

Second Sunday of Easter (Divine Mercy Sunday)

What a wonderful joy fills us today as we ponder the inexhaustible mercy of God. "Mercy is the heart of God," Pope Francis tells us. The image of a heart has been used to point to the very life source of a person as it is the organ that allows life to flow through our veins and sustain us. Mercy is the heart of God. Imagine this dynamic, powerful, compassionate, piercing, embracing, loving, propelling, penetrating, absorbing, and enveloping, transforming presence of God flowing into the very depth of our souls. It is God's mercy that allows blood to flow through our veins. It is God's mercy that forms every atom of our being and leads us to what is true. God's mercy reveals all superficiality and falsehood, and lays bare all distortions, empty promises, weakness, and sin.

"Mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instills in us the courage to look to the future with hope," Pope Francis continues. God's all forgiving, compassionate love is with us. When we finally believe and accept that Christ's resurrected transfigured presence resides with us, we then find within us a strong confidence to accept life's imperfections and disappointments and move on. Every day is a new adventure in new life. God leaves the past behind and opens doors to the future. It doesn't matter how many mistakes we made yesterday. All that matters is what we do tomorrow and what we learn along the way. It is so easy to remain tethered and mired in the past, but there is no need to do so. God is all about tomorrow and the work God has yet to do in our lives.

Mercy gives birth to hope. Hope for the greatest of sinners and hope for the worst of disasters. There is nothing God cannot do and nothing God cannot fashion. After all, everything we know and treasure was once nothing, and look what God did with the nothing God had! The resurrected Christ stands before us with nail marks in his wrists and wounds on his body as a testament that not even injustice, suffering and death can trample over and destroy God's mercy. What have we to fear? Why do we keep ourselves from peace? Our lack of faith prevents us from going forward and fully receiving the holiness God desires to breathe upon us. 

Fr. Eric's Exposé: Divine Mercy Sunday and the Shrine of Jesus the Divine Mercy

First, I want to welcome a newly registered family to St. Basil the Great: welcome Mark and Traci Beck and their children Kolhe, Elisha, John, Dominic, Patricia, and Mariella! Today is Divine Mercy Sunday and it is a very meaningful one for the Divine Mercy Center in Clinton Township on Beaconsfield between 14 and 15 Mile Roads. Every now and then I hear confessions and celebrate Mass there as well for them. Archbishop Vigneron has declared the Divine Mercy Center an archdiocesan shrine! Below are some selections from the *Detroit Catholic* article on it:

"On March 26, Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron announced that the Divine Mercy Center in Clinton Township will become an archdiocesan shrine, the Shrine of Jesus The Divine Mercy, in recognition of the center's service as a popular place of pilgrimage and its mission of sharing the mercy of God with the people of southeast Michigan. "With its designation as an archdiocesan shrine, we recognize that the Shrine of Jesus The Divine Mercy will continue its service as a sacred place of pilgrimage, a font of tremendous grace and aid for many of Christ's faithful, and a welcoming reflection of God's enduring mercy to all souls," Archbishop Vigneron said. As an archdiocesan shrine, pilgrims will have the opportunity to gain a plenary indulgence upon visiting the shrine, along with the usual requirements of praying the Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be for the pope's intentions and making a confession within a week of the visit.

The Shrine of Jesus The Divine Mercy, at 33826 Beaconsfield St., Clinton Township, was established in 2006 by the Servants of Jesus of the Divine Mercy and their foundress, Catherine Lanni. St. Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, had a vision of Jesus in 1935 that began the devotion to the image of Divine Mercy following the publication of her diary in 1939. In 2000, St. John Paul II's designation of Divine Mercy Sunday, the Sunday after Easter, popularized the devotion. The shrine today is a place of prayer, reflection, healing and grace, celebrating Mass every Friday at 11 a.m. along with a daily recitation of the rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet, and ample opportunities for confession. Visitors can walk the 13-acre grounds adorned with Stations of the Cross and various statues of saints. Prayer ministers are on site daily to pray with guests, and Eucharistic adoration is available throughout the week. When COVID-19 safety allows, the center also offers free daily lunch for visitors. "We are excited to see the outpouring of Jesus' Divine Mercy upon this community and the fulfillment of God's blessings upon this ministry," Lanni said. "What a blessing it is to continue the work of this ministry, which propagates the mercy of God."

