

## Fr. Eric's Exposé:

### Lenten Parish Mission Information and St. Michael the Archangel

Our Lenten Parish Mission is March 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> and is entitled “Accompanied by the Holy Angels.” It will be led by Fr. John Eudes Brohl, ORC (Order of Canons Regular of the Holy Cross). The flyer has further information, and in particular, information about the schedule for that Saturday and Sunday and the conferences that Fr. John will be giving. As the flyer states, “Opus Sanctorum Angelorum, the Work of the Holy Angels, is an international movement within the Catholic Church faithful to the Magisterium. It is ordered to promoting devotion to the holy Angels and a covenant bond with them through a consecration approved by the Church, so that the holy Angels may lead us more effectively to God. The work is under the overall direction of the Order of Canons Regular of the Holy Cross, under which has also been erected the Confraternity of the Holy Guardian Angels. The Sisters of the Holy Cross is aggregated to the Order and, though autonomous, forms with it one spiritual family.” The schedule for the two days is on page 2 of this bulletin.

**1<sup>st</sup> Sunday of Lent** St. Oscar Romero said, “Aspire not to have more, but to be more.” These powerful words provide the perfect framework for a conversion oriented Lenten experience. God is giving us this Lenten sign to stop being concerned about what you have and focus on who you are. This requires that we create a desert space and listen more attentively for God to reveal His presence. It is all so wonderfully simple on the one hand and so incredibly challenging on the other. The message is simple: love God, neighbor, and self. Those simple words make great sense, but we struggle translating them into reality. Our attachments, compulsions, obsessions, addictions, routines, and busyness all anchor us to the “idol of the self,” keeping us mired in our compulsive need for self-aggrandizement. It’s not about us!

God vowed, long ago, to nurture, sustain and protect the relationship He has with His people. He called us into being, nurtures us in being, and sustains us in being. Without the Loving Divine Presence, all life would cease. Once we slow down a bit and clear away some of the clutter, we can see how the journey of our life is unfolding. We can see what brings us in and out of tune with God’s love and how we can better imitate God’s loving fidelity in our relationship with Him. In short, we will see our myopic short sightedness and figure out how we can better share the Divine Fire within with others. Lent isn’t just about giving stuff up for forty days and indulging again at Easter. We need to push things much farther and wrestle with the question of how we can be more. “Being more” means becoming more fully alive and in touch with the holiness of life and the divinity that lives in and empowers all beings and things. It is realizing that the “quality” of our presence is crucial to being an effective witness and herald of God’s unconditional love.

The illusion we have bought into causes us to believe that the wrong things and systems matter. We tirelessly fight to keep things the way they are, to return to the former ways of doing things or restore some nostalgic fantasy memory of “life in the good old days.” Lent isn’t about maintaining what we have or returning to something that is gone. It’s about becoming something new. It’s about being more focused, centered, convicted, and grounded so that we can be a person who truly loves and treasures being made in the image of God. The secret to Gospel living is not found in accumulating anything for ourselves, even merit points for heaven. Gospel living means learning how to live with less so that others can live with more. The thought of permanently giving something up makes us feel uncomfortable. Truth often does.

## Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

Today's Gospel (Mark 1:12-15) begins with Jesus' temptation in the desert for forty days when the devil tempts Jesus to be who he is not. (**Am I ever tempted to be who I am not?**) After John the Baptist is arrested Jesus comes to Galilee to pick up where John left off - proclaiming "the gospel of God". It is the gospel or "good news" of God that both John and Jesus proclaim. Jesus, like John, calls the people to repentance. In both Greek and Hebrew, the word translated as "repent" carries a sense of "turning" or change of heart. It is a time of fulfillment, the time of God's "kingdom" – not a place but a condition of living according to God's will. Through fasting, prayer, and giving, we deepen our relationship with God and our neighbor, which in turn prepares our hearts for the extraordinary joy of Easter. **This Lent, how do I want to change? What can I do this Lent in order to live God's gifts of faith, hope, and charity?** The Lord's Prayer is a summary of our relationship to God and to others. **Which phrase of this prayer speaks to me today?**

There is still time for endurance, time for patience, time for healing,  
time for change. Have you slipped? Rise up. Have you sinned? Cease.

