Getting More than You Bargained For:

A couple of weekends ago, we had our 2nd Annual Kickoff to Summer Event. It was a grand celebration, and I

loved seeing so many younger families on campus. Thankfully, the weather cooperated, except for the wind (which was a significant factor in the purpose of this story).

I enjoyed seeing many of our parishioners and their grandchildren together. But one grandparent certainly got more than she paid for on this particular Sunday! This specific grandma is well-known in our parish and community. For the sake of this story (of course, I want to give her “some” type of anonymity), her name is Mary Beth. Maybe she and her husband, whose name might be Tommy, might own a famous butcher and meat market in Eastern Market (speaking of Eastern Market, we had some AWESOME chicken and beef kabobs from Ronnie’s Meats in Eastern Market this past weekend for Father’s Day. If you’ve never been there, you need to stop by there and see their incredible selection of meats).

Mary brought her little grandson Gregory to the event. “They” only lasted an hour, but that one little hour created a lifetime of memories, especially one “special” moment at the petting zoo that I’m sure will be the topic of many stories for generations to come.

As the ever-convincing Grandma, Mary tried convincing Gregory to get a tattoo. She stood in line for a long time, hoping that watching the other kids’ excitement would persuade him to get one of these little drawn-on masterpieces. When the time came for him to get his masterful tattoo on his arm, he was VERY reluctant, so Grandma decided to go first. He watched diligently but, in the end, wouldn’t give in. So, poor Grandma walked away, trying to erase the tattoo from her arm. As she walked away, she wondered what all the other kids in line thought about this Grandma getting a tattoo!

After the failed tattoo session, Mary and little Gregory wandered over to the petting zoo. Once again, the petting zoo was a particular hit among the young and old. The rabbits were so cute and soft (we found out from the family who owns the animals that the rabbits they had were all rescue rabbits). Mary and little Gregory spent time petting the rabbits and watching the chickens and goats run around their little pen. Then, they

wandered over to where the cow and goat were isolated. A huge gust of wind blew through as they sat on the curb, watching with great delight at the joy of God’s creatures and just enjoying a bit of grandma and grandson bonding time. At the same time, the cow decided it had to go to the bathroom. Mix wind and urine and visitors nearby, and what do you get? A grandma sprayed with cow urine! UGH! She certainly got more than she bargained for ... but it created a lifetime of memories with little Gregory at her expense!

Farewell to Father Adam: It’s hard to believe that Father Adam will be moving on after only a year at SJA. He may have only been here a year, but he will undoubtedly be remembered for a long time.

Moving on is one of the most challenging aspects of a priest’s life. When you arrive at a parish, you get entrenched in people’s lives pretty quickly as you walk with them in the joys and sorrows of everyday life. We arrive at a parish knowing that one day we will move on, but moving on is always difficult, both for the priest and the people.

As we bid farewell to Father Adam, we thank God for how he enriched our lives in the short year he was among us. He was ever present before and after Masses. He was a stable presence in the morning at the school for drop-off and in the afternoon for pickup. I could hear his laughter in the morning in the school office from down the hall as he joined the morning school office chatter before going to “his” door to greet students. He would randomly show up in classrooms to chat or say hello. He would show up half an hour before confessions simply to catch all the “early birds” so the confession line wouldn’t grow too long. He would drop anything to visit a sick parishioner and was always on call for this or that emergency. He would join in and get in the midst of all the Parish Center lunchtime talk as if he had been here for decades, always bringing a millennial’s perspective to everything we did. He would accept and dish out the banter as fast as anyone else. He was always prepared to lead us in worship. He offered inspiring and insightful homilies, often getting us to think about the meaning of the words in the original language of Sacred Scripture. He could easily participate in the off-the-cuff bantering we would frequently do at the end of Mass. He “sometimes” tried to be the peacemaker between those who claimed it was too cold versus those who thought it was too hot in the office. He would quickly pick up the phone if things were busy and jump right in with stuffing envelopes or doing some random task that needed to be done. He always made sure things were set

up for Mass and coordinated who was going where for the distribution of Holy Communion. If you asked him to do anything or if you needed help, there was never a question or a delay; he just quickly got up and did what was needed.

It’s an exciting time in his life as a priest. On Monday, he will turn 33, but then on Monday, July 1, he begins a new mission as THE spiritual leader and father of St. Anne Parish and School in Warren. He will also become the moderator of the Family of Parishes, which includes St. Faustina, St. Louise de Marillac, St. Mark and St. Mary, Our Lady Queen of Family Parishes, all located in Warren. It’s a significant new chapter for him as he takes on these awesome responsibilities in the name of Christ the Lord.