*Lanni established the Servants after her own encounter with the Blessed Mother. She had complications with her first pregnancy, which caused the loss of her son, and she was on her deathbed. Her daughter, Benedetta Morley, executive director of the Shrine of Jesus The Divine Mercy, said her mother promised the Blessed Mother she would serve the Lord if God would spare her life. "The Blessed Mother appeared to her, so she begged for her life, saying, 'I, too, lost my only son,' when Our Lady appeared," Morley told *Detroit Catholic*. "She said, 'Even though it's nothing compared to what you experienced with Our Lord, I pray for you to go to the throne of God and beg for my life so I can at least raise my children.'" Lanni recovered and raised three daughters. In 1992, Lanni said Jesus appeared to her and expressed His desire for Lanni to start a ministry dedicated to His Divine Mercy and healing in the Church. That vision became the Servants of Jesus of The Divine Mercy, a lay association established in 2003. The center opened in 2006. For the past 15 years, the Divine Mercy Center has accepted visitors from all over the archdiocese and beyond who come to pray, experience physical healings, go to confession and seek a place of refuge — including some with nowhere else to turn.*

The Shrine of Jesus The Divine Mercy is also home to the Women of Jesus' Merciful Passion, a women's community with aspirations of becoming a religious order. Also founded by Lanni, the community works at the shrine, praying the Our Lady of Sorrows rosary, the Angelus and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy daily. In addition to completing day-to-day tasks at the shrine, the Women offer prayer ministry and outreach by visiting nursing homes, hospitals and residences. The shrine will be open to the public from 2-4 p.m. on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 11, with Eucharistic adoration, access to the Our Lady of Guadalupe atrium, prayer request box, candle shrine, gift shop, outdoor Stations of the Cross, and the Our Lady of Sorrows rosary garden. Archbishop Vigneron will celebrate a private Mass at the center that day, which will be recorded and available on the shrine's website and social media channels. Morley said the honor is a significant blessing for the visitors to the center, Catholic and non-Catholic alike, just like the announcement of Detroit's other recent shrines. The Shrine of Jesus the Divine Mercy is open Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., and every second Tuesday of the month from 7 to 9 p.m. Mass is celebrated at 11 a.m. on Fridays, with reconciliation available one hour before Mass. Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Easter People,

We are Easter People and “Alleluia” is our song.

As you read the Easter stories of Jesus appearing to the disciples, notice he always greets them with “**Peace be with you.**” What a comforting thought. Jesus does not promise happiness, riches, long or easy life, comfort – Jesus promises us **Peace**. Peace does not mean to be in a place where there is no noise, trouble or hard work. It means to be in the midst of these things and still be calm in your heart.

Inner peace is God’s peace at the core of your being. It is a gift from God. It does not make challenges go away but it allows one to deal with all that is happening from a peaceful center.

We talk a lot about world peace. There really isn’t a lot I can do about that. We will always have the “hot spots” in our world, in our country. What I can do is raise the amount of peace in our world by being at peace myself. **Do I listen to the other and try to understand his/her point of view? If I am having a problem with another, do I pray for that person?** You will be surprised how difficult it is to stay angry with someone when you are praying for them. They may still be “wrong”, acting stupid (in my view), or obnoxious – but praying for someone makes them more human to me. That may be the beginning of a little acceptance and understanding.

The 7th Chapter: *Paths of Renewed Encounter* from Pope Francis’ encyclical, ***Fratelli Tutti*** fits right in with our discussion of **Peace**. Pope Francis underlines the concept that peace is connected to truth, justice and mercy. “Paths of Renewed Encounter” are proactive and aim at forming a society based on service to others and the pursuit of reconciliation and mutual development (227-229). Forgiveness is linked to peace; we must love everyone, without exception, but loving an oppressor means helping him to change and not allowing him to continue oppressing his neighbor (241-242). Forgiveness does not mean impunity, but rather, justice and remembrance, because to forgive does not mean to forget, but to renounce the destructive power of evil and the desire for revenge. Never forget “horrors” like the Holocaust, the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, persecutions and ethnic massacres – exhorts the Pope. They must be remembered always to keep the flame of collective conscience alive – lest we repeat these catastrophic mistakes. It is also just as important to remember the good. (246-252)

Pope Francis calls for peacemakers to forge new paths of healing and “renewed encounter” in our fractured world. Building peace requires “starting anew from the truth,” or facing the reality of the harm done. There is also an “art of peace” that involves us all, including ordinary people and especially the most vulnerable. Pope Francis develops the Church’s teaching on the irrationality of the “false answers” of the death penalty and war, including the use or threat of nuclear, chemical or biological weapons. In the modern world “we can no longer think of war as a solution, because the risks will probably always be greater than its supposed benefits. It is very difficult nowadays to invoke the rational criteria elaborated in earlier centuries to speak of a “just war”. (258) Likewise, he says the use of the death penalty makes no sense in a world where it is possible to keep society safe without it. He clearly states the Church’s opposition to the use of the death penalty.

The Divine Mercy Message and Devotion



The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And, He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A - Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.

B - Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.

C - Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with trust, the more we can receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.

The message and devotional practices proposed in the *Diary of Saint Faustina* and set forth in this web site and other publications of the Marians of the Immaculate Conception are completely in accordance with the teachings of Church and are firmly rooted in the Gospel message of our Merciful Savior. Properly understood and implemented, they will help us grow as genuine followers of Christ.

Spend time to learn more about the mercy of God, learn to trust in Jesus, and live your life as merciful to others, as Christ is merciful to you.




