January 23, 2022

Human history reveals periods where people lost a sense of God's transcendence. It may even be argued that human beings have been wandering and lost more than they have been at

home and focused. Human nature being what it is, we struggle with who God really is — the God of our salvation history or the gods of human constructs. Relying on our own designs and pursuits, we forget that we really are meant to listen to One upon whom the Spirit of the Lord rests, Jesus Christ, and not to ourselves. That same history that reveals our fickleness and infidelity also reveals God's constancy and faithfulness. God always finds us.

As people wander and fumble to find their way, God is there bringing them back to holiness and giving them the assurance of His presence. We have to allow God's Word, God's life, to touch us and change us. It can make us more flexible and attentive to the sacred in all facets of life so that every day is one that is holy. Every day is a time when fulfillment is possible for one's soul. Jesus stood before those gathered in the synagogue as the fulfillment of words of promise that were echoed long ago.

God doesn't forget. He always comes for us.

Now it is time to remember to go to God. Sometimes our lives are so confused and tangled that it is difficult to see the Word and hand of God. But when we realize, deep within, the depth of friendship God offers to us it really has the power to turn sadness to joy. The promise is fulfilled. Going frequently to God's Word, allowing ourselves to be enriched and rejuvenated, and pondering the certainly of God's fidelity and promise permanently transforms us.

We will be more aware of the sacred and the holy and less invested in things that pull us away.



God's Law

Scripture has always held God's law to be the path to human happiness. In today's first reading, Ezra the priest reads the scroll of the law to the people returned from exile. They weep—then are joyful. Israel's relationship with God had always been defined by how they kept and lived God's law. The author of Psalm 96 likewise praises the law of God as the source of wisdom, joy and enlightenment, purity and justice.

In his advice to the bickering Corinthians, Paul points out that, just as God has made all parts of a human body essential for the health of the whole, living as **Christ's body** requires that each member be recognized as necessary for the good of all. Finally, in Luke's Gospel Jesus claims that the Spirit is sending him to relieve human suffering. Like Ezra, he is reading from a scroll, proclaiming God's **law** of mercy to those in need.

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As the body with its many parts is still one body, so it is with Christ. —1 Corinthians 12:12-30 [12-14, 27]

Everyday Stewardship Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments Plant Your Works in the Word

One of the things about Scripture is that even the smallest word and shortest phrase can be critical to the overall message. When you take a quiet moment to **rest with the Word**, you find how quickly the most mundane sentence can reach out and grab you, pulling you into a deeper contemplation of some truth you hadn't even considered until then.

But we often fail to act as the Israelites in the Book of Nehemiah, standing before the Water Gate **listening attentively**. Whether it's at Mass during the Liturgy of the Word or at home poring over the Bible, time after time we find ourselves less mindful than we could be. Our ears accept the sounds of the words and our eyes glance over the shape of the letters.

But are we mindful — truly?

The best answer is hopefully at least sometimes. There are always tasks to be completed, problems weighing on our minds that we can't quite give over to God. We lose ourselves in these things instead of in Scripture. We **clock** in with Bible reading instead of **diving in**.

We can never forget that **the words of the Lord are spirit and life**. They are the soil that quickens the seed of all stewardship. There is no mindfulness, no prayer, no graciousness, no gratitude or accountability or sense of commitment unless there is the Word.

So let us pray today for mindfulness, that our every action will be grounded in the law of God — giving it true spirit and life.

Community is important. Community is essential. Community is crucial.

This message is the foundation of today's readings from Nehemiah, Corinthians, and Luke. Ezra's reading of the scroll is done in front of the community, including—a radical act at the time—women, and children old enough to understand, groups usually not counted among those hearing God's promise proclaimed.

<u>Community is important</u>. The mystical Body of Christ, like the human body, functions best and most fully when all members are playing the role for which they were meant.

<u>Community is essential</u>. God's word is fulfilled when the community has heard it, and witnessed it. In Luke, the baptism and desert trials of Jesus lead to the synagogue scene, which will then lead Jesus to his public ministry of proclaiming the reign of God. He eventually will journey to Jerusalem and his crucifixion.

Community is crucial.

Because we are humans, we have eyes, ears, hands, feet, and many other body parts. Ideally, they all work together. Is there any part of your body that sometimes gives you trouble? How might your beloved aid or comfort you? Ask.

