4th Sunday of Advent

St. Augustine tells us that a “Christian is a mind through which Christ thinks, a heart through which Christ loves, a voice through which Christ speaks and a hand through which Christ helps.” As we look around and out at the world, we do not have to search too far before we come face to face with inequity and injustice. There is so much unfairness, prejudice, anger, hatred, violence, and want. begin to realize just how flawed it really is. God did take responsibility and God did fix the problem! God sent us Jesus Christ as the divine solution to the world's ills. 

Fr. Eric's Exposé:

A Powerful Short Account

I receive email newsletters from various Catholic religious orders and organizations that provide updates on what is going on in their communities or apostolates. I recently received this powerful account from a Brother David of the Knights of the Holy Eucharist in Nebraska. In it, he explains how he was utilized as an instrument of God's love to save a man's life!



"Miracles continue to happen all around us; we just need to make ourselves available and allow God to use us in any manner that He chooses.

Once I was invited to the top of a lookout tower in a state park. After reflecting on and viewing God's beautiful creation, I began my descent down the stairs. To my surprise, a young man in a sort of military outfit was coming up the last flight of stairs. He acted very surprised to see me and asked what I was doing up there. His question seemed odd; everyone goes to the observation deck for the same reason, so I thought I would reverse the question. I asked, "Why are you coming up here?" I was shocked when he said, "To jump off."

Once in a talk, a priest who worked with troubled people said to remember "HALT!": Never allow yourself to act when you are Hungry, Angry, Lonely, or Tired. I figured this young man was dealing with one or more of these issues, so I told him that I was not going to let him jump. He said he wanted to commit suicide in style since he was a military jumper. Figuring that he was hungry and tired, I told him that I wanted to take him out for a steak dinner. He was overwhelmed with emotion, and he knew that God was saving his life that day.

After we ate and had a long talk about getting back in the state of grace by going to confession, I gave him a ride home; he had walked over 20 miles to the tower that day. When we entered his apartment, there was his lovely wife preparing dinner while his children were playing on the floor. What a tragedy would have occurred had God not sent me to the top of the tower on that day!

Let us continue to ask God to lead us down paths that save lives and souls.

Notice how bold Brother David was: "...I told him that I was not going to let him jump." Most of the time we cannot or should not physically restrain someone to keep them from committing a mortal sin, but we can try to persuade them not to commit the sin. However, when we are dealing with someone who is tempted to take their own life by suicide, or if someone is going to attempt to murder someone else, *and* we are present *and* have a reasonable chance to physically stop them (clearly Brother David had a size advantage if you look at the picture), then we should do so because the deliberate taking of an innocent life is such a grave sin. May the Lord protect all innocent life!

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones,

If you take the time to compare the four Gospels, Luke is the only one who tells the Christmas story. Matthew gives Jesus' genealogy, an angel coming to Joseph in a dream, the visit of the Magi and the flight into Egypt. Mark begins his Gospel with the preaching of John the Baptist. John begins his Gospel with John the Baptist and his testimony, leading the way for Jesus' preaching and public life.

Most of the Gospels for this liturgical year (year C) come to us from Luke. It is from Luke that we learn about Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary's visit to Elizabeth (today's Gospel, Luke 1: 39-45), Jesus being laid in a manger, angels announcing the birth of Jesus to the shepherds and the shepherd's visit to Jesus, the circumcision and the presentation of the child in the temple. (Luke must have learned all that from Mary.)

Unlike Mark and Matthew, who wrote their gospels for a Jewish Christians, Luke's audience was composed of Gentile believers (mostly Greeks). The Jesus story doesn't happen "once upon a time". Luke places Jesus' birth in a certain generation, at a precise moment in history as rich, chaotic and volatile as ours. We will meet Mary as she looks ahead to the birth of her baby, and Elizabeth as she welcomes and celebrates this amazing news.

In many ways, these characters are an unlikely bunch – a marginalized, pregnant young woman; and older woman unexpectedly pregnant; and an eccentric wilderness preacher – but we read that they are all "filled with the Holy Spirit". They are the first witnesses to Jesus coming into the world.

