29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

“What do you wish me to do for you?” Whether we realize it, this is a question God is always asking. It’s an important question because the answer we provide will reveal a great deal about where our hearts lie. Our requests of God can often appear very noble and altruistic. They consist of requests for healing for someone in need of prayers, successful resolution of a personal conflict, assistance in overcoming a disease and myriad other desires for both ourselves and others. We are especially concerned about those we love and can easily find ourselves bringing their struggles to God for a hearing in our prayer.

Is that really all that prayer is about? The woman in today’s Gospel, having been put in her place by Jesus, was only looking out for the wellbeing of her sons. She was doing what mothers do, protecting and securing the livelihood of her children. But she was sadly mistaken, her request was not granted. We all make this same misguided mistake from time to time. The goal of prayer is not to convince God of the worthiness of our agenda or to gain a hearing. Sometimes we believe that the more we multiply our prayers or discover the right combination of supplications that we will receive more of God’s attention. That’s not how it works. Even though God desires to hear, know, and be an intimate part of what is on our minds, it goes much deeper.

What we need from God is a relationship. It’s a relationship that guides and immerses us in the very stuff of life and in the direction of the Gospel. This relationship sees God’s kingdom and agenda, not our own, as what is most important. It builds the strength of character necessary to bring God’s Gospel into a world that may not receive it with open arms. It may cause us discomfort and suffering. We are asked to heroically journey with God through suffering, hardship, ridicule, and even death! Ultimately, our desire from God must become our desire for God. It is only when this happens that the powerful words “thy will be done” will be found with sincerity and humility on our lips. Whatever God wishes becomes what we wish as we see this glorious union of wills. Our humble lives will then become powerful witnesses, and what happens to us in God’s eternal kingdom the result of his mercy. We become true servants and find ourselves discovering God’s definition of success. That definition has nothing at all to do with status, income, or privilege.


The Biretta

You may have noticed me wearing the hat called the "biretta" (as seen in the photo below). What is the significance of this ecclesial hat? The biretta is a square cap with three raised horns and often a tuft in the middle. Originally, all priests received what is called *tonsure*. In more recent history only a tiny amount of hair was removed when a man preparing for priesthood received tonsure, but originally the hair on the crown of the head was kept shaved with a "ring" of hair around the head (just think of images of monks and friars such as with St. Anthony of Padua). This practice was adopted from Roman times when a slave had their head shaved to show they belonged to another. So, the priest had his head partially shaved to show he belonged to Jesus Christ.

On a practical level, because the crown of the head was shaved, it needed to be protected from the sun and from losing body heat, so a hood or hat was needed. Over time, the design would change and the current design became easier to make since the hat was box shaped instead of round. Since the hat was now sewn in a cross pattern, eventually the seams were highlighted and the vertical horns or "fins" of the biretta developed. What started as a practical move to provide cover and warmth for a tonsure, a sign of obedience to and belonging to Jesus Christ, developed into a piece of distinct apparel among the clergy. This was especially the case after the Protestant Reformation, as the biretta was worn only by Roman Catholic priests.

You will recall what St. Paul said in 1 Corinthians 11.2-16. He instructed men to uncover their heads while praying while admonishing the women to keep theirs covered. This is why I remove the biretta when I reach the altar, since the altar is the place of sacrifice where prayers are offered by the priest. The sanctuary is the "holy of holies" where the Most High God dwells in the tabernacle in the Holy Eucharist. I do wear it while sitting as I am not offering liturgical prayer at that moment, but then I remove it again when I stand to pray at the altar once again. Keep in mind that it is completely optional for a priest to make use of the biretta at Holy Mass (but it is not optional in the Tridentine Mass). I use it because it adds more richness and tradition to the Mass, and the Church is fond of physical sights and sounds and smells that help raise our minds to God while we are worshipping Him.

The biretta reminds the priest that, even if the tonsure has been abolished, he is still a joyful slave to Jesus Christ. Some say it is a statement of humility, to purposefully wear something that looks so strange! It's also a statement of reverence in an age that is so flippant about the things of God. God bless!

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

History time: My great, great, great, great, great, great, great grandfather, Etienne Racine was born in France in 1606 (my mother was a Racine). Around 1635, he left his farm in Lisieux and sailed for Quebec City in New France. In 1638, he married Marguerite Martin, daughter of Abraham Martin. Abraham Martin was remembered in Champlain's will with funds to clear land. A particular clearing in Quebec is now named for my ancestor, the Plains of Abraham, which is now a park in Quebec. (At one time, it had been a battle ground.)

Etienne considered himself a servant of the Jesuits, a religious order intent on teaching the Gospel to the Indians. In 1639, the Jesuits established a mission in Saint Marie, on the north shore of Lake Huron by Georgian Bay. In 1644, they invited Etienne to join them. A group of colonists, including Etienne, left their families in Quebec and traveled to Saint Marie. Etienne participated as a builder and carpenter. He returned to Quebec in 1645.

Unfortunately for the Jesuits, the Iroquois began a concentrated effort to destroy the Huron nation. In 1648, the Iroquois launched mass assaults on the Huron villages and by 1649 the Huron villages were all destroyed. Hundreds of Hurons were slaughtered and three Jesuit missionaries in that area (including John Brebeuf) achieved martyrdom. The Jesuits created a mission for the surviving Christian Hurons near Quebec, where Etienne would spend time helping the people.

