ON THE ROAD TO Emmans

We are back into the season of Ordinary Time. I love being in this "ordinary time" as it gives us a chance to take some time for ourselves and sit back from all the rush of the holiday season. I want to express my "thanks" for all those who shared their holiday greetings, gifts, and cards with me at Christmas Time. Know that it was greatly appreciated.

BIBLE STUDY – last Monday, January 10th we began our study of "*THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT*." This study will end on February 7th. If you have not signed up yet there are still some books left. Please register at the Parish Office.

Beginning February 21st thru April 4th, we will begin a study on "THE PASSION AND RESURRECTION NARRATIVES." You must personally sign up in the Parish Office or call the Office to register. We need an accurate account so the materials for this study may be ordered.

Those who are in our RCIA process continue to study our faith as Catholics and share their stories. They are formally called our "catechumens and candidates," and they are dismissed from our Sunday Liturgy to reflect more on the Word of God as it applies to their life. There are others who are baptized in our faith, who may have received their first communion and are preparing to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation at our Easter Vigil. Because of their baptism in our faith, they stay for the rest of Mass, receive Communion, then come and join the rest of us for our session. Please keep them in your prayers throughout this process.

This weekend I will be away from the parish and on retreat with people from our parish and friends over the years to spend some time with Christ and reflect on his presence in our lives. Please keep us in prayer.

One of my favorite Gospel passages is The Wedding Feast of Cana. My wife and I were privileged to be at Cana and renew our marriage commitment to each other years ago. A "google search" on the term "delayed gratification" you will see some interesting articles linking the ability and discipline "to save the best until last" to every imaginable virtue and delight.

Financial planners will tell you that this discipline is the secret to accumulating enough wealth for retirement.

Fitness trainers will laud the choice for "pain now, pleasure later" as the secret ingredient to sustained health and wellness.

Those who learn early and practice consistently, the virtue and discipline of delayed gratification, are on the path to success and blessing in life, according to the experts.

We are constantly confronted with the temptation to fulfill *immediate gratification*, to reach for the *instant pleasure*, to buy or charge the *impulse purchase* whether we really need it or can even afford it. It is always easier to eat an extra donut on the couch than to sweat out an



exercise regimen at the gym. Giving in to the momentary and instant pleasure; that's easy! What is difficult is staring down our grumbling hunger, or our desire for immediate pleasure, and saying "No, not now, not yet."

With this in mind, let's turn to this weekend's Gospel lesson. St. John records the first miracle, or "sign" in the earthly ministry of Jesus. The setting is a wedding in the small village of Cana, near Nazareth where Jesus spent his younger years. Weddings were big deals in the first century, just like they are today, and it was not unusual for the wedding guest list to spill over to friends and family living in the nearby towns. So, this couple in Cana, and their parents, were probably friends to Mary and Joseph, hence the invitation to Mary and Jesus to attend the wedding celebration.

But we should keep in mind that weddings in the first century were usually spread over several days. There was the ceremony itself, but before and after the ceremony there were banquets and parties, joy and dancing, toasts, and blessings. If there was one (continued on pg. 4...)

thing they knew how to do well, it was to throw a wedding party.

In the life experience of the typical Israelite, there was no greater moment of unbridled joy and unlimited celebration than a wedding. No wonder the Bible so often compares the glory of heaven to a wedding feast. In fact, our first reading today from the prophet Isaiah, draws on the wedding analogy to picture God's love and commitment to His people. Hear it again, "As a Bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall God rejoice in you."

And so, at this wedding in Cana, we would not be SATURDAY, JANUARY 15 | Weekday surprised to hear that the wine was running out. It may have been several days into the festivities at this point. Possibly, there had been one too many toasts, one too many parties, and now the wine was gone ---- but the guests were not. It was every wedding planner's nightmare.

