Pregnancy Aid of Detroit is hosting its annual Cruise for Life on the Detroit River Saturday, August 21, on the Diamond Jack.



Amanda Ross, one of our parishioners, will make her vows before Archbishop Vigneron as a Consecrated Virgin on Saturday, September 25th at 11am at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Detroit. Since there is only one other woman making her vows with Amanda, she is inviting anyone from the parish who wants to come to the ceremony to be present. I will be there to concelebrate the Holy Mass. Also, on Sunday, September 26<sup>th</sup> after the 10:30am Holy Mass, we will have a reception for Amanda in the social hall with some light refreshments. Everyone is welcome to that reception! It is a great blessing to celebrate a Religious Vocation from the parish and we should thank the Lord for it!

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* # 2349 says the following regarding consecrated virginity: "Some profess virginity or consecrated celibacy which enables them to give themselves to God alone with an undivided heart in a remarkable manner." A consecrated virgin (technically the individual is part of the *Ordo Virginum*) is a man or woman who does not belong to a Religious Order, but takes a vow to live as a celibate (Amanda will be "married to Jesus") under the direct care of the bishop of the diocese they live in. They are not nuns but work in the world, provide for themselves, and live alone or with other consecrated virgins. They have given themselves out of love to Our Lord alone.

The "order" of consecrated virgins is very ancient in the Catholic Church. In the early Church women made private vows to belong fully to Christ and vowed not to marry. The early Christian martyrs St. Agatha and St. Lucy are examples of this. They were executed for not wanting to marry Roman citizens because they were already vowed to Jesus Christ, their Bridegroom. These and other women dedicated themselves to works of mercy in their communities.

I encourage you to attend the Holy Mass at the cathedral, where you will see Amanda dressed as for her wedding, since she will be "wedding" Jesus Christ Himself as she publicly vows herself to Him as a celibate for the sake of the kingdom of heaven as a Consecrated Virgin.

## EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

### WWMD?

WWJD bracelets were all the rage about 25 years ago in Christian circles. I've always wondered if a WWMD bracelet might not make just as much sense, and maybe more. What Would Mary Do?

I would argue that Mary was the most exemplary steward who ever lived. Her answer was always "Yes." Yes, Lord, I am Your handmaiden. Yes, I will visit Elizabeth, and help her in the last difficult months of pregnancy. Yes, I will bring my son up in the Mosaic law and present him at the Temple of Jerusalem. Yes, I will give him to the crowds and to public ministry. Yes, I will offer him on this Cross, if it is Your will.

Yes, yes, yes.

Well, I can't be like Mary, we think to ourselves. There's an intimidation factor with the Blessed Mother and Catholics sometimes — one that almost exceeds that of Christ. Perhaps it's because we are in awe of the fact that she was not divine in any way — she was a mere creation, like us — but somehow, she always had the courage to say yes. How could she do it, when we find it so hard?

Well, God certainly lavished on Mary extraordinary graces. Her lack of original sin liberated her to conform her will to God's.

But God is impatient to give us, too, all the graces we need to be a steward in the example of Mary. He's waiting for us simply to ask. Just as in Adam we died, so in Christ — through Mary — we live.

What can we say yes to today, in Mary's example?

## Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

We leave the Gospel of John and the counting of the Sundays in Ordinary time for this week's feast of **The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary**. Today's Gospel (Luke 1:39-56) recounts the story of Mary's visit with her cousin Elizabeth who is pregnant – even though she is beyond normal child-bearing age.

Luke describes the meeting of Elizabeth and Mary: the baby in Elizabeth's womb (John the Baptist) leaps in the womb at hearing Mary's greeting. Elizabeth says to Mary, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. . . . Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." **How open am I to hear God's word to me? Is there enough quiet time in my life for me to hear God speaking to me?**

