor, defending the helpless - because we are Christ's body in the world.

Individuals also may contact the Archdiocese of Detroit by visiting protect.aod.org calling the toll-free, 24/7 victim assistance line at 866-343-8055 or by emailing vac@aod.org. There are no time limits or restrictions on individuals wishing to report abuse. Every complaint shared with the Archdiocese of Detroit, regardless of its source or the date of the alleged activity, is reported to civil authorities. No complaints are held back, pre-screened or disregarded.

daughter, Annie, "gets it." She has very good, faith-filled parents. Recently, her mom was putting her to bed for the night and Annie has a pamphlet in her room from the Dominican Sisters of Mary, Mother of the Eucharist in Ann Arbor. She took it out of the recycling about a year ago to look at it and she kept it. Before bed that night, she wanted to look at it and read it with mom. She had many questions.

She and her mom talked about what the Sisters do and how someone becomes a religious sister. Annie mentioned that she wants to see their chapel at the Mother House. Then she and mom prayed their usual bed-time prayers. Annie then said, "Mom, stop praying.... I need to ask Jesus something." And then she prayed, "Jesus, will you make me a sister please?"

Such a great and generous heart in one so young, although her mom says she can't share with her little brother yet (!) but we're all a work in progress!

Last Sunday Annie was at Mass with her parents and a parishioner approached and asked her, "Are you enjoying this Christmas time?" And Annie responded, "Well... it's still Advent." And right she was. This Advent has been as long as it can be, four full weeks this year, but still it goes by so quickly. I always wish it was longer because it's my favorite Season. I never like the rush to Christmas that the stores want to engage us in so they can empty our pockets.

But today, Christmas is here. The Christmas season begins now. Hopefully we have been waiting for more than gifts, lights, music, good food and Santa. Hopefully it's for Christ we have been waiting—waiting to celebrate in a new way something that is not new—the arrival of a Savior, a child, but a King—to use the words of the prophet Isaiah, 800 years before the fulfilment of God's promise that he prophesied, the arrival of the Wonder-Counselor, the God-Hero, the Father Forever, the Prince of Peace. Advent is over and His advent is here.... His coming is a present reality.

We come together today to celebrate this, the second greatest day in our church year, second only to the celebration of Easter. It is a day filled with so many beautiful images and sounds and smells, not only in church but in our homes. It is a day spent with family and friends and often so many good memories and feelings. But it's not just supposed to be that way today and today only. Advent is more than a name for a season—it's an action and a promise. Advent, adventus in Latin, it's an arrival, a coming to. The to is us. Jesus was coming to us. And if He came us to, it wasn't just for one day.

What and Who was to come, has *already* come that first Christmas, has come today as we begin the season of Christmas, will come again to rule over the entire world, and comes to us every day in the minutia of our lives. The question for us to ponder this Christmas season is *what is coming for us in our relationship with Jesus?* There is always the opportunity to allow Jesus to come closer and for us to step closer to Him, so that every day of our lives become a new Christmas celebration.

Why do we like this Christmas season so much? I think we all see the good in it. Even if we have been less engaged in our faith for much of the year than we know we ought to have been, there is something about this time of year that draws us back to church. And I think it's deeper than just "this is the thing we do to make Christmas feel right." If we have really prepared ourselves adequately during Advent, prayed, been to confession, reflected on what this season means, reaffirmed our desire to allow Jesus an even bigger space in our hearts, that maybe hasn't found room for Him in the last year, then it truly will do that—this celebration of Mass will make Christmas feel right. Why would we want to celebrate the coming of the Savior and not invite Him to be a part of the celebration? But beyond that, I would suggest there is more. There is something we all yearn for that we find here, even if we are unaware that we are looking for it and finding it here. The atmosphere at Christmas exudes joy, as we hear so many familiar hymns and Christmas carols, as we hear the readings from scripture recounting the familiar story of Jesus' birth, the sight of the Nativity, the decorated trees and lights, the wreathes, the candles, the wrapped gifts, the flowers decorating the church, the smiling faces of excited kids.

Hopefully we can all remember the Christmases of our childhood and have some good memories that we hold on to. I remember being sick on Christmas day four years in a row! In those days, doctors in the UK could be called upon to do home visits out-of-hours, and I remember my

parents having to do that... poor doctor! Small town, always the same poor Dr. Warner.

