

This is Catholic Schools Week

I was interested in what Archbishop Vigneron had to say on the latest episode of his Eye's on Jesus podcast. I recommend listening, and this episode is dedicated to Catholic schools. He gave some interesting facts. It was St. Elizabeth Ann Seton who established the first parochial Catholic school in this country. There had been Catholic schools prior, but they were operated by religious orders. Also, he notes that in 1884 at the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore, our bishops decreed that every parish would have a Catholic school. Think of how many nearby parishes used to have its own school.

I guess my "first assignment" was at a parish with a Catholic school. In seminary we interned at a parish for eight months. Before I was a St. Isaac Jogues Charger, I was a St. Damian Charger. As a deacon I was at Immaculate Conception (Bishop Kelley). Newly ordained, I went to Our Lady of Sorrows, and St. Hugo and St. Joseph all have schools.

I love children. At some point, I deemed the candy I get from you goes to them. When I walk into the school, I get asked "Father, what's the question?" If they can get right what is on my mind, they win the prize for that day. Then, each Thursday I go to each classroom and bless the students. So many people come to me with excitement to tell me they once went to St. Isaac Jogues. They talk over and over about Fr. DesLongchamps. My mom used to have story after story about Fr. Ulenberg. My hope is that as pastor, I may pass on some lifelong gift to them.

When I bless the classrooms, I ask God that through these subjects to teach our children some truth about him. Archbishop Vigneron used the example that when we teach Chemistry, it is the same Chemistry that is taught in every school, but in our schools, we can make reference to the Creator. Our students learn explicitly throughout the day that everything in our world teaches us about our eternal life with God.

In a meeting earlier this week, Sr. Maria Guadalupe noted that we had 189 students last year. I think that number of students is now 222. Perhaps you saw the Detroit Catholic article that enrollment in Catholic schools across the archdiocese is up 7%, and it makes me smile to think about how many families will complete their journey into the Catholic faith at the Easter Vigil this year.

Thank you for the support you have given to our school over the years. Traditionally, it is a sacrifice for a parish to have its own school. With the uptick and changes over the past few years, it turns out that our school is self-sufficient. That has come through much hard work and sacrifice. I thank you ahead of time because contributions will fix our parking lot, which will provide safety, and CSA contributions come back to our school in varied ways.

I thank our sisters. We have a privilege that I do not know of any other grade schools having in the archdiocese. They are such an example to us of Christian values and giving our life to the Lord. I certainly learn from them, and I know the impression that they leave with our young people. Pray for our school. We are doing a really good thing here, and I think this is a good week to recognize good things that God is doing through our own hands.

January 30, 2022 — Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, before you were born, I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you." These ancient words in our First Reading from the Book of Jeremiah are meant for each one of us reflecting on them today! God has given us, His children, a purpose, and mission to fulfill while we are here on this earth. Embracing Stewardship as a way of life helps us to both find and fulfill the unique mission that God has in mind for each one of us. How? Stewardship helps us to continuously evaluate all areas of daily life. It calls us first to come to an awareness of the specific gifts God has given us in each area. Once we have been awakened to the particular ways in which God has blessed us, we can set about putting those gifts to the best possible use for the advancement of His Kingdom. While every baptized Christian is called to this universal mission, God has in mind a unique way for each one of us to carry it out. We need to ask ourselves if our daily use of the Time, Talent, and Treasure God has given us aligns with this mission in the individual circumstances of our lives right now.

But what is the real measuring stick in each of these areas? Is it the number of Rosaries I can recite in a given week? The number of ministries in which I am involved? The amount of money I give in the weekly offering? How can I tell if I am fulfilling God's mission for my life? It is not the numbers themselves that please our Lord. Rather, as St. Paul tells us in the Second Reading today, the "measure" is the love that we put into the Time, Talent and Treasure we offer Him in grateful return. "If I have all faith so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away everything I own and hand my body over so that I may boast but do not have love, I gain nothing." God is not after a particular number. What He wants us to give over to Him is our very selves.

