

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR



Just as we have been living through a year "like no other" because of the Coronavirus, we are about to celebrate a Presidential Inauguration "like no other". How appropriate for all of us to pray for a peaceful transition of power as we have been privileged to experience for several centuries in this country. Since even our currency includes the motto "In God We Trust", it is necessary to put those words into practice and pray the events of 6 January will not be repeated and we can look forward to a continuity in government and in our national life as well. It is good to pray for all involved, those elected and those not, and those entrusted with various aspects of our national life: the legislators, the planners, the law enforcement personnel and all those who have the mission of keeping things safe and orderly for the sake of all. We all love our country and all that has gone into making it possible for us to live here.

As we return to "Ordinary Time" for a few weeks between the end of the Christmas Season and the beginning of Lent, we are reminded that "Ordinary" in this usage simply implies that we are in the "counted weeks of the year" marked by *ordinal* numbers. So here, "ordinary" has no relation to "commonplace" or "usual." A lot of wonderful things happen in "ordinary" time as we continue to experience more and more aspects of Jesus, knowing that we could never exhaust learning about the one who is the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. In the first reading this week-end, the person of Samuel is presented to us as a young boy who is having his first encounter with the Lord, whom he at first does not recognize. But the Lord, ever patient that He is, calls him several times until Samuel's mentor realizes what is happening and tells him that the next time he hears the call, to answer, "speak Lord, for your servant is listening." This begins Samuel's long relationship with the Lord. The patience and kindness of God is shown so tenderly in that episode, and it is something you and I can count on as well! The Gospel reading has a similar kindness about it. Here John the Baptist speaks in glowing terms of Jesus as the "Lamb of God," John's followers take that as a cue to begin to follow Jesus, and Jesus receives them very graciously. Maybe this is the cue for our year to come: respond to the call to follow Jesus. We know that this is something we are all called to do and that call comes to us in different ways, but answering the call is so essential. We know that God never forces us. He invites, He calls, He waits. Perhaps putting the response of Samuel on our own lips would be a good prayer to characterize this coming year: "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening!"

50+ COMMUNITY Today's readings find Andrew introducing Simon (Peter) to Jesus. They were "called", called by name to a life of service, to use their God-given gifts for others. Everyone is called by God to do something for others and so are we. This story tells us how: One day, St. Francis of Assisi invited one of the young monks to join him on a trip into town to preach. The young friar was honored at the invitation and quickly accepted. On their way, they stopped in a field and helped the farmer load hay onto a cart. They continued into town where Francis lifted a bucket of water from the well for an old woman and carried it home for her. All day long he and Francis walked through the streets and rubbed shoulders with hundreds of people. Each time they stopped, the monk was sure that Francis would stop and preach. But no words came from his mouth. Finally, they went into the church, but Francis only knelt silently to pray. At the end of the day, the two headed back home. Not once had Francis addressed a crowd, nor had he talked to anyone about the Gospel. The monk was disappointed, and he said to Francis, "I thought we were going into town to preach?" St Francis responded, "we have preached. We were preaching while we were walking and in everything we did. We were seen by many and our behavior was closely watched. It's no use to walk anywhere to preach unless we preach everywhere we walk. Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words only if necessary."

Notes from the Blue Army: Brother Andre continues to provide insight into the life of St. Joseph. He writes, "When we picture Mary at the foot of the Cross, we see her there with John, not Joseph. Why? God had appointed Saint Joseph the protector of the Holy Family. He had also appointed His Son to die for the salvation of man. In a sense, these two vocations were at variance. Saint Joseph had fulfilled his job perfectly, sinlessly. But it was necessary for God the Father to bring him to Abraham's bosom to announce the good news there, else, Joseph would have had to protect Jesus from the Jews and Romans, and that could not be. Thus, with Jesus and Mary at his side, the Protector and Provider for the Holy Family became also the patron of a holy death. But Saint Joseph did have a part to play in the Passion. As Jesus' father, he had the great duty of forming the human virtues of the Son of God. Radical as it sounds, this is theologically correct given what we know of Our Lord's human knowledge - the acquired knowledge. Saint Paul says in Hebrews that Jesus "... learned obedience through the things he suffered." Paul's disciple, Saint Luke, tells us that after Jesus was found in the temple, He "... advanced in wisdom, and age, and grace with God and men." Saint Joseph was His teacher. Our Lord's practice of manly virtue was built upon the example of this hard-working carpenter. May Saint Joseph and his Holy Spouse protect and provide for you."

Dioceses across country to participate in nationwide Prayer Vigil for Life Jan. 28-29

Catholics across the country are encouraged to observe a nationwide prayer vigil from Thursday, January 28 to Friday, January 29, marking the 48th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v.*

Bolton decisions legalizing abortion through nine months of pregnancy. Since those decisions, more than 60 million abortions have been performed legally in the United States.

Each January, the National Prayer Vigil for Life is hosted by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Pro-Life Secretariat, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and The Catholic University of America's Office of Campus Ministry to pray for an end to abortion and a greater respect for all human life.

Typically, thousands of pilgrims attend the vigil in person each year. However, because of the Coronavirus pandemic, the basilica will not be open to the public for the 2021 vigil. In response, this year – for the first time -- in addition to the televised Mass, bishops in dioceses across the country will be taking turns leading livestreamed holy hours every hour on the hour throughout the all-night vigil.

The vigil will begin with a live broadcast at 8 p.m. January 28 from the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. with a rosary, followed by Mass opening the National Prayer Vigil for Life. The principal celebrant and homilist for the opening Mass will be Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City in Kansas, who is chairman of the USCCB Committee on Pro-Life Activities. After the Mass and throughout the night, holy hours led by bishops from various dioceses around the country will be broadcast on the USCCB's website. The vigil concludes at 8 a.m. January 29 with Mass celebrated by Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore.

"Now, more than ever, our nation is in need of prayer for the protection of the unborn and the dignity of all human life," said Archbishop Naumann. "I am happy to be joined by bishops in dioceses across the country who are hosting pro-life prayer events, including during the overnight hours of Eucharistic adoration. I invite all Catholics to spend time with Our Lord and join in this nationwide vigil for life."



