Fr. Eric's Exposé:

Regarding Gender Theory Part 3

First, I would like to welcome a new parishioner: Barbara Luckett. Welcome to St. Basil Barbara! This is part 3 of 4, continuing the letter from one of my classmates, Fr. Daniel Kogut, a priest in the Lansing Diocese, who wrote a letter on gender theory to parents and to the parish as a whole at St. Mary's in Pickney, MI on Nov. 2, 2019. "We must also remember that to authentically love someone always involves a genuine delight in them, and a very basic acknowledgement of their goodness in the eyes of God; this is still true even if someone is embracing something they shouldn't. These heartbreaking statistics regarding suicide should stir up in us a desire to love and protect those who experience gender dysphoria; to affirm their goodness, and to encourage them in the truth of their identity. We should also be moved with a desire to protect our children from confusion about their own identities. Given the fact that the vast majority of children who express interest in a cross-gender identity will eventually come to embrace their biological identity, we should not be seeking to undermine their biological identity. Most children who experience confusion in this regard can be spared a great deal of confusion and pain if we simply affirm the God-given goodness of their sexual identity. I believe that if we thoughtfully consider what is going on with gender theory, we will reject it, and rightfully so. There are many problems with the gender theory. In the first place, we don't simply determine our own identity by choice. Each one of us was born either as a biological male or a biological female. This is true also of those termed "intersexed", who all still possess either XX or XY chromosomes. Each one of us were created by God as a male or a female, and our bodies are a gift from Him. We should receive the body as such; we should accept ourselves the way we were created. We also ought to be loved and affirmed by others as we have been created. This affirmation is particularly important, because a human being is a body-soul composite. As a body-soul composite, it is impossible to separate my body from myself. It is wrong to suggest that my body is not me. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states the following concerning the matter:

"The human body shares in the dignity of the image of God: it is a human body precisely because it is animated by a spiritual soul, and it is the whole human person that is intended to become, in the body of Christ, a temple of the Holy Spirit, and, as such, we may not despise (our) bodily life. Rather (we) are obliged to regard (the) body as good and to hold it in honor since God has created it and will raise it on the

last day."[xii] *In short, this means that 1) God made you very good, and 2) you includes your body. You, the parent, have a right and a responsibility to teach your children how to love, honor and respect others, including those who are experiencing gender dysphoria. You also have the job of teaching your child the truth of who they are. But the statement that we don't simply determine our own identity by choice applies beyond the biological level. Each one of us receives our own identity through the love and affirmation of others. A child discovers that she is lovable because her parents lavish loving attention upon her. A child knows that God has created him "very good" because his parents delight in him. The affirmation of what God has created is essential to childhood development.*

"Affirmation is not something we do but something we are. The root of the word 'affirmation' is 'firm'. We cannot become our true selves until another person affirms us. We become our true selves when we see our goodness reflected back to us in the eyes of another person who loves us."[xiii] *This affirmation is important to the arena of a child's psychosexual development, without which, a child could face a lot of confusion. For Walt Heyer, a former self-identified "transgender woman", it is important for parents to know the role that affirmation plays in their development. Walt, born a male, struggled with the gender issue for forty years, and spent eight as a self-described "woman" before de-transitioning. As Walt speaks about the moment his gender struggle began at the age of four, he mentions that his grandmother would encourage him in wearing dresses and affirm him in being a girl. Walt states, without qualification, that affirming a boy as being a girl is not truly affirmation; "In the very same moment that you are affirming that person, you are telling them there is something wrong with them. It's not affirming a child. It's causing them to be depressed and anxious about who they are." After forty years of dealing personally with the transgender issue, Walt understands that, "there is absolutely nothing good with affirming someone in a cross-gender identity, because it will destroy their life." I encourage you to learn more by hearing about his story here. [link in the online article] Healthy affirmation is an important aspect of your role as a parent. The way in which a girl is delighted in as a daughter helps to establish her identity as such. The way in which a young man is affirmed as a son helps to establish him as such. This affirmation of the sexual identity of your child is a blessing to them." (to be concluded...) God bless!*