If you are blessed to have children, no matter how aggravating they may be at times, remember those who have lost a child through miscarriage or abortion. Pray for couples trying to conceive. One Body, One Jesus

Our liturgical calendar separates different Gospel scenes, which can sometimes do them a bit of a disservice. The liturgical year, of course, has its own rhythm and purpose, into which the stories of the life of Jesus are placed. However, when Luke was organizing his Gospel (for Theophilus the lover of God whom we encounter in today's Gospel introduction), today's scene was part of a three-fold structure: the baptism of Jesus; the temptation in the desert; the announcement of the public mission in the synagogue at Nazareth. Linking these is the Holy Spirit, who descended on the body of Jesus at his baptism, who filled his body as he endured his forty-day trial, and who is upon his body to announce and to bring about God's reign. a mission he fulfills with his body on the cross. The incarnation (the in-flesh-ing) of Jesus, which we think of in connection with his birth, remains central to his story.

One Christ, One Body

Last week's reading from Corinthians concerned the one Spirit who gives many gifts, yet is the source of our unity. Paul continues this theme today using the image of the body, whose different members each have an important and distinct role to play. The Spirit of baptism forms that one mystical Body of Christ. The Spirit of baptism fills the many members, but unites them always as one. The Spirit of baptism is on each member, as it was for Jesus in the synagogue at Nazareth. That Spirit of our baptism anoints each of us as a member of Christ's Body to be glad tidings, proclaim liberty, bring clearer vision, lift the oppressed, to announce God's reign to all. As different members of Christ's Body, we are each called upon to do this in our own way. We may face opposition or rejection, as Jesus did, but we can always turn again in faith to the Spirit of our baptism who is still with us.

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A Family Perspective by Bud Ozar

In today's gospel Jesus was **praised by all** except at home in Nazareth where the **eyes of all were intently on him**. Acceptance can be hard to find at home due to unreal expectations. Jesus challenges us to **proclaim liberty** to anyone **oppressed** or **captive** by our expectations.

Sunday, January 23; 3rd Sunday in Ordinal Time

Nehemiah 8:2-6, 8-10; 1 Cor 12:12-30; Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

Those aren't fighting words-Most fights don't start with a punch, but with a word. That's because words are among the most powerful forces on the planet. Ideas divide or unite a society. Insults scar, just as kind words can heal. Our sacred story contained in scripture is a word meant to make the world whole. Pope Francis asks us to honor the word of God this Sunday. We begin by symbolically enthroning the Bible in our homes today: putting it in a place of honor. This reminds us of the deeper enthronement of God's word in our hearts. Make room for one Bible verse every day. Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing.

Monday, Jan 24; Francis De Sales, bishop

2 Samuel 5:1-7, 10; Mark 3:22-30

God, our shield and our strength-We live in tumultuous times for sure. But the world has been topsy-turvy before. Saint Francis de Sales lived during the religious, political, and social upheaval of the Protestant Reformation. And he became known for his gentleness and patience in the face of it. Leave it to him, the patron saint of writers, to pen a prayer that is timeless balm for troubled souls: Do not look forward to what may happen tomorrow; the same everlasting Father who cares for you today will take care of you tomorrow and every day. Either he will shield you from suffering, or he will give you unfailing strength to bear it. Be at peace, then, put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginations . . . A balm for these troubled times. If a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand.

Tuesday, Jan 25; Conversion of Paul, apostle

Acts 22:3-16 or Acts 9:1-22; Mark 16:15-18

Harden not your heart—Paul has always been a controversial figure. Before becoming a Christian, he was a persecutor of Jesus' followers. Paul's biblical words advising women to be submissive to their husbands have been alternately obeyed. rejected, and reinterpreted. But the word conversion on this feast reminds us what Christian life is about. The Catechism of the Catholic Church quotes Saint Ambrose on the two conversions in Christian life—one of them a one-time event and the other ongoing. There are water and tears, the water of Baptism and the tears of repentance. What parts of your life still require repentance? Jesus . . . appeared to you on the way by which you came, that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.

Wednesday, Jan 26; Timothy & Titus, bishops

2 Timothy 1:1-8 or Titus 1:1-5; Mark 4:1-20

Stay the course—Evangelizing and living the gospel demands much of us. Saints Timothy and Titus serve as examples to us of holding fast to the faith among difficult circumstances. Friends and companions of Saint Paul, they ended up becoming

bishops and leaders of the early church. They helped Paul to spread the gospel during those difficult early years. Timothy paid the ultimate price for encouraging others to embrace the emerging Christian faith. Reflect on the ways you choose to follow Jesus Christ and embrace his mission despite the challenges and difficulties it presents. Those sown on rich soil are the ones who hear the word and accept it and bear fruit thirty and sixty and a hundredfold.

Thursday, Jan 27; Angela Merici, religious founder 2 Samuel 7:18-19, 24-29; Mark 4:21-25

Wise counsel for the overwhelmed-On this memorial of Saint Angela Merici, 16th-century founder of the Ursuline Sisters, it makes sense to recall one of her many insights into faith-filled living. She advised the overwhelmed thus: Do not lose heart, even if you should discover that you lack qualities necessary for the work to which you are called. He who called you will not desert you, but the moment you are in need he will stretch out his saving hand. May you find that saving hand when you reach the end of your rope. Is a lamp brought in to be placed under a bushel basket or under a bed, and not to be placed on a lampstand?

