Sixth Sunday of Easter “Remain in my love,” and, “I call you friends,” are powerful words that are found in John’s Gospel. Most of us probably have them committed to memory or have at least heard them proclaimed dozens of times. They are words that can easily become trite and quickly glossed over without fully pondering and digesting their profound beauty. When we take the time to immerse ourselves in them, they can radically change our lives and our relationships. They can open up new doors of adventure and hold countless possibilities for meaning. The essence of love and friendship are things that can easily be taken for granted. They have always been there and are a significant part of our lives. Many would say that they could not live without love and friendship, and they put a great deal of care into preserving, deepening and sustaining them. Love and friendship share a mutual relationship with each other that deserves more reflection.

Where does love come from? We can consider relationships that have not succeeded and conclude that they were somehow due to our “failures in love.” In doing so, we assume that human beings are the ones responsible for love, its success and also its failure. While our weakness, emotional composition and sinfulness can easily impact our ability to love, its origin is not human. God is love. God is love’s author and origin. When we love, it is God who loves in and through us. It is because of this divine closeness that Jesus is able to call us friends! It is not because of anything we have done but simply because of who we are. Realizing and contemplating this awesome reality becomes a game changer across the board. It gives us reason to clear the table of anything that can adversely affect the way we love so that we can open the door for its author to shine forth.

Coming upon this truth is what leads folks like St. Francis of Assisi to leave that which is comfortable and worldly and live a radical life. They relate with the love of God that radiates in and through all living things and appreciate their sacredness. It was having an intimate experience of God’s love and friendship that propelled St. Francis and others to embrace simplicity, act nonviolently, pursue humility, love enemies, care for the earth and open up avenues for true justice. Understanding this profound truth will also help us find peaceful solutions to world’s problems, restore relationships with our sisters and brothers, bring the grace of loving stewardship to creation and heal many wounds. Once we begin to see how wonderfully holy all of life really is, we discover joy. We lose our need for fear, develop a fierce fortitude, act prudently and seek justice. There is great power in love because it comes from God. It will never fail. It also enjoys the company of two other friends who are eager to become our friends as well: faith and hope. These are just as important to have and to share.

Fr. Eric's Exposé:

The Purging and Renewal of the Church

I first want to welcome some newly registered parishioners: Alfred and Elizabeth Aguilera and their son Alexander, and Dana and Steven Addis.

Good to have you at St. Basil! The following is from Dr. Ralph Martin from Renewal Ministries in their March 2021 newsletter. He has written many excellent books and was one of my professors at the seminary in Detroit. His words ring true to these times!

"It's hard to say what the situation will be when this newsletter arrives. Those who use violence should be prosecuted no matter what their cause. As I write this, however, an aggressive purge, shaming, and proposed prosecution of all those who in any way questioned the integrity of the recent election or who engaged in peaceful protest concerning it is proceeding with remarkable ruthlessness and boldness. Almost every powerful segment of our society has come together in censoring, cancelling, and intimidating alternate view-points—huge corporations whose products we all use, all the major social media companies, much of professional sports, the dominant entertainment industry, all the mainstream media companies, virtually all the major universities, and now all governmental agencies in both the US and Canada.

People are being fired from their jobs if there is any hint of using freedom of speech or association that those in power now deem as "treasonous." It's hard to believe all this is happening, but it is. I knew we were moving in this direction, but I wasn't expecting the suddenness and comprehensiveness of the totalitarian control being imposed almost overnight. The aggressive support of killing babies in the womb, suffocating religious freedom, denying conscience exemptions for Catholic medical providers, and once again trying to force the Little Sisters of the Poor and other entities like them to provide contraceptive insurance coverage that is against their conscience proceeds apace. Free speech and freedom of religion are under grave and powerful attack, and the wickedness and foolishness of it all is ignored by those who don't want to be confused about the facts—departing from God's ways will be the end of civil society as we know it, and possibly the end of this country. A strange, demonically inspired hysteria is demanding that everyone get on the "right side of history" or be shunted aside or worse. It's what a secular author recently described as "the madness of crowds." Those who continually invoke the magical phrase "follow the science" never do that when it conflicts with their totalitarian, ideological goals. Fr. Michael Scanlan's prophesies that I've commented on in our YouTube Channel speak directly to these tragic outcomes. (You can find my videos on Fr. Scanlan's

prophecies at this link: www.renewalministries.net/prophetic-messages.)