I can’t help but recall, as I often do for my own prayer, the words of the “stock” homily in the ordination ritual of a priest. They are poignant words filled with so much meaning, and I offer them now to Father Adam as he leaves us. “Impart to everyone the word of God that you yourself have received with joy ... let the holiness of your life be a pleasing fragrance for Christ’s faithful, so that you may build up by word and example that house which is the Church of God. ... You will also exercise in Christ the office of sanctifying; for by your ministry the spiritual sacrifice of the faithful will be made perfect ... Understand, therefore, what you do, and imitate what you celebrate. Always remember that you have been taken from among the people and appointed on their behalf in those things that pertain to God. Fulfill, therefore, the ministry of Christ the Priest with abiding joy and genuine love. Seek not your own concerns but those of Jesus Christ. Finally, dear son, united with your Bishop and subject to him, fulfill the office of Christ, Head and Shepherd to the best of your ability. Strive to gather the faithful together into one family, so that you may lead them to God the Father, through Christ, and in the Holy Spirit. Keep always before your eyes the example of the Good Shepherd, who did not come to be served but to serve and who came to seek and to save what was lost.”

I know ... we know ... Father Adam will do all these things exceedingly well! Thank you Father Adam! God bless and Godspeed!

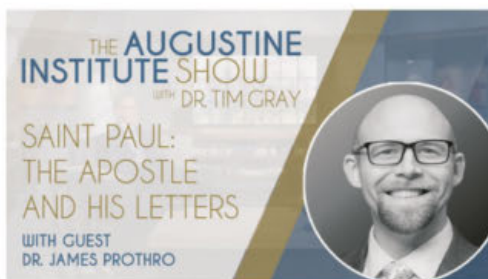

THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME – JUNE 30 B

Reading One – Wis 1:13-15; 2:23-24

God did not make death, nor does he rejoice in the destruction of the living. For he fashioned all things that they might have being; and the creatures of the world are wholesome, and there is not a destructive drug among them nor any domain of the netherworld on earth, for justice is undying. For God formed man to be imperishable; the image of his own nature he made him. But by the envy of the devil, death entered the world, and they who belong to his company experience it.

Responsorial – Ps 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11, 12, 13

R. **I will praise you, Lord, for you have rescued me.**

I will extol you, O LORD, for you drew me clear and did not let my enemies rejoice over me. O LORD, you brought me up from the netherworld; you preserved me from among those going down into the pit.

Reading Two – 2 Cor 8:7, 9, 13-15

Brothers and sisters: As you excel in every respect, in faith, discourse, knowledge, all earnestness, and in the love we have for you, may you excel in this gracious act also.

For you know the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. Not that others should have relief while you are burdened, but that as a matter of equality your abundance at the present time should supply their needs, so that their abundance may also supply your needs, that there may be equality. As it is written: *Whoever had much did not have more, and whoever had little did not have less.*

Gospel – Mk 5:21-43 or 5:21-24, 35b-43

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered around him, and he stayed

close to the sea. One of the synagogue officials, named Jairus, came forward. Seeing him he fell at his feet and pleaded earnestly with him, saying, "My daughter is at the point of death. Please, come lay your hands on her that she may get well and live." He went off with him, and a large crowd followed him and pressed upon him.

There was a woman afflicted with hemorrhages for twelve years. She had suffered greatly at the hands of many doctors and had spent all that she had. Yet she was not helped but only grew worse. She had heard about Jesus and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak. She said, "If I but touch his clothes, I shall be cured." Immediately her flow of blood dried up. She felt in her body that she was healed of her affliction. Jesus, aware at once that power had gone out from him, turned around in the crowd and asked, "Who has touched my clothes?" But his disciples said to Jesus, "You see how the crowd is pressing upon you, and yet you ask, 'Who touched me?'" And he looked around to see who had done it. The woman, realizing what had happened to her, approached in fear and trembling. She fell down before Jesus and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction."

