4th Sunday of Lent

“DO YOU BELIEVE in the Son of Man?” Jesus wants to motivate each one of us to see the truth. After developing a relationship with Jesus, the blind man “sees” as someone very special. The Pharisees, due to the blindness caused by their ignorance, prejudice, and need for self-preservation, still remain blind. Presuppositions, prejudices, assumptions, and our needs can easily blind us to truth. We see what we want or need to see and not what is really there. In addition, our stubbornness continues to convince us that we are right and that our vision is perfect. Only God can complete the picture. Look around at our world. So much of what is happening today is due to the reluctance of folks to allow themselves to be stretched and brought to see what is really there. Many react to what life presents to them more with the lenses of ignorance than lenses of clarity. The Gospel carries great transformative value. With it, God corrects our vision and replaces our limited sight with the fullness of his sight. God opens our eyes so that we can see that it is not about preserving what we have created but of living in the immensity and wonder of God’s kingdom.

THROUGH A SIMPLE, loving relationship with God, we can break through the tethers of prejudice, eradicate fear, dispel the darkness of hatred and sin, discover freedom, live in peace, work for justice, be effective stewards of creation, assist the migrant and the immigrant, and safeguard our economic systems and policies so that they truly serve all of God’s children. What we see is often an artificial lie. Our truth is much bigger than what our limited sight believes it to be. Allow God to work in and through you. Do not be afraid. Be open and be humble enough to know that you need help. Many human beings are living with severe cataracts that produce sight that is at best blurred. Are you one of them?

FAITH FORMATION



SAINT PATRICK WAS born in England, but when he was a teenager, he was captured by Irish pirates who took him to Ireland as a slave. After six years, Saint Patrick escaped and returned to England and his family. When Saint Patrick became a priest, he traveled back to Ireland as a missionary so that he could teach the people about God. He used examples to explain the mysteries of the faith in simple ways. One day, Saint Patrick compared the Trinity to a shamrock. He said that the shamrock has three leaves, but it is only one plant. In the same way, God is three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—but one God. God used Saint Patrick's kidnapping to convert the Irish people. In our lives, God uses the bad times to bring about a good we do not always see. We must be patient and trust Him.



#19 CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING: UNDERSTANDING AND RESPONSE

The call to work for social justice in the Catholic Church comes from Sacred Scripture and church documents that invite Catholics to bring about Christ's mission. GOSPEL WEEKLIES EUCHARISTIC MINUTE



In the Eucharist Christ gives us the very body which he gave up for us on the cross, the very blood which he 'poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.'

—Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1365

All the way back in the Book of Genesis when Adam and Eve committed the first sin, God promised to send someone who would restore humankind to friendship with God. We believe that someone is Jesus, the Son of God and Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, who became one of us.

When Jesus comes, he does not sin at any time during his life. But he still dies the death of a criminal on the Cross. If we are honest, it is we who deserve the punishment for sin. But it took the perfect man, who was also God, to pay the price for our sins. It is Jesus' very Body, now glorified in Heaven, which we receive in Holy Communion.



Family Fun—Flashlight Tag

To remember that Jesus is the light shining in the darkness, play a game of flashlight tag tonight. When it starts to get dark, select one person to be "it." The person who is "it" gets a flashlight and counts to 50 with their eyes closed. While they are counting, everyone else hides. When the person is finished counting, they have to find others by shining the flashlight on them. The next person who becomes "it" is either the first or the last person found.

PRAYER QUILT MINISTRY

HOW DOES A QUILT that has been put together become a PRAYER QUILT?



SOMEONE (THE SPONSOR) asks a friend who is hurting if they would like a prayer quilt.

IF THE FRIEND says "yes" the sponsor requests a prayer quilt for them from the Prayer Quilt Ministry or from the parish office.

THE PRAYER QUILT Ministry selects a prepared quilt and presents it for prayers and tying on a table in the church hall or courtyard lobby.

MANY WOMEN, CHILDREN and men say a prayer for the recipient and tie their prayer into a knot made with the ends of the heavy thread already on the quilt.

THE PRAYER QUILT Ministry gives the Prayer Quilt to the sponsor.

THE SPONSOR PRESENTS the Prayer Quilt to the hurting friend and prays with her for relief.

FOUR EXCUSES THAT COULD KEEP US SPIRITUALLY IMMATURE

Do you feel spiritually alive? Do you feel close to God and obedient to your calling? Can you pinpoint your active role in helping in the mission of the church to be salt and light?

It's good to remember that faith grows and matures by living it out - by **doing something with it**. You can't cram spiritual maturity. You don't just wait and wait until you feel like you are ready. You pause, **trust God**, stay connected to the vine and literally jump in!

