



Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.

In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.

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Fr. Eric's Exposé:

Merry Christmas!

I want to wish a Merry Christmas to all of you! A reminder that after the 4pm Holy Mass on Saturday, January 1st, I will be doing the Epiphany Water blessing, which will begin sometime between 5:15 and 5:30pm. Please bring containers of regular water no smaller than

a gallon each. The reason for this: there is a point in the ceremony where I will mingle a little amount of the exorcized salt into *each* container of exorcized water with a short prayer. It could take excessively long (the ceremony itself is already about 35 to 40 minutes long) if there are too many small containers, so anything a gallon and up is the best to bring in. I will have a table or two set up in the sanctuary to place all the water upon. Thank you!

This Christmas the parish gave out the book *The Search* written by Chris Stefanick and Paul McCusker. There is an added advantage to this book: it is associated with "The Search" video series on FORMED by Augustine Institute and Chris Stefanick, which you all have access to since the parish pays for a FORMED subscription every year! The book can be read on its own though without the videos. Below is a description:

Why are we here? What is life all about? What happens when we die? These are some of life's deepest questions, rooted in the human heart's deepest desires: happiness, love, beauty, meaning. Where can we find the answers to these questions and these desires? Until satisfied, we are left questioning, longing, and searching. This thought-provoking, approachable paperback book is based on "The Search" video series — a powerful new Catholic evangelization experience. It is written to help those who are curious about the Faith but not ready to commit. "The Search" recasts the vision for what life's all about to those who've walked away and those who are asking big questions. We need to answer them well so they see the Catholic Faith as it truly is. Chris Stefanick and experts from multiple fields of science, medicine, psychology, art and religion examine our place in the larger story of existence. Whether you're a practiced inquirer or a jaded skeptic, "The Search" will speak to you. You may be reassured by some parts, and challenged by others. Either way, you'll find a lot here to think about. And when all is said and done, life's questions demand to be answered.

I hope you enjoy the book and enjoy this Christmas season with your families and friends! God bless you and may the Holy Infant grant you peace.

Today we know, beyond doubt, that we are a necessary part of God's beautifully choreographed masterpiece of life and not just a random happening without real intent or purpose. We are loved, treasured, and blessed.

Accepting the truth of God's birth in time we also accept an invitation to dance with God. We can let go of what tethers us to anxious concerns and superficial securities. Throw caution to the wind and go with God. We have been blessed with talents, gifts, and life eternal. Follow the rhythm of the dance with joy and listen to what the Word who became flesh tells us about what the next steps can be. 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Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones.

Today is the Octave of Christmas and the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. We read about Hannah and her husband, Elkanah, in the first reading (1 Samuel 1: 20-28). Hannah had asked God for a son which God granted her. After her son, Samuel was born and weaned, she brought him to the temple to give him to God. "As long as he lives, he shall be dedicated to the Lord." How ready am I to thank God for his gifts to me in such a dramatic way? Am I ready to give up the thing I had longed for? How might I offer myself in God's service?

In the Gospel (Luke 2: 41-52) we read about the Holy Family going to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover. They traveled in a caravan for safety's sake. The men and women were in separate groups. Because of Jesus' age – 12 – he could travel with the women or the men. Both Mary and Joseph thought Jesus was with the other. Imagine their panic when, after a day of traveling, they discovered Jesus was not in the group. They returned to Jerusalem and began searching. (Stop a minute and put yourself in Mary and Joseph's place – the fear, the dismay, the anxiety they must have felt.). After three days of searching, they found him in the temple sitting in the midst of the teachers. Mary's response was a typical "Mom reaction" - "Why have you done this to us?" Jesus gives a rather cheeky response: "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" They did not understand what he meant. The Gospel tells us that "his mother kept all these things in her heart." Jesus went home to Nazareth and was obedient to them and "advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man." Add this to the list of things Mary was keeping in her heart (what the angel told her at the Annunciation, the visit by the shepherds at the

birth of Jesus, what the Magi told her when they found the Babe, the flight into Egypt, etc.). Mary, the courageous woman who said "yes", knows there is more to her son's destiny. She collects these moments and ponders them. Mary and Joseph's approach of patience, listening and thoughtful meditation as they raise Jesus gives us an example for our family life. Reflection on our own lives that can guide us at our most difficult times and listening to the messages from God to help us navigate our family life. What can I do to listen more carefully? What messengers might have been sent to me this week?