**Do not stand among sinners, but leap aside.** St. Basil the Great

This leads us to Chapter 3 of Pope Francis' Encyclical, ***Fratelli Tutti*** – Vision of an Open World. "All of us, as believers, need to recognize that love takes first place: love must never be put at risk, and the greatest danger lies in failing to love." (92). This love must grow beyond family and nation to include strangers and all people - into a friendship where the worth of every person is acknowledged. The Pope affirms in this chapter that the right to live with dignity cannot be denied to anyone. Rights have no borders, no one can be excluded, regardless of where they were born (121).

Fraternity grows into a universal love that promotes others when human connections are consciously cultivated through education and dialogue. Getting to really know each other helps us defeat the "virus" of "radical individualism".

Based on universal love and recognition of the inherent dignity of every person, we have an obligation to ensure that every person has sufficient opportunities for development. Francis says this requires a "re-envisioning of the social role of property" to ensure each person has what is necessary to live with dignity.

The right to private property, Pope Francis says, "can only be considered a secondary natural right" to the universal destination of all goods", or the idea that God's gift of creation belongs to all. The Encyclical also places emphasis on the issue of foreign debt subject to the principal that it must be paid. It is hoped nonetheless that this does not compromise the growth and subsistence of the poorest countries. (126). **Reflection Question:** In what ways can your local community put human dignity at the center of social and economic life?

**WHY LENT IS THE TIME TO RETURN TO THE  
LORD IN THE SACRAMENTS**

A college friend of mine, no longer a regular Mass attendee, always attends Mass on Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday. He texts me a selfie of his ashes or of himself with his palms, proud to be drawn back to church for a day. In 2020, the hashtag #ashtag flooded social media with selfies of people of all levels of church engagement proudly wearing their signs of repentance. It makes good sense. Human beings interact with the world through their senses and communicate abstract ideas using physical symbols like language and art. It's no wonder people love the earthy, outward symbols of Catholicism and pack churches for ashes and palms.

Catholicism is a distinctively earthy religion. We experience God as a community in what we hear, see, smell, touch, and taste. The sacraments Jesus gave us are outward manifestations of the graces he offers, that we might more fully experience them not just in our souls, but in our bodies.

Our bodies aren't static. We are literally dying away and being reborn each day. For instance, our entire skin regenerates itself every 27 days. Further, every seven to ten years, almost all of the cells in our bodies are replaced with new cells. It's like our bodies slowly echo the words we hear when we receive ashes: "Remember, you are dust and to dust you shall return." In the same way, our souls are not static. No matter how close to or how far from the Lord we may feel, our relationship with him is transforming. Unless we invite the Lord to regenerate his life within us, our souls too will die away.

Lent is a time to actively cultivate the regeneration of our souls. It is a time to join those seeking full communion with the Catholic Church in a process of death to self and resurrection in Christ. A time to let go of the dead parts of ourselves that hold us back from growing and being renewed in Jesus. Lent, an ancient English word for springtime, is about becoming spring like and alive again—just like our constantly regenerating bodies—to hear, see, smell, touch and taste the Lord anew.

This Lent, let your earthly outer and spiritual inner selves be regenerated together. Commit to spiritual transformation and self-abandonment so you might grow anew in Christ. Pray the Litany of Humility, the Prayer for Generosity or Suscipe of St. Ignatius Loyola. Empty your mind of distractions and spend time with the Lord in contemplative prayer. Confirm these intangible graces in your body. Wear ashes. Kneel before the Lord present in the priest in the confessional. Empty your stomach in fasting and your wallet in almsgiving. Keep watch with the Lord in church on Holy Thursday.

And most importantly, savor "the unleavened bread of uprightness and truth," the Most Blessed Sacrament, at Mass. This sacramental living, where your body manifests your soul's rebirth and your soul flourishes from your body's discipline, will regenerate you completely, allowing the Lord Jesus to live anew in you.

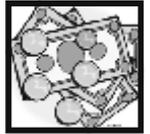


# Spiritual Life Worship
