


The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary & Joseph

Eucharist Adoration occurs every Tuesday & Friday from 3:30 PM until 6:00 PM (7:00 PM on 1st Friday) and every Thursday from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM except as noted above. The sacrament of Reconciliation is offered 30 minutes before Mass on Thursday & Friday and at 3:00 PM on Saturday.

The Family, the Domestic Church

I began Advent giving the dates for the Christmas season. We are in the midst of that season until January 9. In the secular world, Christmas has ended. For us believers, our Christmas joy has just begun.

The Church on the Sunday following the Nativity of the Lord celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. I just alluded to our faith being countercultural. The world is always trying to find something new because it is reaching for something other than Christ. It tries to redefine marriage. It tries to redefine the family. Our faith is in Jesus Christ, who "is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Heb. 13:8). It follows that the teachings of Christ as articulated through his Bride, the Church do not change.

That God chose to be born into a family, that the Father entrusted Joseph to be the earthly father of Jesus, and that Jesus advances in wisdom and age speaks volumes of the importance of the family. Jesus could have come into the world in another manner of his choosing. His obedience to Mary and Joseph demonstrates the importance of family life and how special your family is to him. One of my favorite readings is the reflection of Pope St. Paul VI on the Holy Family:

The home of Nazareth is the school where we begin to understand the life of Jesus - the school of the Gospel. First, then, a lesson of silence. May esteem for silence, that admirable and indispensable condition of mind, revive in us... A lesson on family life. May Nazareth teach us what family life is, its communion of love, its austere and simple beauty, and its sacred and inviolable character... A lesson of work. Nazareth, home of the "Carpenter's Son", in you I would choose to understand and proclaim the severe and redeeming law of human work...

One of our very good traditions is to display a nativity scene. Keep the one in your home up until the Christmas season concludes. The world will quickly return to its busyness and frenetic pace. Every time you pass by Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, think of the words of Paul VI. Allow the Holy Family to speak to your family. Realize that we are not alone in our struggles and they are helping us. The stories of Christmas remind us that a life of grace is often not easy, but with God we discover something beautiful. Our catechism tells us that "believing families are of primary importance as centers of living, radiant faith." I pray that for you.

As I mention prayer, allow me to return to something that I have not mentioned in a while. Next week, we will give out that prayer card that you can say yourself, asking for a blessing upon your home. Remember that there is an annual blessing of families in their homes, and there is a special form of this blessing during the Christmas season. I have an obligation to visit you! There is even a blessing for those who are confined to their home. Yes, I am willing to pop in even for a quick blessing. Just call and let me know the time. Sometimes the first time I get to visit someone in the home is for the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Let's not wait that long!

Remember St. Isaac Jogues at Christmas

What do you possess that you have not received (1 Cor. 4:7)? St. Paul challenges the Corinthians, and he challenges us today with this question. I am tempted at times to pat myself on the back. God, look at the things I have done for you. I forget that God is the initiator. He has given me everything that I have. He is the one that has sought me out and not vice versa. Anything I do is a response to what he has already given me.

Christmas is a time of giving because we remember the supreme gift that God has given to us, the gift of his Son, “now in flesh appearing” as the carol teaches. We are also remembering that one day he will come and bring us to the Father. Consequently, we look to God as our example, and we give. We give to our families and friends. We give to those who are less fortunate than us.

St. Isaac Jogues is part of your family. In this time of attending to many things it is worthy of a little reminder to help you remember your parish family at Christmas. That is part of our response to God. We give our time (our prayer and our learning about the faith), our talent (giving our expertise or what we are good at), and our treasure (our monetary contributions).

Here is a little update on what your contributions have done. We have had flooding in St. Angela Hall, and earlier in the year, the rain really tested us. You will notice the work to the concrete. There was also work downstairs. The result was with recent rain, there was no water in our hall or in our storage rooms! Hopefully, that full-color flyer that we distributed has demonstrated many other good things occurring here. In other words, we are moving forward because of your generosity.

If you refer to that report, you will see that our Christmas collection totaled \$48,484 last year. Thank you. That is a generous number for a tough year. We appreciate your sacrifice. That was \$6500 below what we budgeted for the Christmas collection. This year we budgeted \$50,000 for the Christmas collection. We are trying to be realistic. What we budget for the offertory tells us how much we can spend, which means we have had to cut back. It is good to stretch for a goal so that more good work can be done. Please remember the collection is not subject to the 7% assessment by the Archdiocese; it all stays with St. Isaac Jogues. (If you are wondering, canon law gives the diocesan bishop the right to impose a moderate tax for the needs of the diocese.)

Many of you are always generous at Christmas. We ask that you continue that generosity, knowing that you are giving to a great cause. Look around you. We need to ensure a solid future for our parish. Our gifts and our continued help accomplish this.

Again, please do not forget St. Isaac Jogues at Christmas and prayerfully consider your donation to the Christmas Offertory collection for 2021.

May the Peace of Christ be with you this Christmas season.

They worshiped as a family, and with their faith community. And they did so faithfully.



We can take their example to heart by making Sunday Mass attendance a priority for our families, by making prayer with our family a priority every day, by making sure that we regularly celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and by observing in our family life the feasts and fasts appropriate to the liturgical calendar. When we, as families, prioritize our Time with God and worship of Him we will be imitating the Holy Family. On this Feast of the Holy Family, let us reclaim the beauty and importance of family life. Let's commit to steward our families well in 2022, making time spent with God and practicing our faith the most important appointments on our family calendars.




Community Sunday/Winter Sports Mass






One Faith, One Family

You need not be a biological mother who has carried a child in her womb to be a mother


in spirit. Who in your world needs you to love them with the heart of a mother?