Saint John Brebeuf, whose feast day is October 19 was declared a missionary to New France and became the patron saint of Canada. (St. Isaac Jogues, whose feast is also Oct. 19, is the patron saint of North America.) St. John Brebeuf was martyred near Saint Marie in 1649. May these martyrs continue to renew in these days, our Catholic faith which they helped to establish in this new land.

From the Psalm at the October 19 Liturgy, "HERE I AM, LORD; I COME TO DO YOUR WILL." Am I free to sing with the hymn, "Here I am, LORD. Is it I, LORD? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, Lord, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart." How open am I to answer God's call? What hidden service can I do for someone this week?

Other feasts this week: Monday, October 18 is the feast of St. Luke, one of the four evangelists to whom scholars attribute Luke's Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. **Like Luke, may we use our gifts to proclaim Jesus to those around us.** Friday, October 22 is the feast of Pope St. John Paul II. Karol Josef Wojtyla was born in Poland in 1920. As archbishop of Krakow, he took part in the Second Vatican Council. He became pope in 1978 and his papacy is the second-longest in history. He strengthened Catholic ties with other religions and published many encyclicals pertaining to the Church in the modern world. He also established the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday.

**UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL
AT ST. BASIL THE GREAT**



BLESSED CARLOS ACUTIS

Carlo Acutis, a Catholic Italian teenager who died in 2006, was beautified on Oct. 10, 2020 in Assisi. Acutis, a gamer and computer programmer who loved soccer and the Eucharist, has been the subject of interest around the world. Pope Francis referred to Carlo as a model of holiness in a digital age. Carlo's life should teach today's young people how to properly use and enjoy technology, including the internet and social media.

“To always be close to Jesus, that’s my life plan”

Carlo Acutis was born May 3, 1991, in London though his family moved to Milan shortly after. From a young age, Carlo seemed to have a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout. His mom said she had been to Mass only for her First Communion, her confirmation, and her wedding but young Carlo's unique and unexplained devotion led to her deep conversion. The priest promoting his cause for sainthood noted that Carlo “managed to drag his relatives, his parents to Mass every day. It was not the other way around; it was not his parents bringing the little boy to Mass, but it was he who managed to get himself to Mass and to convince others to receive Communion daily.” What an inspiration for a child to model faith witness to a family!

He had a gift for empathy and was known for defending kids at school who got picked on, especially disabled kids. Carlo loved soccer and video games. He tried to stay disciplined and only played games for an hour a week even though he really wanted to play much more. He also bought computer programming books and taught himself computer coding and animation. He had a great devotion to Mary loved to pray the rosary. He went to Mass and confession as often as he could. He loved the Eucharist and was fascinated by Eucharistic miracles. He asked his parents to take him on pilgrimages — to the places of the saints, and to the sites of Eucharistic miracles. Using his research, he began creating what would eventually become a website to catalog and share the information with others. Carlo was concerned by people growing distant to the Church and the sacraments and desperately wanted to bring them back. On the site, he told people that “the more often we receive the Eucharist, the more we will become like Jesus, so that on this earth we will have a foretaste of heaven.

At age 15, Carlo was diagnosed with an untreatable leukemia. He offered up his suffering for others coping with illness and said, “I offer all the suffering I will have to suffer for the Lord, for the Pope, and the Church.” Carlo died from his illness on Oct. 12, 2006. At his request he was buried in Assisi because of his love for St. Francis. His cause for canonization began in 2013 and he was designated “Venerable” in 2018. A healing miracle has been attributed to his intercession and he will be designated “Blessed” October 10.

His tomb has been opened and his intact body lies in repose in a glass tomb where he can be venerated by pilgrims until Oct. 17. He is displayed in jeans and a pair of Nikes, the casual clothes he preferred in life. The rector for the Sanctuary of Spoliation in Assisi, where Acutis' tomb is located, called him a witness that holiness is attainable for teenagers. “For the first time in history we will see a saint dressed in jeans, sneakers, and a sweater,” the rector said. “This is a great message for us, we can feel holiness not as a distant thing but as something very much within everyone's reach because the Lord is the Lord of everyone.”

Archbishop Domenico Sorrentino of Assisi said “Carlo is a boy of our time. A boy of the internet age, and a model of holiness of the digital age, as Pope Francis presented him in his letter to young people around the world. The computer ... has become a way of going through the streets of the world, like the first disciples of Jesus, to bring to hearts and homes the announcement of true peace, that which quenches the thirst for the infinite that inhabits the human heart.” (Our Sunday Visitor)

On his website, Carlo wrote a list of instructions for becoming holy . . . but his very first rule was this: “You must want it with all your heart.” This is the legacy of blessed Carlo Acutis: an ordinary, modern kid who watched cartoons and used the internet and wanted holiness with all his heart. This is why the world loves him. Because he shows us that holiness is possible. For every one of us. Even if you have an Instagram account. Even if you're a gamer. Carlo Acutis was born in 1991. That fact alone is a testimony: Holiness is possible. For you. Right now. But you have to want it.


