From Fr. Mike...

I would like to wish everyone a blessed New Year. May 2022 bring prosperity and good health to all.

When I was looking through a few older writings of mine, I came across a reference to lying that made me think some more about how we think about it in our culture today. We used to think of it as a sin—it still is—but in our world with sharp political divides, false advertising, and shady businesses, lying is commonplace, normative. If seen as wrongdoing, it is treated as vanilla and unworthy of much consideration. A lie is an assertion that is not true but is deliberately used for the purpose of deceiving another party. For good reason it is considered wrong because it whittles away at our trust in one another, destroying relationships, and it has the habit of creating more complex webs of untruth. Before Shakespeare's MacBeth, Sir Walter Scott crafted the line "Oh what a tangled web we weave when at first we start to deceive." The effect of lying creates a tangled web of interactions that catches us like an insect caught in a spider's web. The more we try to get out of it, the more stuck we get. We are literally trapped by our own dishonesty.

I wonder if that doesn't describe us today?

When we think about how we talk about our lies, we see them as a wrong, but necessary

way to maintain civility or social decorum. We call them "white lies" even "little white lies" in contradistinction to big black ones that others make. Racial overtones noted, these "white lies" may preserve social decorum or avoid an argument and preserve the peace, but nevertheless, they are still falsehoods that are deliberately used to deceive others and, as such, they diminish our integrity and create an unnecessary complexity in our relationships.

The same can be said for blue lies. I didn't realize that there was a color spectrum to our lies, but blue lies are lies we tell others to gain social acceptance and approval from them. Among adolescents who seek approval from the "in" crowd. I think that blue lies would be more common since social acceptance among one's peers is extremely important in childhood development. But I am not sure that this is a behavior limited to adolescents. From politics to corporate culture, adults tell blue lies for the same purpose, to gain acceptance and respect from one's peer groups. Motive for fibbing doesn't justify our actions, nor does it mitigate the impact on our self esteem or social interactions. Being caught saying one thing and doing another is often based on blue lies we tell others.

I think it was Winston Churchill who said if you

have enemies, it means that you found something to stand for. He had his own enemies in his political circles who didn't believe the Nazi aggression on the continent was a big problem. My concern with blue lies, lying for the sake of social acceptance, is that values tend to collapse when people don't speak up. The Nazi empire and other dictatorships well documented in our time, show the same sad pattern of non-involvement.



Beyond the various motives for lying, there are terms for lying that soften the impact of our behavior. We bend the truth; we tell half-truths; we stretch the truth; we withhold information; we fabricate; embellish/embroider the truth; or simply tell your truth. These terms soften the impact of what we are really doing to ourselves and others. We are deliberately telling a falsehood (or at least something we don't know to be verifiably true) for the sake of deceiving another. Despite how we dress it up, it is still a lie, and it still does huge damage to our culture and to each respective person. And it is a sin.

Now as I look back at this, what I am seeing is that we are lying to ourselves about telling lies we tell. Scott's observation about the sticky entanglements of dishonesty appears to be in our culture, in our language, and in stories we use to dull and mollify our own wrongdoing. Honesty is the best policy, but we do not need to respond to every question or situation we encounter. Civility is still a virtue in my book, and I believe it can be maintained while also being honest at the same time.

It's worth a try, anyway.

The other two events were the coming of the Magi and the Wedding Feast at Cana. It's observed in the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican, or Episcopalian Church, as well as the Eastern Orthodox Church. Being born without the stain of original sin, do you really think it was necessary for Jesus to be baptized? I think not...but I believe that Jesus choose to be baptized to lead the way as an example for us to follow; like we hear in the words of a popular song "I go before you always." It's also a way for Jesus to identify with us on a human scale. The Baptism of the Lord also marks an end to the Christmas season and a return to "Ordinary Time" until Ash Wednesday.

I'd like to extend my sincere gratitude and thanks to all the former ushers and new volunteers that participated in the Masses over the holiday as "Ministers of Hospitality."