Apparently, the wedding guests had started to notice and whisper about the shortage. When Mary brought this to the attention of her son, Jesus did not immediately jump to the rescue. His reply to Mary surprises us a bit, perhaps. "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come."

Jesus is not refusing Mary's concern but is simply reminding her that his first loyalty is to his Heavenly Father. Only God could set his clock or sound his alarm. This obedience was the secret to his ability to delay gratification throughout his life, even to the point of laying down his own life.

So even when the urgent call to "do something" came, even from his beloved Mother, and even when it might help to avoid a faux pafs at this special moment at a wedding, Jesus' first thought was of his obedience to his God. Would that I could think so clearly in my own life when the "tyranny of the urgent" bombards me from day to day. What a difference it might make in my life if I could think clearly like this amid my daily turmoils.

But then, finally Jesus turned the water into wine. It was a miracle, no doubt, but John's Gospel calls it the first of many "signs" of Jesus. These signs from Jesus were epiphanies that manifested the hidden character of the Kingdom of God.

And so, when this miraculous wine was served, the head wine steward, unaware of Jesus' miracle, expressed his amazement as he blessed the bridegroom, thinking that this heavenly-tasting vintage had been saved for this final moment in the wedding by a wise and generous groom who "saved the best for last."

In fact, it was not the groom who practiced delayed gratification, but Jesus. And this sign pointed to the character of God, who often saves His best gifts to us for last too. God so loves us that He sometimes delays the answer to our prayers, knowing that we are not ready. God so loves us that He may even deny our requests, given our tendency to seek immediate gratification, because He wants to give us something so much more than we can even imagine or ask for now. God saves the best of earthly and heavenly gifts for last and serves them up with abundance. As some so often say, "The best is vet to come!"

SOCIAL CENTER

Last week was the Baptism of the Lord where the heavens opened and God announced Jesus to the people present, and this began Jesus' ministry. Gospel Reflection

Jesus started gathering His disciples, and they all went to the wedding feast. As we enter ordinary time, we go from the waters of baptism to the water at the Wedding Feast of Cana. Weddings in Jesus' time were large events lasting for several days with many meals, much wine, which the host was responsible to provide. What they would do to cut costs, is they would serve the "good" wine first and once the guests were happily festive, they would serve the sub-par wine with the hope that no one would notice. In this Gospel telling of the wedding feast, they ran out of wine, which is a major embarrassment to the hosting family. We hear of Mary first as she goes to Jesus telling Him of what has happened. Jesus' response was "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." This may appear to be Jesus almost scolding Mary for coming to Him, but it is not. Jesus had unconditional love and respect for His mother.

His answer to Mary's request was that if He performed a miracle, it would be one of His first public miracles and their lives would forever change. He was unsure if it was time for this to happen. Out of love and respect for His mother, and yes the term "woman" at that time was of respect, He immediately agreed to help. No one is certain if Mary knew what Jesus would do, but she told the servers to follow His instructions. They filled six stone water jars, which are used for ceremonial (spiritual) washings, with water. These water jars were made from solid stone with the belief that the stone kept the water pure. Jesus could have filled the previous wine casks with water, but chose the pure stone jars. Once filled with water, He then changed them to wine, had the headwaiter taste for approval, who was unaware of what happened. The headwaiter pronounced that they have saved the best wine for last, which resulted in very happy guests and the hosts were spared embarrassment. This is believed to be the first of His public miracles.

What does all this mean? What is the symbolism? One theme of this week's reading is love. Love in the actual marriage ceremony, which Jesus was in attendance. Love in Mary going to her Son. Love in Jesus' response to His mother's request. Growing love from His disciples as they witnessed and began believing in Him. Jesus loved us so much, He died for us and His blood, present in the wine, would purify our souls and wash away our sins. So much happened within this miracle; reflect on these events taking in all the interactions. How do those events occur now within you? God is good!

When did you first start to believe in God, beyond someone else telling you that God exists? What inspired that belief?

What signs confirm the reality of God for you today?


