

From Fr. Mike...

Speaking with couples who are engaged to be married, I often hear statements like "we can talk for hours on end..." and "we talk about everything..." and "we can even finish each other's sentences." I suspect what these couples are trying to say to me is that they have no problem with communication. That is a good thing. I suppose if there is ever a problem in their relationship, it will be resolved with communication. But the question I would like to ask-and don't because I was young at one time and know how difficult it can be to accomplish—how comfortable are folks with silence? Communication suggests engagement, interest, a desire to connect. I think we forget there are other forms of communication that are available to us, albeit, more subtle. A smile or frown or wink conveys information, being there when someone is in need, a gentle touch on the shoulder, a punch in the arm, give meaning. Sharing a meal is an age-old sign of unity. The word companion for instance, literally means "with bread" connoting a companion is one with whom I share bread. What is interesting is when we are thrown into a situation when we cannot use words (trying to make connections with people in a crowded, noisy room, communicating with an infant, or being in a country where the dominant language is one you cannot speak), we learn to communicate without words. Still, there is something about silence that can make us uncomfortable and awkward on the one hand, and respectful, peaceful, and deeply connected on the other. The question I wonder about is can we do that in our significant relationships? Can I be quiet, lost in my thoughts with another person without either of us feeling uncomfortable or

Trudging through Fr. Jim Martin's book <u>Learning to Pray: A Guide for Everyone</u>, Martin speaks about silence as a sign of one's developing friendship with God. For some of us cradle Catholics who learned to pray with our prayer books, rosaries, and novenas, Martin's insight can be a wee bit startling to us. For us Catholics, prayer is all about words and if you don't say them out loud, then you say them to yourself. And if your



prayer is "distracted," that is to say, if you say the prayers without fully focusing on the words you say, then you go to confession and confess it to a priest. For some of us, prayer is all about the words you say with the full engagement of the mind and will. It's a nice idea, but I don't think that is always possible or, according to the author, even necessary since there are many ways to communicate our love and devotion beyond the words we say.

More, and this is important, our own spiritual traditions have always found silence as an avenue to the sacred. There are some religious communities that take a "vow" of silence (though technically it is not a vow nor are they completely silent), but they certainly champion silence as one of the ways they become attuned to God. In convents and seminaries, there was grand silence after compline (night prayer) and before lauds (morning prayer). And there are silent retreats where people are not allowed to talk except for one-hour long periods with their retreat director. In these silent retreats, I would always get in trouble during mealtime. I can't explain it, but the grumbling of a stomach or the crunch and chop of food in the midst of an otherwise silent meal is hysterically funny to me. (And trust me, it is kind of embarrassing when a priest gets exiled from community meals because he is laughing too much.)

Silence is not an absence of a person or of vibrancy. Elijah found God in a soft whispering sound in 1 Kings 19: 11-13 which suggests that silence is one of the ways God manifests himself. Also, the beat of our heart and the blood flowing through our veins are all things done silently.

I also suspect that relationships mature in silence. I am reminded of the response of the Blessed Mother when the shepherds left the manger and when Simeon took Jesus into his arms and proclaimed him as a light to the nations that she held these things in her heart. It's also notable that Joseph, despite his significant role in the infancy Gospel, does not say a single word.

Finally, in our noise saturated world, silence in prayer leads to a greater intimacy with God. Psalm 46 tells us "Be still and know that I am God." Likewise, Jesus instructs us, "Whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Matthew 6:6). Private, silent prayer has the ability to open us up to a real conversation with God. Cardinal Sarah makes the point, "The Holy Spirit has no face and no speech. He is silent by His divine nature." It only makes sense we encounter that Divine Spirit in the very same way.

Just before Christmas, we loaded (overloaded) our cars and made deliveries to St. Pio Parish in Roseville and St. Isidore Parish in Macomb. On behalf of those parishes, we thank you for your thoughtfulness and love!





Best wishes to one and all for a happy, healthy, and blessed 2022. I remember last year at this time thinking 2021 will be the end of covid-19 and sadly, that has not been the case. I hope and pray that 2022 will be that year. We've suffered from this pandemic for 2 years now and it seems to keep morphing into various strains, much like the flu virus does. Hopefully 2022 will see covid disappear or at least become more manageable and less fatal.

We have our new video system installed and up and running. Much credit and thanks to those that were on the video team in the past, arriving at Mass early to set up and staying late to tear down. With our new system, things are easier with no setup required. You may have noticed (those coming to 4:30pm Mass) that there are no more tripods, extension cords, laptops, or microphones in the sanctuary. It's now interconnected: three new cameras with 360 degree coverage, and the sound system is connected directly to the system. The system control center is in a side room and everything is controlled from that center. One of our challenges for 2022 will be how to utilize this "state of the art" system for more than livestreaming Masses. I guess you could say St. Michael has caught up to the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Special thanks go out to Michelle Hayes and Rick Lopez. Their help and assistance in launching the Video Ministry and upgrading it to where we are at today, to put simply and plainly, could not have been done without them and, of course to Father Mike for approving the expenditure.

Not to scare anyone....but some dates to consider: Ash Wednesday is on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, April 14<sup>th</sup> is Holy Thursday, Good Friday is April 15<sup>th</sup>, Easter Vigil April 16<sup>th</sup>, and Easter Sunday on April 17<sup>th</sup>. As has become our tradition, we will be hosting a Lenten Bible Study and Communion Service on Thursday's in Lent, starting with Thursday, March 10th. We'll get you more information on that in successive issues (we may decide to move that up to a start date of March 3<sup>rd</sup>).
