

“You cannot see the forest for the trees” is a widely known saying that can bring wisdom to our understanding of our journey. Often, our sight becomes limited to what is immediately before us. We lose touch with lessons and experiences from the past and promises and hope for the future. As human beings, we have the privilege of being able to choose things. What I like and don’t like, want, and don’t want can be major preoccupations of our minds and hearts. Our preferences and desires begin to define us more than the simple fact of our being. Who we are matters more than what we are or what we have. If we don’t move beyond the external and superficial stuff to what really is of essence, we risk becoming very unsettled, disorientated, angry, and unhappy. We fail to see the bigger picture of hope and promise that lies ahead and the Divine Presence that has sustained and carried us before.

We like it when the “now” time of our lives satisfy us. Even the people who witnessed Jesus feed the five thousand got confused and distracted. It felt good when thousands of people were able to eat. They wanted to know what they could do to get this to happen again! But Jesus quickly reminds them that this is not the point of this sign. As much as the now time of our lives is of concern, it is not what is ultimately important. We need to learn the difference between being and doing, drawing more strength

from who we are and who God is rather than what is happening around us and the choices we can make. Jesus is the true bread that came down from heaven. Jesus is the very incarnate presence of God who sustains life and assures us that we will not perish. This is not easy to understand and feel. We have to practice being in the presence of ourselves, others, creation, and God. We are brought to a holy place when we encounter the sacredness of being. This is real prayer.

Then, we learn to trust. It is when we cease trusting that we start to become afraid, uncertain, apprehensive, and doubtful, and overly self-concerned. We even start to grumble. God has our back. That is the essential powerful message of the living bread come down from heaven. God, who is alpha is also omega, the beginning and the end, and has everything in between in his care as well. A woman once remarked that her most powerful God moment happened when she and her husband cuddled with their new baby for a time. Without exchanging words and using only the affection communicated through sight and touch, they rested in being with each other. This brought them to the sacred, where they realized that a greater Being was with them. It was real. They knew that they were part of something bigger, intimate, and profound. When we rest in the Living Source of life, we will find that our souls are no longer hungry or thirsty.

In the midst of all of the landscaping work that is being done on the property, without cost to the parish, I want to thank all the people who have been lending a hand! I want to thank Maryann Stencil again as many parishioners (especially new ones) may have no idea she has been tirelessly tending the flower gardens around the church for many years! I also want to thank DeRonne Hardware and Rental at 18561 E 9 Mile Rd., Eastpointe, MI 48021 for lending us multiple machines at no cost (a chainsaw, a wood chipper, a post-hole power auger, and a stump grinder)! Please patronize DeRonne as a thanks to them; also, know it is an extensive hardware store with a knowledgeable staff. A thank you to Daniel for his work and expertise as well.

It was my first time using a wood chipper when Bill, myself, Daniel, and later Jeremy, finished chipping the 19 crab apple trees that were taken down and after 8 hours of it on the 21st, we got through them all (except for some large branches and trunks that the chipper can't handle and which anyone is free to take). I have now learnt how to use a stump grinder and have also discovered my body stays sore longer than it used to! I thank a daily Mass goer, Martin, for helping with this as well. Trees are being planted, after we had a company come out for free to mark where power lines and gas lines are located. Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

“Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you.”

John 6:27

Today's Gospel (John 6:24-35) follows the miraculous feeding of the multitude (John 6:1-15 which was last week's Gospel). That Gospel ended with Jesus, knowing that the crowd wanted to make him a king, withdrew from them. The crowd searches for Jesus and finds him in Capernaum. Jesus states that they are looking for him, not because they saw signs, but because they ate the loaves and were filled. Jesus then makes the statement above.

