The Baptism of the Lord

"We are called to live our baptism every day, as new creatures, clothed in Christ." — Pope Francis

What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.

I Hope I Am Like Him

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. "One worthier than I is coming," he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God's will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let's examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God's plan?

Musings From Mary Kay

Dear Ones.

Today is the feast of the Baptism of Jesus. Today's Gospel (Luke 3:15-16,2122) tells the story of John the Baptist baptizing Jesus in the River Jordan. John made the statement that he baptizes with water. One will come who is mightier than I who will baptize with "the Holy Spirit and fire". John had been baptizing all day and there is no indication that he knew he had baptized Jesus. (When John sent people to ask Jesus who he was, it seemed he did not realize he had baptized Jesus. Luke 7:18-23)

Judaism, with its tradition of *mikvah*, or ritual bath, was well acquainted with the water ablutions that John mentions. The reference to "baptism with the Holy Spirit and fire" emphasizes that Jesus' actions go beyond religious ritual. The Gospel goes on to say that "heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.' "There is no conversation between Jesus and John – Jesus is baptized as one of the crowd, the voice from heaven is directed only to him. The others did not hear it. Luke makes it clear that John is a precursor of Jesus and lesser than him.

Do you remember your Baptism? Have you seen pictures of it? Have you witnessed someone else's baptism? In today's Scriptures, we can listen for echoes of our own baptism: water, Spirit, the Trinity, a faith-filled community gathered. The Christmas season looks beyond the baby in Bethlehem. Each feast peels back the layers a little further, each revealing the truth of Jesus of Nazareth from a different perspective. Jesus will show to the world the glory, justice, power, and abundant love of God. By **our** baptism we can lay claim to that divine declaration: "You are my beloved Son/Daughter; with you I am well pleased." Do you celebrate your baptism date anniversary? This is a fitting time to begin to do so.

I recently made an Advent retreat at St. Paul of the Cross. The theme was <u>HOPE</u> – something sorely needed in this time. HOPE is an act of the will. It is not a feeling. It comes from Grace. HOPE believes in a future good – something that may be difficult to obtain but obtainable with God. The one who has Hope lives differently. How we think depends a lot on who we have been listening to, who we spend time with, who we put our faith and trust in. Do you know your destiny (Heaven)? At our Baptism, we were claimed for Christ. We recognize that reality and go deeper by <u>choosing Hope</u>. Hope answers our desire for happiness – the Kingdom of Heaven. Nothing less will be enough – only God.

<u>Hope</u> gives us the courage to wait and persevere, to not give up, to take the next step. Jesus says to <u>me</u>, "You are my beloved." Yes, God loves me. We can't earn God's love because we already have it. We are loved by a faithful God. <u>HOPE</u> is the center of Christmas. **Do I live as a person of HOPE? Does HOPE help me live as a person more loving, more kind? What is Jesus saying to me in this Eucharist and in my life right now? What fills my heart with expectation today? Am I at PEACE?**

UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL AT ST. BASIL THE GREAT



Baptism is a New Beginning

The Baptism of the Lord: After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." Luke 3:21-22

What a profoundly beautiful account of Jesus's baptism that was recorded in the gospel reading for today! The holiness [of] the words written about this event, transcends time. It was a single moment in time, but what a profoundly spiritual event this was in Jesus's life. It sounds like it was the same with God the Father. A moment when heaven and earth touched one another, when the heavens were torn open and the Spirit descended on Jesus like a dove.

Have you ever had an experience of time standing still? An event so major in your life that you could not react to it? All you could do was to just experience the present moment you were in? Like the moment you proposed to your wife, or held your newborn baby for the first time? Newborn babies look at their parents for a long period of time, shortly after they are born. They are bonding with their mother and father in those first precious moments of life, but the parents are even more profoundly affected by the miracle of their new baby's birth. In a way, Jesus experienced a new birth, when he rose from the baptismal waters. No, he had no need of baptism, he had no sins to be washed away. But, he was anointed by the Holy Spirit, in a bond of love with his Father, in the first moments after he rose from the waters of baptism. A new, deeper bond formed in that moment in time between Jesus and His Father.

Most Catholic baptisms are performed on babies and as an adult they have no memory of their own baptism. However, I had the experience of a full immersion baptism at a Protestant church when I was twelve years old. ... For me, it was a moment when time stood still. I will never forget the white gown and the feeling of the cool, pure, clean water. When I first came out of the water, I instantly felt like a new person. Every cell in my body felt sparkling clean, and I knew that I would never again feel that perfectly pure, and clean, as I did in the first few moments that followed my baptism. Indeed, the remainder of the day was filled with the warmth and the glow of the Holy Spirit, that had enveloped me in His love and peace. I knew that Jesus loved me deeply that day, in a personal way that I

cannot put into words. It was the most beautiful experience of my life. The only other experiences of my life that came close to the day of my baptism, [were] the day that my husband and I were married, the night that I became a Catholic at the Easter vigil, and the first time that I ever held our newborn son. These were profoundly beautiful experiences in my life too, but they cannot even begin to compare with the day of my baptism. And, this experience is something I just cannot convey very well, with words. The Holy Spirit completely enveloped me that day in His love, and a deep sense of peace... permeated everything and made my heart burn with a new flame that I had never known before.

The Gospel account of Jesus's baptism is told in very few words, but the event was no doubt a very profound experience for Jesus Christ and his Father, and for John the Baptist. It was also the beginning of Christ's ministry. He would leave for a prolonged period to pray in the desert, shortly after his baptism, and then begin his public ministry. He obviously felt a deeper need to be alone with his Father in prayer, after his baptism. Rather than let the newness of the event wear off, Jesus entered more deeply into a relationship with his Father through his prayers in the desert. A time spent deepening his bond with his Father and getting to know himself better, and listening to God's will for his life. Adults who are baptized and brought into the Catholic church in our modern times should consider doing the same. Jesus shows us how to live more deeply as Christians, by the example of his own life.

[Whether] you were baptized as an [infant or an] adult, or [were] confirmed as a young adult... - perhaps we can regain a sense of the sacredness of our bond with Jesus, and with God our Father... with some time spent in solitude and prayer. We never stand still in the spiritual life. Love either grows, or it loses ground. Jesus made a deliberate choice to take time out, to grow closer to his Father through a deeper period of prayer. Perhaps the Holy Spirit is calling us today, to do the same.

Excerpt from article by Laura Kazlas. Laura Kazlas was raised in an atheist family, but came to believe in God when she was 12 years old. She was baptized and later became a Catholic because of the Mass. "The first time my husband brought me to Mass, I thought it was the most holy, beautiful sense of worshiping God that I had ever experienced. I still do!"