While he was still speaking, people from the synagogue official's house arrived and said, "Your daughter has died; why trouble the teacher any longer?" Disregarding the message that was reported, Jesus said to the synagogue official, "Do not be afraid; just have faith." He did not allow anyone to accompany him inside except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they arrived at the house of the synagogue official, he caught sight of a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. So he went in and said to them, "Why this commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but asleep." And they ridiculed him. Then he put them all out. He took along the child's father and mother and those who were with him and entered the room where the child was. He took the child by the hand and said to her, "*Talitha kum,*" which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise!" The girl, a child of twelve, arose immediately and walked around. At that they were utterly astounded. He gave strict orders that no one should know this and said that she should be given something to eat.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

St. Boniface, an English Benedictine monk who died in the 8th century, wrote in a letter: "In her voyage across the ocean of this world, the Church is like a great ship being pounded by the waves of life's different stresses. Our duty is not to abandon ship but to keep her on her course." Oceans and seas, lakes and rivers, baptism. The role of water in daily life and its use as a metaphor are woven throughout our Scriptures. In today's readings, we hear two references to the sea. First, we have God talking to Job out of a storm, reminding the prophet that he - the Lord - is the one who created the seas and keeps them firmly in their place. The Gospel passage provides us with a stark reminder of that truth. As the disciples and Jesus cross the sea, a storm crops up and threatens to sink their boat. But one command from Jesus and the water is still. St. Boniface had it right. We really all are on that ship with Jesus on its voyage across the ocean of this world, and trusting in him to keep us on course and safe from harm ensures we reach the destinations he intends for us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How to do our part to keep this great ship that is the Church on course? Trust in Christ, trust that he is present within us and guiding us each day. No one is immune from stormy seas, and like the disciples, we can turn to Jesus in times of peril. He asked the disciples: "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" Like the disciples, we must experience the change of heart that is necessary to place complete trust in Jesus to replace our fear and anxiety. God has things under control. Of course, that is what can be so scary sometimes. I know God will take care of everything, but what if I don't like how he does it? What if I want him to answer my prayers one way and he answers them a different way? This is where Jesus might ask me: "Do you not yet have faith?" And I would have to reply, "I'm working on it."

PRAY We are assured throughout Scripture that God loves us, cares for us, and sustains us. But how do we move from knowing that in our heads to feeling it in our hearts? Prayer. If we center our life on Jesus and his commands, trusting in him will become second nature. Take some time this week and pray with today's Psalm (107:23-24, 25-26, 28-29, 30-31), which praises God for his love for us and gives voice to trusting in his providence.

Words on the Word

June 23, 2024 – False Evidence Appearing Real

Fear of heights. Fear of tight spaces. Fear of snakes. Fear of blood. Fear of long words (hippopotomonstrosesquippedaliophobia; it's a thing!).

And fear of spiders. That's a common one, and media outlets had a field day recently when reports surfaced of a new infestation of spiders – joro spiders – headed toward the east coast this year. These aren't just spiders, mind you, but spiders that are 4-inches long. And they fly. And they're venomous. And they lay up to 1,000 eggs at a time.

Oh, my.

One of the more responsible media outlets took the time to put many of the most obvious fears to rest, including, perhaps most importantly, that these spiders, well-known in the south, actually are harmless to human beings. Their bite, for example (when they do bite) is essentially like a mosquito bite.

But it's natural for our fears to get the better of us. And, usually, that fear is largely unwarranted, which is why some folks point out that FEAR is usually the result of False Evidence Appearing Real.

That's not always the case, of course. If one is bobbing in the middle of the ocean and surrounded by sharks, the danger is real.

But the fact remains that there is good news, even about fear, as reported in today's gospel from St. Mark. The disciples are foundering on a boat in a storm and shout out for Jesus.

"He woke up," the gospel says, "rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Quiet! Be still!'"

"Then he asked them, 'Why are you terrified? Do you not have faith?' They were filled with great awe and said to one another, 'Who then is this whom even the wind and sea obey?'"

Bottom line – when we have Jesus in our boat, even our fear can turn to awe.

Every complaint shared with the Archdiocese of Detroit, regardless of its source or the date of the alleged activity, is reported to civil authorities. No complaints are held back, pre-screened or disregarded.

The Perfect Storm

I am writing this on a Saturday morning. Saturdays are my writing days, when my husband takes over the kids and the house and I disappear into the office with an enormous cup of coffee and noise-canceling headphones. Saturdays are sacred — if work can be called sacred.

But Saturday morning is also the only time I'm able to consistently get to confession. Every other time the sacrament is offered in my area during the week, I seem to have unavoidable commitments — but on Saturday morning, all I have is work, and how can I let work come before a sacrament, as much as I might secretly want to?

I've spent a good deal of time being bitter about this, because it's just not convenient, having to carve out time from work to run to the other side of town, especially when I get there and there's a line. I sit there in the sanctuary, waiting my turn, checking the clock, stewing, fretting. Obsessing over forgetting one of my sins. Thinking of how much work I have when I get home.

Saturday mornings: *a perfect storm*, I sometimes call it in my head.

I forge ahead, though. I've never gotten up and dashed back to my desk. I make it into the confessional and I stammer out my pathetic little list and receive absolution. Then I go before the tabernacle to perform my penance.

