




2ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine."

JOHN 2:1-3



With the readings this weekend at Mass, we take a short diversion into the Gospel of John prior to returning to Luke's narrative of the Gospel next weekend. This short diversion into John features one of the best known stories of the Gospel, but one which only occurs in John's narrative: the changing of the water into wine at the Wedding Feast of Cana.

There is an interesting tradition that surrounds this great mystery (so great a mystery, that Pope St. John Paul II included this singular event as one of the five Luminous Mysteries of the Most Holy Rosary!) Tradition tells us that three events happened on the same day in different years: the visit of the Magi during the Infancy Narratives in Matthew's account of the

Gospel, the Baptism of the Lord by John in the Jordan River, and this event where Jesus turns a huge amount of water into the best type of wine available. All of these events were tied together in the traditional celebrations of the Epiphany, because they are all manifestations of the divinity of Jesus through His humanity.

As we look at this particular event this weekend, one thing that always strikes the reader is the conversation between Jesus and Mary. It almost sounds that Jesus is being dismissive of His Blessed Mother in His initial response to her: 'Woman, how does your concern affect me?'

That initial declaration of 'Woman!' is not dismissive, but is rather a 'normal, polite form of address,' as a comment in the Revised New American Bible attests. It seems that Mary knows something that He doesn't yet, or perhaps, better, she intuits something: 'You have your disciples now, it is time for your work to begin.' And what a marvelous work He does: turning roughly 150 gallons of water into the finest of wines!

By doing so, He, again, manifests His divinity through His humanity. He manifests that He does not desire us to have the so-so; but the best. And lots of it, too!

This manifestation of His divinity through His humanity, even here at the very start of His public ministry, is why this event is connected with the Epiphany: everything celebrated that day is a way of recognizing that Jesus is the Revelation of the Father, He is the fullness of the Godhead who has come to dwell with us and restore us to a place of greater prominence.

This is what unfolds over the pages of the Gospel and what we are invited into throughout the Gospel. The Gospels start in such a way so that we can know where we are going: into a deeper, more powerful relationship with the God who created, sustains and redeems us. Daily.

What a beautiful gift this is and what a wonderful thing to continue to celebrate, together, as we enter this new year.