Monday, December 27, is the feast of St. John, apostle and evangelist. John and his brother, James, - the sons of Zebedee, were called from their fishing to follow Jesus. They were present at the Transfiguration, the raising of Jairus's daughter, and Jesus' agony in the garden. John has traditionally been identified as the author of the fourth gospel, the Book of Revelation and the three letters that bear his name. He was also thought to be the "Beloved Disciple". May we use our skills as John did to bring others to Jesus' kingdom. John teaches us to trust even though we have no direct proof. How has my trust in God been **strengthened recently?** Tuesday, December 28 is the feast of The Holy Innocents – the children slain instead of Jesus by King Herod (Matthew 2:16-18). What might I do today to help keep children from abuse?

UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL AT ST. BASIL THE GREAT



FAMILY TRADITIONS FOR THE TRUE CHRISTMAS SEASON

Merry Christmas! Isn't it odd that after December 25th the radio stations stop playing Christmas music? Very often we see Christmas trees lying at the curb on the 26th of December, ready for the trash collector, and decorations are gone within days. The American culture celebrates Christmas from Halloween until Christmas and then, poof! It's off to the races toward Valentine's Day!

The Church, however, has not played any Christmas hymns until December 25th and then we hear them throughout the TRUE Christmas season, which ends with the Baptism of Jesus. THIS is the Christmas Season. The song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" is not about the 12 days prior to Christmas, but 12 days after. We take these post-Christmas days to continue our celebration of the birth of our Savior. Here are some suggestions on how to continue your family celebration through the TRUE Christmas season. These are from Erica Tighe Campbell who published an article in *Disciple* entitled, "Family Traditions for the Advent and Christmas Seasons."

Celebrate the 12 days of Christmas: One fun thing to do is to include a present under the tree that is to be opened by the family that has an envelope for each of the 12 days. Inside the envelope varies from day to day with an activity to do as a family that day. One envelope could have tickets to the zoo and another could have directions to bake cookies to bring to your neighbors or someone who lives alone and might be feeling lonely. Other ideas might include: getting to go to the bookstore to pick out a new book,



volunteering at a food pantry if your children are old enough, making sandwiches to hand out downtown to people who are displaced, building forts in the living room for a movie night or a new museum membership. Along with the activity card in the envelope, the day's Mass readings can also be included and read aloud over breakfast with a little prayer to the Holy Family to sanctify your own family!

Pick names for secret acts of kindness: Borrow from the tradition we had in my Brazilian community. Near your nativity set where Jesus has just arrived, have a tiny bowl with pieces of paper with each family member's name on it. As each person approaches the manger to pick a name, they pray to grow to be more like Jesus in the coming year — one who sees the other and finds small ways to bless their life. During Christmastide, the family member pays special attention to the needs of the person they picked. Maybe secretly doing their chore, setting out a piece of candy on their pillowcase to find before bed, leaving a card with all of your favorite things about them, letting them go first or spending extra quality time together. One bigger gift is to be planned and given on Epiphany! As some added fun, you can guess who had your name before they are revealed!

The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God: We celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, on New Year's Day, which is a holy day of obligation. We always go to the vespers Mass on New Year's Eve before going to any parties. But more fun than anything is to tie the feast day *into* New Year Eve celebrations. Lots of gold and lots of stars! The title "Mother of God" is a western derivation from the Greek Theotokos, which means "Godbearer". During the party, you can have a basket of saints for each guest to choose a Saint of the Year. Then you can have correlating prayer cards or coloring sheets for the saints to be used in a craft to make a little shrine to have in their room or home throughout the year. Each person can share. You can make fun star crowns and make star garlands (there are lots of tutorials online). Then together you can pray a rosary to invite Mary into your new year and discuss how you hope to be God-bearers in the world.

Celebrate the Epiphany: In many cultures around the world, Epiphany is a bigger holiday than Christmas. There are so many beautiful traditions to look to. In Mexico there is a Rosca de Reyes cake. Inside the cake is a tiny baby Jesus figurine. Whoever has the figurine in their piece of cake has to bring the tamales for the party at Candlemas, February 2nd. Bless the doorway of your home with holy water and scrawl in chalk C+M+B (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar) — plus the year. The "C, M, B" also stands for the Latin blessing Christus mansionem benedicat which means "Christ bless this house."

Merry Christmas, Happy feast of the Holy Family, Happy Feast of Mary, Mother of God, and Merry Little Christmas (the Epiphany)!!

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
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