During Advent, we are invited to have a real encounter with Jesus. It is a time to **wake up**, and rediscover the joy in our life. It is a time to practice the words of Mary, "**Let it be**", and to be open to the adventures that come our way from God. All we need is to **be ready**. This Christmas,

may we claim that promise and may we find some small moments to leap

for joy. Mary is blessed because she believed that what God promised would be fulfilled. **Which of God's promises most inspires me with confidence?** In today's Collect (prayer before the readings), we ask that God will pour grace into our hearts. **How has the grace of Eucharist made a difference in my life? What grace of divine life would I ask for today?**

Why would Mary travel from Galilee to a village in the hill country of Judea? One possibility is that Mary's world had been turned upside down. Her plans had been shattered. Her reputation was in danger. She was "greatly troubled". In those times, her pregnancy would have been earth-shattering, a scandal to everyone in her hometown. When she enters Elizabeth's house, Mary finds neither judgment nor rebuke. She encounters only joy. Elizabeth wraps the bewildered teenage mother-to-be in her strong embrace., offering her welcome and affirmation in a difficult time. What that must have meant to Mary! Elizabeth declared her – and her child – a blessing.

Perhaps in our world today we need more Elizabeths, people willing to let go of judgment and criticism and offer, instead, God's blessing. If there were more Elizabeths, might there be more people singing a holy song, like Mary? **As I encounter people, do I see their faults, failings and worst traits – things I would like to change about them? Or do I see God's blessing alive in them? How has my trust in God been strengthened recently?**



**UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL

THE DAY NO ONE NOTICED

The story of the birth of Jesus, son of Mary, son of God, begins in Luke's gospel, with the decree of Caesar for the enrollment of the whole world. This enrollment was a census of the people and their property for the purpose of taxation. The decree required people to travel to their ancestral home where the enrollment would take place. Although his plan was to obtain money for the Roman Empire, little did Caesar realize that by his declaration, he was aiding the fulfillment of the prophecy that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:1-2.) Bethlehem was called the City of David. It is where David grew up and where he was anointed king. And it was to this city that Mary and Joseph, both descendants of David would travel.

Mary and Joseph made the difficult journey to Bethlehem. The ninety-mile journey was hilly, rocky and a challenge for a woman who was expecting. And the challenge continued when they reached Bethlehem, only to find no place to rest. Tradition says that the place where Mary gave birth was probably a cave, a place often used to shelter animals. The Bible doesn't mention a stable, but only a manger. Clearly it was a place with animals and not fit for a king.

Mary wrapped her little child in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger. At Jesus' birth we see parallels to how He would die. He was born in poverty. He died the death of a common criminal. He was wrapped in swaddling clothes and was laid in a manger. Jesus' body was wrapped in cloths before being placed in a borrowed tomb.

Jesus was born in anonymity. No heads of state, no high priests or rabbis came to honor Him. The word never spread among the people that the long-awaited Messiah had arrived. There were no celebrations. Only the lowly shepherds, the lowest class of people at that time, came to witness the greatest event in all of history. They told others and made known the message that was told to them. The response was, "All who heard it were amazed." Did they go themselves to see, or were they just amazed? Maybe they doubted that such a thing could happen to shepherds. Maybe they didn't believe it. There is no account that they went themselves to honor the Holy Child. And, some time later, it was three kings from faraway countries, following a star, that came to pay homage to the new-born king. The people of Israel missed it.

How calmly Mary bore all the difficulties and disappointments that she experienced at this time. She showed no fear, no anxiety, just trust that God was in control. Luke says, "she kept all these things, pondering them in her heart" (Luke 2:18). What a lesson that is for us in these days of stress and anxiety! Like Mary, instead of blowing our tops, we need to keep things, and ponder them, and trust that God is in charge. Our crosses in life can be lessons. We can turn to the Lord and ask, "What are you teaching me in this?"

The People of Israel awaited the long-prophesied arrival of the Messiah. And when He came, hardly anyone noticed. We can identify easily with the people of this time. We are distracted, busy, rushing from one thing to the next. We buy decorations, trees, gifts, sumptuous foods, attend parties, mail cards, maybe work long hours, but do we encounter Jesus? Do we even think of Him on Christmas? He isn't coming in a stable again, but He comes to us in the Eucharist, He listens to our prayers, and is with us in the tabernacles of churches all over the world. He is Emmanuel, God with us. Do we notice? If we don't acknowledge His presence among us now, will we recognize Him at His second coming? We do not know when that day will be. Maybe some of us will meet Him soon. The Prophets told the people to be ready for the day of their visitation. The prophets tell us also to be ready for His coming. It is not a day you can circle on your calendar. We can't plan to take the day off or plan a trip or a feast on that day. It is a day for which we must be always ready, always vigilant. Don't miss it!

O, COME, LET US ADORE HIM, CHRIST THE LORD! MERRY CHRISTMAS!