Real love is not a sentiment. Real love is manifested in living a virtuous life. We read later in St. Paul's letter that real love takes strength: it is patient, kind, humble, other-centered, truth-seeking, and long-suffering. Love is the heroic giving of oneself even when it is uncomfortable; especially then. Love looks like Jesus. Love lives like Jesus. Sometimes, perhaps oftentimes, living like Jesus is difficult. We see this in the Gospel Reading today where we find Jesus in action, preaching in the synagogue in His hometown. He speaks truth to the people He loves, the ones He grew up with and shared His early days with. How do they respond? They are filled with fury and run Him out of town, intent on throwing Him from a cliff! Yet Jesus is undeterred. He passes right through them and presses forward with the mission His Father has entrusted to Him. We are called to live with this same strength and determination, fueled by the power of love and by gratitude for all God has given us.




St. Blaise | February 3

You may be familiar with the annual "blessing of throats" that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life.


History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions, and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:

Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. ©LPi



Kathleen Wilson, coordinator of pro-life ministries for the Archdiocese of Detroit explains, "Online, we have a list of 17 wonderful outreach, evangelical charity service projects young people or families could do to defend the vulnerable, to be in solidarity with the unborn, to reach out to moms in need." Even if Roe is overturned, Wilson said, it is incumbent on pro-life advocates to do more than just attend the March for Life.

"Being pro-life is not about joining a movement or being part of a political event; it's part of our baptismal call to live a consistent life ethic, and this is a beautiful opportunity as we commemorate those vulnerable who have lost their lives," Wilson said. "This is a chance to reexamine our own witness to the sanctity of life, beginning with our own, recognizing our own identity as a beloved son and daughter of God."

As the Archdiocese of Detroit transitions to Families of Parishes, each family is being asked to bolster its resources available to help mothers and expectant moms, said Chris Leach, director of evangelical charity for the Archdiocese of Detroit. The archdiocese and its parishes also are participating in the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' "Walking with Moms in Need" initiative.

...Continuing with music!

Last week we explored our first guideline to choosing music for worship, "Music should be holy." We also acknowledged the fact that everyone has their personal opinions, music genre biases, and favorites. This week we will explore our second principle:

2. Music should be beautiful.

Once again, this sounds simple, but it can cause much disagreement because everyone has a different definition of beautiful Liturgical music. Some of us love Gregorian chant, others prefer "traditional" hymns with easy melodies, some like music they were familiar with growing up in the Church, and still others would like more modern praise and worship music.

Wow! That's a lot to choose from! The basic truth is that <u>all</u> these types of music are beautiful. As a music minister, I find that there will always be the one person who doesn't like our hymn choices. But whatever the music is, there is one common thread for us to be assured: Jesus always shows up and Mass is still Mass. My job is to glorify God and lead the community in praising Him. I hope you'll continue to be part of our worship!

Some other "helpful hints" include: 1. The hymn needs to fit the part of the Liturgy when it will be sung. 2. The music should be suited to the group Singing it. 3. It needs to be within the talents of the musician (not distracting accompaniment). But most importantly (at least to me), it should be able to be sung by the whole church community.

Music at Mass is not a performance. Music at Mass is a shared form of worship. Music at Mass should be straightforward to the abilities of most people in our congregation. And that, my friends means, no matter what your ability, God wants to hear you sing. Young, old, man, woman, child, youth. The collective congregation has the most beautiful sound ever! Take it from me, I hear you! I love your singing; God does too!

My last thought on "Music should be beautiful" is about instruments. Some parishioners prefer organ, some like piano, others enjoy guitar, and still others enjoy adding instruments such as woodwinds, brass or percussion, too. Since we are praising God, it shouldn't matter what instruments we use. Remember Psalm 150? "Praise him with the sound of the trumpet: with the psaltery and harp. Praise him with the timbrel and dance: praise him with stringed instruments and organs." God loves it all!