The Sexual Revolution of the 1960s is now barreling towards its illogical and disastrous conclusion, as it now denies biological reality and any significant link between sexuality and the holiness of marriage between a man and a woman, open to the gift of children. This has all happened so fast and with such viciousness that I don't think it can be explained without acknowledging significant involvement by demonic "powers and principalities" (see Eph 6:12). The "nations" are arraying together against Christ and his people (Acts 4:26). The spirit of the antichrist is rising in the world. (Both Peter and I have tried to give some biblical clarity about the spirit of the antichrist in recent videos found on our YouTube channel, at www.youtube.com/renewalministriesrm.)

Many of us are fighting discouragement, depression, sadness, anger, and frustration. The continual suffocating presence of Covid-19 and its escalating variants puts a pall over everything. Many are discouraged that intense prayer and intercession didn't block all this from happening. Many are distressed that many of our bishops didn't and don't speak clearly or give real leadership, and that some bishops are even sympathetic to the powers oppressing us. Many are tempted to doubt the efficacy of prayer or the goodness of God. BUT DON'T! St. Ignatius of Loyola teaches that discouragement is never from the Lord and should always be immediately and aggressively rejected and resisted. If we give in to discouragement, it takes away our faith, our hope, even our love. We need faith, for it overcomes the world and gives us both hope and joy, even now, for the great gift that will be bestowed on us when Christ Jesus appears (1 Pt 1:13). As Scripture says, "Resist the devil and he will flee from you" (Js 4:7). So, let's all join the resistance against the oppression and lies of the evil one! It is absolutely true that God heard all our prayers and valued all our sacrifices and will answer them in a way we weren't anticipating but in a way that will fully satisfy us when we see it unfold. There's nothing happening that isn't happening under the powerful and wise providence of God. He is permitting evil to manifest itself so people can more clearly choose. Are you with Christ or against Him?"

Next week's article will finish this writing from Dr. Ralph Martin, along with a prophetic text from Pope Benedict XVI that Ralph includes in another part of the same newsletter. God bless!

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

We hear a lot about **Love** from John in today's readings. The 2nd reading (1 John 4:7-10) exhorts us to love one another, because love is **of God**. John also says in this letter, "In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he has loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins." **How might I respond to this challenge by my love for others at home, at work, at school or in my community during this coming week?**

Today's Gospel (John 15:9-17) continues with this theme of **Love**. "If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love . . . I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy might be complete. This is my commandment: love one another as I love you." John says later in this Gospel, "It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit." **In what way am I challenged by this commandment to love one another? What do I want the Holy Spirit to help me with this week? How do I "bear fruit"? To whom is Jesus sending me this week?**

There are many stories of love in the lives of the saints. Monday, May 10 is the feast of St. Damien of Moloka'i. Damien was born in Belgium. He was ordained a priest and sent to the Hawaiian Islands. He volunteered to be the chaplain for a leper colony on the remote island of Moloka'i. One morning while giving his homily at Mass, he addressed the people with, "we, lepers". Damien died in 1889 at the age of 49. As Jesus said in today's Gospel, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." Damien did this.