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

Today's Gospel (John 3:14-21) contains one of the most famous passages of the New Testament: **"For God so loves the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life"**. Our salvation or condemnation depends on belief in the name of the Son of God. Belief is not intellectual assent to doctrine, but total surrender and openness to the object of belief (Jesus). Those who believe and live in truth will come to the light. The light of Christ is so much better than the darkness of selfishness and sin. Christ does not force us – we have to come to choose to allow the light of Christ to shine in and through us. **What shadowy areas in me has Christ's light been shining into this Lent? What do my actions reveal about my desire to be changed this Lent? Where do I need God's Light? Which words of Jesus have been most powerful for me?**

We continue Pope Francis's encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*, with Chapter 5: A Better Kind of Politics. This represents one of the most valuable forms of charity because it is placed at the service of the common good (180) and recognizes the importance of people – having a "heart open to the whole world". **"The true worth of the different countries of our world is measured by their ability to think not simply as a country but also as part of the larger human family."** (141)

Pope Francis first considers immigration, explaining that until the conditions which force people to migrate are collectively addressed, nations should have a fundamental openness to welcoming, protecting, promoting and integrating their "neighbor", the migrant or refugee. Immigrants bring new cultures into a society which should be regarded as a gift, and cultural differences should be celebrated, not erased.

Pope Francis describes how, especially in the era of globalization, "Mutual assistance between countries proves enriching for each" (137). This is especially true in addressing poverty in various parts of the world – a gratuitousness based on true concern for the wellbeing of those in other nations.

Pope Francis acknowledges the "innate tension between localization and globalization," but says each has its place. "We need to pay attention to the global so as to avoid narrowness and banality. Yet we also need to look at the local, which keeps our feet on the ground (142)."

The task of politics is to find a solution to all that attacks fundamental human rights, such as social exclusion; the marketing of organs, tissues, weapons and drugs; sexual exploitation; slave labor; terrorism and organized crime. The Pope makes an emphatic appeal to definitively eliminate human trafficking, a "source of shame for humanity", and hunger, which is "criminal" because food is "an inalienable right" (188-189).

We must also give substance to the concept of a "family of nations" working for the common good, the eradication of poverty and the protection of human rights. We must give tireless recourse to "negotiation, mediation and arbitration" – the UN must promote the force of law rather than the law of force (173-175). Borrowing from *Laudato Si*: "politics must not be subject to the economy" and "true statecraft is manifest when, in difficult times, we uphold high principles and think of the long-term common good – centered on the human dignity of all (178).

May the light of Christ shine brightly in us so that all we do may witness the power of God's love.

**CARDINAL'S LENTEN MEDITATION:
JESUS AND HIS BEATITUDES ARE A MODEL TO FOLLOW**

Jesus offers humanity a concrete model for holiness that can be lived each day, said Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, offering the second meditation of Lent for leaders of the Roman Curia and Vatican employees.

"The life Jesus proposes to others is his way of being. The beatitudes are the self-portrait of Jesus. He teaches by what he does," the cardinal said March 5 in the Vatican's Paul VI audience hall.

The pope was not present as he was in Iraq, but the cardinal led the "Hail Mary" with those present "so that Our Lady may protect the pope during this trip."

In his meditation, Cardinal Cantalamessa talked about how the center and focus of the church and of each Christian's life needs to be Jesus Christ.

Jesus "is not a man like all others; he is the man all others must be like," he said. After the ancient Greek philosopher Protagoras declared, "'man is the measure of all things,'" the cardinal said, "now we know which man is the measure of all things. This man -- Jesus."

Jesus offers humanity a model of holiness that is not abstract or philosophical, rather "it is a real holiness, lived out moment by moment in the concrete situations of life," he said.

The beatitudes, in fact, reflect Jesus' life and what he proposes to everyone.

The great surprise and good news of Christ is that he actually offers and gives his holiness, the cardinal said.

"Christianity does not begin with telling people what they have to do to be saved, it begins by telling them what God did to save them with his grace" and the reasons for that grace, he said.

Now is the time for people of faith to really believe what Christ has done, that he is offering his kingdom for everyone, and to then "to appropriate" this grace by living the way God has shown.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the clean in heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
