

Phoenix Fun

This time, I was writing this article in Sky Harbor Airport. How times have changed since the last time I was here. Actually, the last time I left Phoenix in 2012, I missed my flight. It was the fault of the airlines, so they wound up compensating me for my trip. God is good. I figure I will share some highlights from this trip that you would find interesting.

Recall that my friends Ralph and Marcela invited me to celebrate their 25th anniversary with them. I met Marcela's dad. He told me that his uncle was famous. His uncle is Archbishop Juan Navarrete y Guerrero, and indeed you can find stories about the archbishop online. He told

me his uncle was exiled to Arizona during the anti-Catholic persecution in Mexico. Archbishop Navarrete joined the Cristero Movement, and when he was able to return in 1937, he did wonderful things to restore the faith that was deprived to his people. It is a reminder to keep praying for religious freedom.

Marcela's brother told me his wife is a reporter. Early in her career, everyone was assigned to cover St. Teresa of Calcutta when she visited. Because she had little seniority, she was assigned to the prison in case Mother visited. If you guessed that is the first place and the place that St. Teresa spent the whole day, you are correct. Here is a little anecdote that I caught. A wonderful meal was



prepared; however, if you are familiar with the life of St. Teresa you know that she eschewed any meal that could be deemed extravagant because of her close identity with the poor. True to character, St. Teresa constantly prayed the Rosary and did not touch the food.

My friends Kelly and Ryan invited me to accompany their family to the Arizona for Life March and Rally. They have five children. The March for Life in Washington just happened on Friday. I figure this is a good reminder to keep praying for life.

When I lived in Phoenix, I belonged to two young adult groups. That is how I met Fr. Paul Sullivan, but he was just Paul Sullivan back then. Watching him discern and apply to seminary motivated me. You probably did not know I applied first to the Diocese of Phoenix, but I discerned my vocation was here, home in the Archdiocese of Detroit. Fr. Paul was the vocations director, and his parish was Sacred Heart. (Father just got a new assignment when I was there!) In 1983, the neighborhood around Sacred Heart was leveled because of its proximity to the airport. It has been a battle since then, but recently through Father's hard work, he was able to save the old church that the city was trying to demolish. Go, Fr. Paul! I am proud of him. January 23, 2022 — Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's Second Reading, from St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, sends the message that we are each unique in the gifts and talents God has given to us, and therefore, we all have different tasks to fulfill as members of the Body of Christ. What is further developed is the truth that, though different in our roles, every single individual is equally important and needed in the Church, from the freshly baptized newborn to the teenager sitting reluctantly by his parents, to the elderly shut-in who can no longer attend Sunday Mass. "God placed the parts, each one of them, in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be? But as it is there are many parts, yet one body." (1 COR 12:18-20).

What does this teach us as Christian stewards? It shows us that we all have equal dignity and worth in God's sight, and that if God sees us as equally precious, we should view each other in this same light. It teaches us to humbly recognize our own gifts as well as the giftedness of every member of our parish family. And, while God designed us to be ultimately dependent on Him, it seems He has also designed us to need each other! This is part of the beauty and richness of a stewardship way of life. No one person can "do it all" in life; whether in family life or parish life. But God does not ask us to do it all. He simply asks us to share the gifts and talents we do have.

And just what are we, as Christian stewards, aiming to achieve by sharing our gifts and talents? We are aiming to follow in the footsteps of our Lord, furthering with His grace the mission He began 2,000 years ago. He declares in the Gospel reading from St. Luke today what this mission is: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free...."

What a noble purpose! What great dignity has been bestowed upon us, modern-day disciples, that we are called to this same task. In the week ahead, let's take this mission to heart, examining the way we can use our gifts and talents for this mission and asking ourselves what it looks like in our unique circumstances to "bring glad tidings to the poor," "liberty to captives," "sight to the blind" and "freedom to the oppressed." The good news it you don't have to do it all by yourselves. Do your part, let your brothers and sisters in the Body of Christ do theirs, and know that the Spirit of the Lord is upon us all as we live out this stewardship way of life.

Archdiocesan grade school enrollment up 11% this year, 7% since start of pandemic

The number of students enrolled in archifecean Cartholic grade schools continues to rise compared to pre-pandemic enrollment, according to enrollment figures reported by the Archifecesse of Detroit. Student enrollment has increased 7 percent across archifecesan grade schools over the past two school years and is up 11 percent since last year, Laura Knaus, interim superintendent of Cartholic schools, told Detroit Catholics. The data was collected by the archifecesan Department of Catholic School this fall and submitted to the National Catholic Educational Association.

Catholic, pro-life leaders decry petition to enshrine abortion in Michigan constitution



Catholic and pro-life leaders in Michigan expressed disappointment at the news a coalition of abortion rights supporters are planning a petition drive to enabrine abortion access in the state constitution. The coalition, which includes Reproductive Freedom for All, the American Civil Liberties Union of Michigan, Planned Parenthood of Michigan and Michigan Voices, was set to file language with the Michigan Bord of State Camswares that would amend the Michigan Constitution to "explicitly affirm" abortion rights. The proposed amendment would override Michigan's 1931 Isan on abortion.




St. Angela Merici was an Italian religious educator, who is honored as a saint by the Roman Catholic Church. She founded the Company of St. Ursula in 1535 in Brescia, in which women dedicated their lives to the service of the Church through the education of girls. From this organisation later sprang the monastic Order of Ursulines, whose nuns established places of prayer and learning throughout Europe and, later, worldwide, most notably in North America.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

One of the most famous members of the Dominican Order, St. Thomas Aquinas (1225 -1274) is well-known by many for his theological work, "The Summa Theologiae." Born in Italy, his mother wanted him to become a Benedictine and had high hopes that he would eventually become abbot of Monte Cassino, where he spent much of his youth. To change his vocation, she had him kidnapped by his brothers on his way to Paris at the age of 19. He spent two years in their captivity. Despite this, nothing could shake him from his vocation to become a Dominican priest and he was eventually released. Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, encompasses his writings. The Summa Theologiae, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology.

The patron saint of teachers, theologians and students, St. Thomas Aquinas died in 1274. His life and the impact he had on the whole Church, however, remains alive today.

A Few Music Notes!

Music at Mass is one of the most debated topics. Everyone has a personal opinion, their biases about music genres, and of course, favorite hymns. Personally, music can be the element that draws me into the Liturgy, or it can prevent me from focusing on prayer. So where is the balance?

I have been involved in music ministry from a very young age. This includes the anxiety of choosing appropriate hymns for different parts of the Mass. There are many factors that go into our choices. But luckily, the Church provides us with some guidelines that help us glorify God in the best way possible through using our musical talents. In the next few weeks, we will explore these guidelines.

1. Music should be holy.

This means that music used in the Mass should correspond with the part of the Liturgy when it is sung. An easy one is our Gathering hymn (Entrance or processional) which should invite our community to the table of our Lord. You wouldn't want to sing "Go Make of All Disciples" at the beginning of Mass which is about Jesus sending us out to be disciples!

Another example is during Communion. The first hymn should reflect our Eucharistic theology. This is "The Eucharist is the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, who is really and substantially present under the appearances of bread and wine." Our hymn should reflect these beliefs. As our communion procession is quite long, we are also allowed the leniency to reflect on unity with Christ, or the feast day, or during Easter, a song about the resurrection.

We are very fortunate that for over 2000+ years, our Church has given us a huge selection of beautiful music to choose from. Some are great for parts of Mass, others can be used for other services, like Night Fire.