Thursday, May 13 is the traditional feast of Jesus' Ascension. Our Archdiocese celebrates this feast next Sunday, May 16. May 13 is also the feast of Our Lady of Fatima. The Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to three shepherd children in Fatima, Portugal, between May 13 and October 13, 1917. Mary identified herself as Our Lady of the Rosary and stressed the importance of repentance, conversion of heart, and dedication to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, especially through daily recitation of the Rosary. **How can I heed Mary's call to conversion of heart so that this world might be a better place for all?**

Friday, May 14 is the feast of St. Matthias. The Acts of the Apostles tells us that Matthias was chosen after the resurrection to replace Judas (Acts 1:21-26). Peter told the people gathered that they must choose a new apostle: someone who had been with them from the time of Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist until the resurrection; someone who could join the eleven in bearing witness to these events. The lot fell to Matthias. Nothing more is known of his life or apostolic work. **Like Matthias, may we be ready when God calls us to witness to the resurrection.**

"To Love" is not a noun or an adjective. It is a verb that describes our response, as believers, to Jesus. It is in our **actions** that we show - and others observe - our **Love**.

HOW TO GROW IN FAITH DURING THE YEAR OF THE FAMILY

Parents and families have an opportunity and responsibility to grow in discipleship together and share the faith with others.

Excerpt from article written by *Tara Stenger*, Published *April 20, 2021*

I thank God that many families, which are far from considering themselves perfect, live in love, fulfil their calling and keep moving forward, even if they fall many times along the way. The Synod's reflections show us that there is no stereotype of the ideal family, but rather a challenging mosaic made up of many different realities, with all their joys, hopes and problems. [57]

This quote is from Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, "Amoris Laetitia," or "The Joy of Love," which looks specifically at love in the family. He has named this year the "Amoris Laetitia" Year of the Family. Using...the document, we can take some time to reflect on ways for families to grow in faith.

We cannot share the faith with others if we are not nourishing our own relationship with God. Take time to grow in faith as an individual as well as a couple. Look to your parish for resources or ministries. You may want to **participate in a Scripture guild**, **join a small group** or **pray together more as a couple**. Spend time with the Lord to determine where he is asking you to grow personally and in your vocation.

Parents help their children grow as disciples. You can model the faith to your children and help them discover ways to personally live out the faith. Some ways to consider are:

- Pray for your children and pray *with* them as well. Taking their concerns or celebrations to prayer together not only shows them that we can turn to God in all things but will help them be more comfortable praying with others.
- Let your children see you seek the sacraments. Show as well as tell them why the Eucharist is important to you. Go to the sacrament of reconciliation regularly; take your children to the church with you and offer them the opportunity to receive the sacrament if they choose.
- Call on the saints. Pick a patron saint for your family and celebrate their feast day. Find saints that share the interests of your children and call on them (ex/ St. Sebastian for athletes, St. Martha for bakers, Blessed Carlo Acutis for computer programmers, etc.) When you pray together, ask for their intercession as well.
- Use 52 Sundays to help your family build a rhythm of living out the faith in your daily lives...
The witness of a joyful family life rooted in the Gospel can be a spiritual oasis for people in contemporary society. How many have never experienced a family life characterized by warmth, mutual affection, honor, forgiveness, and peace? In order to form healthy Christian families themselves, they need to see what it looks like; they need both teaching and models. I encourage families who are living the Gospel to exercise radical generosity in inviting others to share in your family life, even if you are well aware that it is not perfect. For instance, consider engaging in a ministry or ongoing service project *as a family*, so that others can witness how you relate to one another and how you raise your children. Consider inviting singles, including young people, to attend Mass with your family or to share meals at your home on a regular basis. Consider serving as mentors to newly married couples. When unchurched families—including relatives—come to your home, recognize that even a prayer before meals, or simple words of thanksgiving to God offered by each member of the family, can be a powerful witness to the presence of Christ among you. (Marker 7.3)

As you grow as a family this year, call on the Holy Family with this prayer at the end of *Amoris Laetitia*.

PRAYER TO THE HOLY FAMILY

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, in you we contemplate the splendour of true love; to you we turn with trust.

Holy Family of Nazareth, grant that our families too may be places of communion and prayer, authentic schools of the Gospel and small domestic churches.


Holy Family of Nazareth, may families never again experience violence, rejection and division; may all who have been hurt or scandalized find ready comfort and healing.

Holy Family of Nazareth, make us once more mindful of the sacredness and inviolability of the family, and its beauty in God's plan.