But I have good memories too. Even on those Christmases when I was sick—that meant being up through the night on Christmas Eve and getting to hear the Carol Singers who knocked on the door (they took requests too!). And then opening my gifts in the morning—listening to my new Dukes of Hazzard story audio cassette; my roller boots that I couldn't try because it was the first Christmas in years to get snow; my grandfather setting fire to the Christmas pudding (he was supposed toit's what you do to Christmas pudding!); my mom's thousands of mince pies she would bake—they were amazing, but she could never get the tops of the pies to stay on! That was always a funny part of the tradition; the chocolate yule log my dad insisted on, as he didn't like Christmas pudding; "Angel Punk- Rocker," my sister's angel that she made at school as a 6 year old, that sat atop the family tree for decades, and even today, somewhat worse for the wear, still sits on my sister's tree, some 38 years later! The Queen's speech on TV at 3pm; the turkey left-overs grabbed whenever you feel like it later in the evening.

Whatever the details of the good memories you hold on to, it was probably a simpler time in your life, shielded from the responsibilities that come as we age. It was a special time of wonder to enjoy. Our young hearts were free to be filled with a joy and peace that maybe we could not have put into words—but it felt good.

Those feelings, that sense of joy and peace and happiness is something we all still desire as adults, and I think that's why Christmas is such a special time still—why it still conjures-up so much nostalgia and craving to experience that inner peace once more.

Jesus' advent, His coming to us this Christmas, and every day, offers a way to find that peace and that joy, once more. But only if we don't put Him back in the crib after Christmas and fail to take-up the relationship He came to offer us. Every day can be, and should be, a new Christmas day, when we welcome Him into our lives, making room for Him to stay with us. He won't take away our adult responsibilities, but He will make it easier for us to maintain our sense of peace and joy in the midst of the craziness and busyness of the world around us. Merry Christmas!

Words on the Word

Dec. 25, 2022 – To Give or Receive?

Sometimes, given the joy of Christmas, the light can be found in the unlikeliest of places. Industry publications, for example. A trade publication for those in the materials handling and logistics industry, for example, ran an article in the days leading up to Christmas with the headline "Practicing Kindness At Work."

The article, which itself cited a piece in the *Harvard Business Review*, indicated that "recognizing a colleague's accomplishment, offering a compliment or praise can 'help individuals feel more fulfilled, boost their self-esteem, improve their self evaluations, and trigger positive emotions, decades of research have shown."

The brief article went on to quote the authors of the research as observing, "giving compliments actually made people happier than receiving them."

In other words, this study confirms what so many people learned early in life, and which is resoundingly reinforced on Christmas – that it is better to give than to receive.

"Behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people," the angel says to the shepherds in the Midnight Mass gospel passage from St. Luke. "For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord."

And after explaining where the infant can be found, the passage concludes:

"And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying: 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests.""

The joy of Christmas, the joy of Jesus' birth in the world, is profoundly more important than just a so-called "happy" feeling. But, at its heart, the love of Christmas is perfectly expressed in the notion of giving to others.

Christmas Day is here! Gloria in Excelsis Deo!

The Gift that Gives Forever

The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord" (Luke 2:10–11).

The fact of a savior born for us does not bring us immediate festive joy. Our world remains wounded; wars, selfishness, and bitterness linger. Our hearts remain wounded; pain lingers. For a Christian, just as for everyone else, there will be incompleteness, illness, death, senseless hurt, broken dreams, cold, hunger, lonely days of bitterness, and a lifetime of longing.

[God] spoke to us through a son, whom he made heir of all things and through whom he created the universe.

John 1:1-18 or 1:1-5, 9-14

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

The Incarnation does not promise heaven on earth. It promises heaven in heaven. Here on earth, it promises us something else—God's presence in our lives. This presence redeems because knowing that God is with us is what ultimately empowers us to give up bitterness, to forgive, and to move beyond cynicism and bitterness. When God is with us, then pain and happiness are not mutually exclusive, and the agonies and riddles of life do not exclude deep meaning and deep joy.

We need to celebrate Christmas heartily. Maybe we won't feel the same excitement we once felt as children—when we were excited about tinsel, lights, Christmas carols, and special gifts and special food. But something more important is still available, namely the sense that God is with us in our lives, in our joys as well as in our shortcomings.



After my oldest had been on his own for a while, he called one night to tell me he had discovered he could not sit down to a nice meal without saying Grace. He

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
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