Mary responded with the beautiful hymn we now call "**The Magnificat**". This canticle (song) is said every evening in the official night prayer of the Church as part of Vespers in the Divine Office. This prayer contains the reversal theme first found in 1 Samuel 2:1-10. "He has looked with favor on the lowly . . . He has mercy on those who fear him. . . . He has scattered the proud in their conceit. . . . He has cast down the mighty from their thrones and lifted up the lowly. . . . He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty." Mary is looking forward to God transforming the world through the Messiah. Mary (and you and I) need to humbly place our confidence and trust in God our Savior. This prayer is a **message of hope**. Mary proclaims that God has "fulfilled the hungry with good things." **What hungers of mine has God satisfied recently? What expectations do I have about earthly rewards for following Jesus? Is this what Mary was talking about? Do I think of God more in term of justice or generosity?**

There are so many issues which need our attention and prayer. Here are some facts I learned from the CBS Sunday Morning Show several weeks ago about the financial inequality in our country. The combined wealth of all households in the U.S. added up to \$129.5 Trillion in the first quarter of 2021. The wealthiest **one per cent** held 32.1% of that wealth – up from 23.4% in 1989. The **bottom half** now holds just **two per cent** of the total household wealth.

**BUILDING A LEGACY OF LOVE**

Excerpt from article written by *Debbie Herbeck and Peter Herbeck*, published *July 22, 2021*

**How do you navigate your role as grandparents as you watch your children begin to raise their own families?** We are extremely proud of all four of our children. Three of the four are married, and we have eight young grandchildren and another on the way. First of all, we try to be as engaged as possible in their lives. We do what many grandparents do to practically support our adult children in their role as parents. Although our schedules are still quite full, we make it a priority to spend weekly time with our young grandkids, to develop personal and individual relationships with each one of them.

It's fun and beautiful to watch our own kids send their young children to us for answers to their budding theological questions like, "Grandpa, what happened to all those people who died before Jesus rose from the dead? Are they still dead?" or, "Grandma, is the devil real?"

**What best practices do you take to maintain strong relationships with your adult children?** When we were raising our own children, we often had regular, daily conversations that centered on the person and reality of Jesus. It helped our kids understand that Jesus is real and that he wants to be in every part of our lives. Now as adults, those conversations still happen, and we are able to help them (and their spouses) navigate the challenges of the culture, the concerns in the church, prayer and growing in faith as adults.

It has been a special pleasure and delight to have our youngest daughter, Rachel, working in ministry with us, and this gives us many opportunities to engage in our evangelistic mission together and to have deeper discussions centered on faith.

Our home always had an open door, with guests coming from all over the world to share in our life. Although our children are grown up, they still bring friends over for dinner, conversation and prayer. We have seen the fruit of this hospitality as they now open their own homes to others.

Overall, the best practice we know is to just be present to them — in their joys and sorrows, to be available to help in practical ways and to ask the Holy Spirit how we can best love each one of them.

**What has life been like having an empty nest?** It has been an adjustment to move from the constant activity and noise of a full house of young people to relative quiet. When our kids all moved out of the house, we thought life would slow down. Although the activities no longer centered on their sports, school and friendships, we had the freedom to respond to more ministry opportunities, to travel, speak and write.

Honestly, we are adjusting to this new phase of life, spending more time together and getting to know one another in new ways. Throughout our married life, Peter always had a home office, but often the demands of daily life with kids would keep us on separate "tracks" throughout the day or week. Now that it is mostly just us at home, we have to be intentional about making sure we have a shared life together and aren't just doing our own thing.

**What have been the best habits you've incorporated into your life to keep your marriage strong?** The best advice we ever received and we give often to engaged and young married couples is to put Jesus at the center of your individual and married life and to keep him there! It has helped us tremendously, even in the face of our weaknesses, failings, challenges and disappointments, to remind each other that Jesus is Lord — over our lives and our marriage. We consistently try to entrust everything to him.

**Anything encouraging you can say to parents who are in the midst of the battle for faith and family?**

Although our children are grown, we realize that our job isn't quite finished. As parents, grandparents and mentors to young people, we see the importance of building a legacy of love and faith that is actively passed on to the next generation and beyond. We do this through intentional conversations and teaching, but we also realize that the witness to God's faithfulness and trustworthiness is often "caught more than taught." Throughout our married life, what we valued most was often communicated in simple ways — family meals together, daily prayer, faithful attendance at Mass, generosity and sacrifice. We didn't often know how it impacted our kids, especially in their teen years...Christ has brought us great joy and a renewed commitment to help the next generation say, as we did, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."