It's while I am kneeling there that it happens. Always. God awakens, and he cries into the depths of my heart: "Quiet! Be still! Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"

After teaching all day by the shore of the sea, Jesus asks his disciples to remove him from the crowds. He wants to escape the noise, the clamor, the disquiet. But the clamor follows him, because the world is full of it. Storms crop up wherever we go.

Jesus sleeps through the storm, because he understands what the disciples do not: the storms of the world cannot hurt us. They are only so much noise.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

We are considering homeschooling our children. Does this present a problem when it is time for them to receive the sacraments? What must we do?

Answer:

Homeschooling is legal in all fifty states and like other types of education, has its advantages and its drawbacks. There are many factors to consider, and each family has to decide what the best way to educate its children is. With religious education, many dioceses have a formal policy that outlines procedures and expectations, some of which include more than just academic information. Call the religious education office to find out what they are for your area.

In general, though, an appointment with your parish priest to discuss your situation is the best first step. An opportunity to discuss what is available, what the expectations are for each sacrament, and how you can best prepare your child helps make your time of preparation more effective. The priest can direct you to good catechetical materials, parent information classes, and other choices and possibilities for your child. All parents need to be part of their child's religious education, taking a lead in instilling the values and beliefs of their faith. Communication and information helps us all to teach and preach the Gospel as Jesus did.

Bringing Home the Word

Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

June 23, 2024

A Real Force of Nature

Sr. Dianne Bergant, CSA

One of the forces of nature that we have been unable to control is unruly water. We are actually helpless when caught between torrents of rain from above and surging water from below. It is no wonder the ancestors of ancient Israel who lived between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers characterized cosmic evil as tumultuous water that only the great creator-God could control. This is the scene described in the reading from Job. This water is not destroyed; it is only harnessed. We will have to wait for the end of time for such water to be abolished. ("The sea was no more" Revelation 21:1.) This divine

power over water is praised in the psalm response as well.

Belief in God's absolute power over chaotic water and cosmic evil lies behind the story of Jesus calming the sea. This story doesn't simply recount a display of Jesus' extraordinary command over the forces of nature. While certainly that, it is actually much more. It stands to reason that, if only the great creator-God can exercise control over this fearsome watery threat, and if Jesus can effortlessly exercise control over such water, then Jesus is somehow God. In today's Gospel, the audacious disciples, who initially were frightened by the ferocity of the squall, were astounded by Jesus' authority over the storm. They declared, "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?" (Mark 4:41). It is clear from this story that Jesus is the real force of nature.

A Word from Pope Francis

Jesus, begged by the disciples, calms the wind and waves. And he asks them a question, a question which also pertains to us: "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" (v. 40). The disciples were gripped with fear, because they were focused on the waves more than on looking at Jesus.

Turn Off Your Phone and Listen!

I asked the forty college students I'm teaching this semester to observe a public conversation between two other students on campus and to report back about how effective or ineffective their listening skills were. Not surprisingly, most examples of poor communication involved one person punching text messages into a mobile phone while pretending to listen to what the other person was saying.

Is anyone surprised by this? Remember when our parents told us to be mindful of others? Mind full! What is our mind filled with these days when we're talking with someone else? Effective listening means paying attention to the other person. Only when our mind is full of nothing else but what the other person is saying, are we truly being mindful of



them and giving them our undivided attention.

Like all texting-while-driving temptations (our phone should be locked away in the glove compartment before we even put our car in gear!), when it comes

to listening to others, our multitasking endeavors and phone distractions should also be turned off and stowed away so we can give our undivided attention and our full mind to others. No exceptions. Anything less is disrespect!

I can distinctly remember an incident, before the advent of message machines, when I was in my superior's office and his landline phone began to ring. I asked if he was going to answer it. He replied that whoever it was could call back because it was far more important that he pay attention to me. That was mindful listening. And I've never forgotten how respected he made me feel.

Prayer is defined as talking with God, which includes listening. How often do we give our undistracted, un-multi-tasked, mindful attention to God when we pray? †

Many studies have indicated an association between attending religious services and overall happiness/life satisfaction. Also, longitudinal evidence suggests that those attending religious services are subsequently more generous and more engaged in civic activities. Experimental evidence shows that prayer increases forgiveness, gratitude, and trust. Religious service attendance is also linked to decreases in the likelihood of divorce and increases in the probability of lasting marriages, the building of lasting friendships, and the securing of social support. Interestingly, the factor that is most predictive of health benefits is attending religious services, not private spiritual practices, or self-assessed spirituality/religiosity. Specifically, it is the communal aspect of religious practice that is associated with better health outcomes. †