The crowd then asks Jesus the perennial question, "What can we do to accomplish the works of God?" That is, what must we do to please God? The "work of God" is to have belief in the one sent by God. This is not mere intellectual assent but a complete **reorientation of one's life and a personal relationship with him**. It is much more than a "Sunday thing". Then the people ask for a sign that they may see it and believe in him. Jesus refers to the manna God gave the Israelites when they were wandering in the desert for forty years, which is today's first reading (Exodus 16: 2-4, 12-15). Then Jesus says the encouraging words, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." **How has Jesus nourished my life this week? How might I help feed those hungry for food and for spiritual nourishment?**

Wednesday, August 4 is the feast of St. John Vianney, known as the Cure' of Ars. He became a parish priest assigned to Ars-en-Dombes in France, where he spent the rest of his life. (He died in 1859 at the age of 73.) He was renowned as a confessor where hundreds visited daily. He heard confessions for 12 to 16 hours each day. May we follow his advice to "open my heart so that the word of God may enter it, take root in it, and bear fruit there for eternal life." **How can I listen more attentively for Jesus' voice?**

Prayer

O Great Love, thank you for living and loving in us and through us. May all that we do flow from our deep connection with you and all beings. Help us become a community that vulnerably shares each other's burdens and joys. Listen to our hearts' longings for the healing of our world. (*Please add your own intentions*) Knowing that you are hearing us better than we are speaking, we offer these prayers in all the holy names of God. Amen.

THE FAMILY THROUGH THE EYES OF THE CREATOR

Excerpt from article written by *Timothy O'Malley*, published *July 8, 2021*

Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Love): “The joy of love experienced by families is also the joy of the Church.” Catholics contemplate the family as an agent of divine love in the world. In our homes — no matter how fallen those homes are — the love of Christ is made available to our local parish and the surrounding neighborhood.

The Holy Family

The wisdom of divine love implicit in family life is further made evident in the enfleshment of the Word. Jesus Christ was born and entered a family. Although this family knew the perfect communion of love, they were subject to the shadow side of the fallen world. Jesus was born in an extraordinary manner to a Virgin from Nazareth. Joseph, her betrothed spouse, planned on leaving her in a quiet way. Except through the divine intervention of dream, Joseph would have carried through with his plan.

Their beloved child, Jesus, was born in a feeding trough because there was no room in the inn. Days after his birth, King Herod sought to kill the newborn Savior of the world. Jesus, Mary and Joseph escaped into Egypt to avoid death. They returned years later, savoring the hidden life of Nazareth. Jesus, as sacred tradition tells us, was at the bedside of his father Joseph, comforting his mother as her spouse died. Jesus, the very Word made flesh, lived an ordinary and rather poor existence for most of his life. He was part of a family, the miraculous child of Mary and Joseph. He worked and labored, ate and slept and learned to be a faithful son of Israel from his mother and father. The beauty of the Holy Family is not in some romanticized understanding of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. The true beauty is that God did not shun any dimension of the human condition. Joy and suffering, mundane work and festivals and the love of a child for his parents — God took all this up as an act of love. Thus, our families are to become spaces where the Word can still become flesh here and now. Catholicism is not a religion that asks us to escape this world, to leave behind flesh and blood reality. Once again, no! Instead, it is through the materiality of family life in all its mundane messiness that Jesus came to redeem.

The Domestic Church

And yet, the redemption of the family extends beyond the relationship between mother, father and child to the whole world. The term “domestic church” is not a metaphor for the family. The family has a vocation to share in the communion of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The family is a concrete, tangible manifestation of the Church’s communion in every neighborhood of the world.

The nuptial blessing of the marriage liturgy forms our imagination to see the family as the domestic church. Through the self-giving love of husband and wife, expressed in sexual union, the Church is adorned with precious children. Whether the birth of children happens or not, the family is to form a space in the world marked entirely by adoration of God. Nourished at the eucharistic altar, the family becomes witnesses to the ends of the world of the tender mercy of God.

When the family prays together, welcomes the hungry and homeless into their hearth, seeks forgiveness from those we have wronged and establishes friendships with neighbors, the family performs its identity in the world as the domestic church.

The joy of love experienced by the family is the joy of the church. And it is this joy that we seek to spread to every nook and cranny of the world. It is perhaps families alone that can perfectly fulfill this missionary mandate.
