

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time

If we are truly in love with God, then the basics are not going to be enough. That love is going to want to be expressed in going above and beyond, in leaving the comfortable and familiar, in stretching and growing, and in following a voice other than our own. St. Teresa of Calcutta rightly instructs us that for “love to be real, it must cost, it must hurt, it must empty us of self.” Being in love with God requires more than just checking the boxes of the commandments. It requires a sincere and unconditional self-investment. Desiring God with our whole heart, mind, and soul means that I must also desire a relationship with my neighbor with that same degree of fervor.

Biases and prejudices usually occur when people are kept at a distance and treated as objects. We cannot truly know our neighbors, especially if they are different than us, if we keep them in boxes and do not listen to their stories. When we open ourselves to listen to another person’s story, we begin to realize more how similar we are than dissimilar. Being overly attached to our possessions, ideologies, agendas, lifestyles, and personal needs are absolute barriers to achieving the type of personal investment love demands. This is why following Christ can be difficult. It is less a matter of intellect and more a matter of heart and soul. It requires that we transfer our treasure from an investment in tangible secular things and move it into the Kingdom of God. It is only the gift of wisdom and discernment that can help us decide what to do and how to do it.

Contemporaries of Jesus would know that a camel could not enter through the portal of a city weighed down with the baggage it was carrying. In order to enter, the baggage must be removed so that the animal could fit through the entry way. The same is true for us. We carry a lot of excessive baggage around with us that keeps us tethered to our past histories, wounds, myopic world views, prejudices, fears, and suspicions. To invest ourselves in the Kingdom of God, do God’s work and live out our love relationship with God, we need to shed the extra weight. While it may seem that a lot of that stuff is necessary, it really is not. We are much more than the things that we think define us and more secure than we think. The more there is to hold on to and the more that we carry with us, the harder it will be to leave it all behind. Many choose not to and walk away sad because they are not ready to trust.

Fr. Eric's Exposé:

Prayer of Consecration

I first want to welcome some new parishioners: Laurie and Ken, as well as Rose Poirier. Good to have you at St. Basil! I thank all who helped with the reception for Amanda last Sunday, celebrating the vows she made on Sept. 25th at the Cathedral as a Consecrated Virgin. I mentioned that I would provide some of the prayers from that Mass. After the vows of celibacy are made, the Litany of the Saints is prayed by all and the "prayer of consecration" follows. Archbishop Vigneron prayed this prayer over Amanda and Hanan (the other woman who made her vows). It is an ancient prayer dating from the 6th century that is used for women making the vows of a Consecrated Virgin. After the prayer, the women received a veil and a ring and then promised to pray the Liturgy of the Hours. The following is that ancient prayer of consecration that the Archbishop prayed:

Loving Father, chaste bodies are your temple; you delight in sinless hearts. Our nature was corrupted when the devil deceived our first parents, but you have restored it in Christ. He is your Word, through whom all things were made. He has made out nature whole again, and made it possible for mortal people to reflect the life of angels. Lord, look with favor on your handmaids. They place in your hands their resolve to live in chastity, You inspire them to take this vow; now they give you their hearts. Only you can kindle this flame of love, and feed its brightness, giving strength and perseverance to our will. Without you our flesh is weak, bound by the law of nature, free with false freedom, imprisoned by habit, softened by the spirit of the age. You have poured out your grace upon all peoples. You have adopted as heirs of the new covenant sons and daughters from every nation under heaven, countless as the stars. Your children are born, not of human birth, nor of man's desire, but of your Spirit. Among your many gifts you give to some the grace of virginity. Yet the honor of marriage is in no way lessened. As it was in the beginning, your first blessing still remains upon this holy union. Yet your loving wisdom chooses those who make sacrifice of marriage for the sake of the love of which it is the sign. They renounce the joys of human marriage, but cherish all that it foreshadows. Those who choose chastity have looked upon the face of Christ, its origin and inspiration. They give themselves wholly to Christ, the Son of the ever-virgin Mary, and the heavenly Bridegroom of those who in his honor dedicate themselves to lasting virginity. Lord, protect those who seek your help.

They desire to be strengthened by your blessing and consecration. Defend them from the cunning and deceit of the enemy. Keep them vigilant and on their guard; may nothing tarnish the glory of perfect virginity, or the vocation of purity which is shared by those who are married. Through the gift of your Spirit, Lord, give them modesty with right judgment, kindness with true wisdom, gentleness with strength of character, freedom with the grace of chastity. Give them the warmth of love, to love you above all others. Make their lives deserve our praise, without seeking to be praised. May they give you glory by holiness of action and purity of heart. May they love you and fear you; may they love you and serve you. Be yourself their glory, their joy, their whole desire. Be their comfort in sorrow, their wisdom in perplexity, their protection in the midst of injustice, their patience in adversity, their riches in poverty, their food in fasting, their remedy in time of sickness.

They have chosen you above all things; may they find all things in possessing you. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever."

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

Today's Gospel (Mark 10:17-30) is a challenge for us. A young man asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. He tells Jesus he has followed the Commandments from his youth. Jesus then tells him to "Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, and follow me." We are told that "the young man's face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions." **What riches of mine is Jesus asking me to give up in order to follow him more closely today?**

I would like to go back to the 2nd reading from Sunday, September 12 (James 2: 14-18). "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him?" James goes on to say, "Faith of itself, if it does not have works, is dead." **Am I ready to go the extra mile to help those in need? How concerned and supportive am I toward the immigrant, the poor, the marginalized?** This religion of ours, the call to follow Jesus, is not easy! I often worry: **Am I too comfortable? Am I too set in my ways? Am I willing to go the extra mile?**

Wednesday, October 7 was the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. Mary is a great companion on the journey. May we discover how praying the Rosary "nourishes our faith, which flourishes again by meditation on the sacred mysteries, and raises minds to the truth revealed to us by God." (Pope Pius XI)

Monday, October 11 is the feast of St. John XXIII who was elected pope in 1958. I remember that day so well – I was in high school and we were on a day of retreat. The news came over the loudspeaker and we were all so excited. John XXIII was a visionary pope who called the Vatican II Council into being. He was canonized by Pope Francis in 2014.

