



This past Tuesday we experienced a 'palindrome' - 2/22/22. This rare calendrical event is special because all the numbers are 2 and it falls on the day of the week that actually sounds like the number. The last a time an event like this occurred was in 1622 and the next time this will happen will be in 2422. How blessed are we that we are able to experience it. Hope you had a happy 'twosday'.

On another note, February 22 is also the feast day of Chair of Saint Peter the Apostle - St. Peter's Basilica is named

after him and also where a relic of him is kept. Do some research on this topic...it's very interesting. You know how I love history!

The beginning of Lent is quite late this year. It will begin this Wednesday! It's then that we will begin a period of fasting, abstaining and almsgiving for a period of forty days. We join with Christ in the commemoration of his death and resurrection.

We will celebrate Mass on Ash Wednesday at 8:30 a.m. and again at 5:30 p.m. At these Masses we will distribute blessed ashes. These ashes will be left in the church during the day for those who wish to impose them on yourselves or others.

I need to remind you that Ash Wednesday is a day of fast and abstinence. We are asked to abstain from meat on that day and not eat between meals. This obligation is a requirement for those over the age of fourteen and under the age of sixty. Abstaining from meat on Friday's of Lent is also recommended. If you find this too difficult, you may dispense yourself.

Our Gospel today reminds us that we are offered a self-check on our own motivations. With adequate self-reflection, it's easy to become blind to our own faults. We go through life's motions as our bad habits linger or even increase. We may become increasingly impatient, avoid important tasks or neglect emotional needs of those close to us. Perhaps we even find fault with those around us. In the words of Jesus, "remove the wooden beam from your own eye first." Lent is a good time for self-reflection.

May God bless you and know that I pray for each of you in my daily prayers.

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration for the week

"From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks." What we say reveals so much about who we are. It discloses what is really going on within us: our integrity, priorities, depth of conscience, level of compassion and understanding of mercy. People whose speech is judgmental or overly critical usually reveal an interior life that is angry, unsettled, defensive, and shallow. Our speech communicates our sense of right and wrong, the strength of our relationship with God and how we feel about our fellow human beings. We are also quick to point out the faults of others, concentrating on their shortcomings and wrongdoings before our own. Only God fully understands what is going on inside the human heart. Only God can see the depth of a human soul. Perhaps it would do us well to consider what may be happening inside our brothers and sisters and temper our critical speech of what we see occurring outside. Looking within will also help us identify our own sins and weakness so that we can be better positioned to offer the type of wisdom and compassionate guidance that can really be of help to our friends.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

With a family like hers, it's no wonder that St. Katharine Drexel (November 26, 1858 – March 3, 1955) grew up to become one of the first American-born saints.

Born in Philadelphia in 1858, her mother passed away when she was only five weeks old. Her father, a renowned banker, remarried a wonderful woman, and together they raised St. Katherine Drexel and her two sisters in a life of privilege. Both financially and spiritually well-endowed, the Drexels were devout Catholics and set an excellent example of true Christian servitude with prayer and care for the poor.

After her father's death, St. Katharine Drexel gave up her inheritance and instead devoted her life to the material and spiritual well-being of black and native Americans. Mother Drexel, as she would become known as, established the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored, and together they opened a boarding school in Santa Fe, the first of 50 missions for Native Americans in 16 states.

At 77, she suffered a heart attack and was forced to retire from active ministry. She spent the next 20 years of her life in quiet yet intense prayer. She died at the age of 96 and was canonized in 2000 by Pope John Paul II.

FAITH FORMATION

Lent Is a 10th of the Year...Church poets called the time a "tithe" of our days given back to God. During the other nine-tenths of the year the work of the church is supposed to be directed out to the world, but during Lent we pull back to examine our unhealthy ways. The word quarantine" is an old word for Lent—literally meaning 40 days of imposed recuperation.

Lent Is A Learning Time - It's time to sit down as a

family and talk about Lent. Does your family have a plan? How can you ALL get closer to Jesus? What can your family do? Beside the usual...attending Mass every week, remembering prayers in the morning and night, being kind. How about a family rosary?...attending the Stations of the Cross? Here's some ideas: LOOK FOR MERCY: Moments of mercy are happening all around us. Help children to identify one merciful act daily during Lent. GET RID OF GRUDGES: Teach children by giving them examples from your life on how you let go of anger and resentments and forgave someone that hurt you. GO ON A MISSION OF MERCY: Spend a day at a local food pantry, soup kitchen or homeless shelter. Your children will get a hands-on experience in what it means to be merciful. SEND BOOKS TO THE MISSIONS: Visit a Catholic bookstore or website and buy spiritual books for children and adults that you can send to a Catholic mission in the US and overseas. RECEIVE GOD'S MERCY: Take the whole family to a parish penance service. We're all prone to self-centeredness. Help your children understand that admitting to selfish behaviors and asking God's forgiveness helps us to become the merciful people that God is calling us to be. Even children not old enough for confession can take part in the prayers of a penance service. **BECOME MORE MERCIFUL:** Pope Francis hopes that during Lent we will all become more merciful in everything that we say and do. Holding a door for someone, extending a helping hand, offering a sincere compliment are just a few of the small things that we can practice during Lent that will lead your family to becoming more merciful. SELECT A PSALM: Psalms teach us about God's mercy. They are an easy addition to family prayer at dinner or bedtime. SHOW MERCY: We are merciful when we are kind to one another, when we forgive and when we put the needs of others before our own. Ask your children to share an example of how they were merciful to someone. SPEND TIME IN ADORATION: We have a beautiful chapel! Spend some time there in quiet reflection. It's a good time to teach your children to spend some time in the presence of God. Most children have short attention spans, but a few minutes of silence in the presence of Our Lord is a good way to help them learn about spiritual benefits of quiet reflection. MAKE TIME FOR MARY: Make time to pray the Rosary with your family, focusing on the Joyful Mysteries, which reflect on the early life of Mary and Jesus. Consider a trip to a nearby shrine where you can share a prayer together. Have a prayer-filled Lent!

Thought For The Week—Father, help me to see this holy season of Lent as a time of spiritual renewal, rather than a time of deprivation. Motivate me to reach a new level of experiencing Your grace.

WHAT IS LENT?

Wednesday, March 2, 2022 - Thursday, April 14, 2022—Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. We seek the Lord in prayer by reading Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called to abstain from luxuries during Lent, We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ. Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. St. Anselm will offer several opportunities to further your personal experience of Lent.

Aside from our weekend/weekday masses, we will pray the Stations of the Cross each Friday at 7:00 pm, have Lenten discussion groups on Mondays at 9:00 am, 2:00 pm, and 7:30 pm which will meet in the meeting room (connected to the church; registration is not required but would be helpful) and a Charismatic Prayer group that meets in the Eucharistic Chapel on Tuesdays at 7:30pm.