I once heard someone say, "You can't make disciples if you're making excuses." There are a few age-old barriers that get in the way of responding to God's call. These things will keep you small spiritually. Here are some of those age old excuses:

I'm Too Old Abraham fell face down; he laughed and said to himself, "Will a son be born to a man a hundred years old? Will Sarah bear a child at the age of ninety?" Genesis 17:17

There's Probably Someone Better Than Me For The Job But Moses protested again, "What if they won't believe me or listen to me? What if they say, 'The Lord never appeared to you?'" Exodus 4:1 Moses said to the LORD, "Pardon your servant, Lord. I have never been eloquent, neither in the past nor since You have spoken to Your servant. I am slow of speech and tongue." Exodus 4:10

What If I Fail?

Zechariah said to the angel, "How can I be sure this will happen?" Then the angel said, "I am Gabriel! I stand in the very presence of God. It was He who sent me to bring you this good news! But now, since you didn't believe what I said, you will be silent and unable to speak until the child is born." Luke 1:18-19 But Peter said to Him, "Even though all may fall away because of You, I will never fall away." Jesus said to him, "Truly I say to you that this very night, before a rooster crows, you will deny Me three times." Peter said to Him, "Even if I have to die with You, I will not deny You." All the disciples said the same thing too. Matt. 26:33-35

I'm Scared "But Lord," exclaimed Ananias, "I've heard many people talk about the terrible things this man has done to the believers in Jerusalem! And he is authorized by the leading priests to arrest everyone who calls upon Your name." Acts 9:13-14 But Jonah got up to run away from the Lord by going to Tarshish. He went to the city of Joppa, where he found a ship that was going to the city of Tarshish. Jonah paid for the trip and went aboard, planning to go to Tarshish to run away from the Lord. Jonah 1:3

Spiritually mature Christians push beyond these insecurities and put their trust in God. In fact, it may be that you must push beyond your comfort zone to grow and become spiritually mature. Confidence to follow God must come from a confidence in God. **We will never be "ready" without taking the first step.** God provides what is needed as the journey goes along. Sometimes, we place such limitations on ourselves (or what we perceive others think about us) that we really believe God can't use us.

ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE WITH GOD. He makes much out of little. In each of these scripture passages listed above, God did amazing things! No more excuses. God is calling... **GO NOW.** The church needs people who are spiritually alive, connected to the vine and growing in faith as they venture out, serving Jesus!

WALK TO CALVARY

STATIONS OF THE CROSS



“FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD THAT HE GAVE HIS ONLY BEGOTTEN SON, SO THAT EVERYONE THAT BELIEVES IN HIM MIGHT NOT PERISH, BUT HAVE EVERLASTING LIFE.”

THE WAY OF the Cross is a meditative prayer of the final hours of Christ’s life. We witness Christ’s Suffering in His Passion, born out of love for us. God saved us through Jesus’ death and resurrection---- therein lies the spiritual value of the Stations of the Cross. Jesus was put to death in flesh and brought to life in the spirit.

IT IS BELIEVED that the earliest Christians marked the Way of the Cross from the very beginning, visiting the sites of the Passion. Pilgrims from other countries would come to Jerusalem to visit these sites and meditate on Jesus’ suffering as they walked from the Garden of Gethsemane to Calvary. Those who couldn’t visit Jerusalem built replicas of these holy places in their own countries. In 1217, the Franciscans began their presence in the Holy Land and in 1342, these places were entrusted to them. It is likely that the present form of the stations with indulgences attached, can be traced to this time period. Tradition tells us that the practice of remembering the stations as a devotion in a chapel began with St. Francis of Assisi. It then spread to churches throughout the world. Pictures or statues were put up to remind them of the scenes of Jesus’ Passion. Praying the fourteen stations requires only a meditative walk from one to the next or sitting in the pew while contemplating the Stations. No formal or specific prayer is required, although many have been written. The gospel accounts are excellent guides. Many forms for praying the Stations are available.

WE ARE TRULY blest this year, not only with our long awaited and prayed for Crucifix displayed in the Sanctuary above the altar (a writing for another day), but also to have the traditional images of the Stations of the Cross on the walls of the Church, beneath the stained-glass windows. For years, some of us have prayed these complicated, but beautiful images, with the aid of explanatory booklets. Also, on the Fridays during Lent, our Priest will lead us in praying the Stations. They are also live-streamed for those who are unable to attend.

WALKING IN THE footsteps of Jesus can be a guide for us in our prayer and exercise devotion for Lent. As we walk (exercise, play in sports, clean house, etc.), pray and offer it all to Jesus. Twenty minutes of exercise equals one mile. Please jot down all those miles and place them in the box by the map in the garden lobby or contact the church with them. Feeling any stronger spiritually and physically since we began our journey? May Jesus be your Guide as you walk with Him. At this time, we have 1,634 miles. Just keep moving and offering, we have a long way to go.