To close our discussion on the **Season of Creation**, here is the 2nd prayer Pope Francis gives us in his encyclical letter, *Laudato Si'*. (as promised last week)

A Christian Prayer in Union With Creation:

Father, we praise you with all your creatures. They came forth from your powerful hand; they are yours, filled with your presence and your tender love. **Praise be to you!** Son of God, Jesus, through you all things were made. You were formed in the womb of Mary our Mother, and you became part of this Earth, and you gazed upon this world with human eyes. Today you are alive in every creature in your risen glory. **Praise be to you!** Holy Spirit, by your light you guide the world toward the Father's love and accompany creation as it groans in travail. You also dwell in our hearts and you inspire us to do what is good. **Praise be to you!**

Triune Lord, wondrous community of infinite love, teach us to contemplate you in the beauty of the universe, for all things speak of you. Awaken our praise and thankfulness for every being that you have made. Give us the grace to feel profoundly joined to everything that is.

God of love, show us our place in this world as channels of your love for all the creatures of this Earth, for not one of them is forgotten in your sight. Enlighten those who possess power and money that they may avoid the sin of indifference, that they may love the common good, advance the weak, and care for this world in which we live. The poor and the Earth are crying out. O Lord, seize us with your power and light, help us to protect all life, to prepare for a better future, for the coming of your Kingdom of justice, peace, love and beauty. **Praise be to you! Amen.**

UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL AT ST. BASIL THE GREAT



THE ART OF ACCOMPANIMENT

excerpt from an article by Lucy Bemiss, September 24, 2021

...Unleash the Gospel notes that Jesus was the original model of accompaniment in evangelization stating, "When Jesus walked with the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, he did not immediately begin to instruct them. Instead, he first listened to them and allowed them to share their hopes and disappointments, winning their trust. He met them where they were in their faith and helped them go further." (Marker 6.2)

As Jesus' disciples, we too are invited into accompanying others as authentic friends in evangelization, showing and sharing with them the love that Christ gives us. However, we must remember that this process is neither timely nor easy—there will be highs and lows, there will be growing pains and there will most definitely be sacrificed time and energy. Unleash the Gospel continues elaborating on accompaniment explaining, "This is not always an easy process, especially for those who have spent many years living apart from God. They need others to walk by their side and lead them closer to God with patience, compassion and wisdom." That prompts the question, how can one strive to be a patient, compassionate, wise, witness in accompanying others? Don't be discouraged—although the art of accompaniment may be somewhat demanding, there are simple ways we can practice growing in virtue to become radiant witnesses to Christ's love and authentic companions for others:

Skip the Small Talk As opposed to just small talking with the individuals you are trying to walk with, engage in more meaningful conversation—a conversation that allows you to truly get to know that individual for who they are. Learn their interests and hobbies outside of the faith, their hopes and dreams, their fears, etc. By talking about real topics of greater depth, you will get a better idea of where that individual is spiritually, and thus be able to more fully tend to their needs. Through authentic conversation, a mutual bond of trust may be formed, which will serve as a firm foundation for a virtuous friendship.

Be an Active Listener Being an active listener can be tricky sometimes. Feelings and thoughts are often overlooked or thrown to the side due to our fast-paced world teaching our brain to always keep moving on to the next thing. Instead of running conversations, try to intentionally create space for the other individual to share a thought, feeling or story without interrupting them or adding on. It's important to create intentional breaks in conversation to let the other share more fully, show them you truly care and are genuinely interested in what they have to say.

Try New Things As you're getting to know the individual you are accompanying, sometimes you will discover you have a few different interests. Say they invite you to come play volleyball with some other friends, but you have zero interest in playing sports. What does a supportive, authentic friend do? Try new things! Even if it's an activity outside your field of interest or expertise, it's a good practice to go outside of your comfort zone and partake in hobbies of interest to the other individual. Chances are that taking steps to grow in their faith or partaking in some of your unique hobbies is just as uncomfortable as you being below average at volleyball!

Be Intentional It's important to put the other individual's actions into perspective. Something that might seem like no big deal to you might be a really big deal to the other. With that in mind, it's important to take the extra minute to send that thank you text, check in with a phone call or even thank the individual in person for coming to a social get-together, formation event or Bible study. Taking the extra minute shows the individual you're walking with that every "yes" they give is sincerely valued, and that you're proud of the time and vulnerability they willingly give.

Share Your Source of Joy When the individual you're accompanying hits you with the "why" questions of your joy, peace, purpose and knowledge of identity, don't be afraid to give them the non-watered down version of it all being rooted in the Lord's love. Be a living witness to the individual of how great the Lord's love is, and how he has the same amount of true love and desire for them.

Heavenly Father, through the intercession of St. John Paul II, we implore you to equip your servants to be patient, compassionate, wise witnesses to your love, so that we may master the art of accompaniment and bring more souls to the love and truth found in you alone. Amen.



Arrangements are made at least six months in advance with the Pastor.

VISITATION OF THE SICK

A Priest or LPM will be available upon request. Parishioners are urged to take the Eucharist to their confined family after Mass.

SACRAMENT OF THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK

This sacrament is celebrated once a year at a special Mass or upon request.