Friday, Jan 28; Thomas Aguinas, priest & religious 2 Samuel 11:1-4a, 5-10a, 13-17; Mark 4:26-34

Root yourself in honesty-G.K. Chesterton once said of philosopher and theologian Thomas Aguinas, Being himself resolved to argue, to argue honestly, to answer everybody, to deal with everything, he produced books enough to sink a ship or stock a library. We could use a little more Thomas in our media, especially social media, because today we're not always sure if things are actually true or merely "internet true." For Thomas, honesty was key to communication. He considered it beautiful, honorable, and a reflection of moral goodness itself. May we take to heart his commitment to honesty in all of our communication. Once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade.

Saturday, Jan 29; Blessed Virgin Mary

2 Samuel 12:1-7a, 10-17; Mark 4:35-41

Sea of hope—Alonzo Ketcham Parker, a 19th-century travel writer, called the Sea of Galilee a fifth gospel due to the amount of biblical history that occurred on its shores. It is the site where Jesus performed many of his most renowned miracles, such as walking on water, calming the storm, and feeding the multitude. Villages and settlements dotted the shore in Jesus' day, and most of Jesus' followers probably gained their livelihood and nourished their families from its bounty. The nourishment continues every time we read the vivid accounts of biblical drama that occur on the holiest of seas. Dive in! He woke up, rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, Quiet! Be still! The wind ceased and there was great calm.

Protecting Children, Youth, and Vulnerable Adults

Taking reasonable measures to assure that Church personnel comply with all required certifications and background checks for the purpose of providing a safe environment for children, youth, and vulnerable adults.

Diocesan Database & Regulations for all Ministries

All parish staff and volunteers including: Advisory Councils: Finance and Pastoral; Faith Formation: Catechists & Aides, R.C.I.A. Team, Youth Ministry, Volunteers; Liturgical and Music Ministry: Adult Servers, Cantors, Choir, Eucharistic Ministers, Greeters, Lectors, Ushers; Parish Organizations: Christian Mothers/Women's Guild, Holy Name Society, Knight's of Columbus, Ladies of Charity, Rosary Society; Fund Raising: Festival, Fish Fry, Fund-Raising Volunteers, etc. are required to be cleared in the following ways:

- Be registered on the Virtus ® Online Safe Environment database: (Unsure whether you have an existing account? Call the Diocese Office for Compliance at 412-456-3093. If your record exists, they will provide you with login information)
- 2. Be cleared by the Department of Public Welfare (PA Child Abuse History)
- 3. Be cleared by the FBI (Fingerprint Clearance or Waiver for PA residents past 10+ years)
- 4. Protecting God's Children Online Training
- 5. Mandated Reporter Online Training (applies to certain volunteers contact Jeannie for more information)

The **Protecting God's Children Seminar** (an online one-hour seminar) is a requirement for all adults 18 years of age or older who are involved in the public ministry (work) of the church.

If you would like to take the **Protecting God's Children Seminar** and do not have access to computer, please contact Jeannie. There is a computer set up for **Safe Environment** in the Parish Office at St. Eugene Rectory.

Safe Environment Requirement Q&A's

Safe Environment Requirements have been in place for many years. The message from the **USCCB** (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops) and the **Diocese of Pittsburgh** is clear: **compliance is mandatory**.

I volunteer for just a few hours a year. Do I really need to go through all this?

Your service is needed. Your service is appreciated. But no one is to be scheduled or permitted to serve until all clearances are in place and up to date.

Can I help at the fish fry/bingo/festival if my clearances are in progress?

No. Every new volunteer must be 100% in compliance **before** beginning volunteer service. This means being registered on the Safe Environment Database, with Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance, and FBI clearance or waiver.

Protecting God's Children training, and Mandated Reporter Training (if required for the volunteer position) must be completed within 90 days. Current volunteers must renew their Pennsylvania Child Abuse History and FBI clearance or waiver every five years. Volunteers are informed when renewal is due. Please respond promptly to ensure your volunteer service can continue uninterrupted. Pennsylvania Child Abuse History clearances can be obtained as quickly as one business day when submitted online.

I have clearances from my employment/another volunteer organization. Can I submit them?"

Copies of Pennsylvania Child Abuse History and FBI clearances obtained for another organization may be submitted if they were issued less than five years ago. You will still have to register on the Safe Environment Database and complete Protecting God's Children training, and Mandated Reporter Training if required for the volunteer position.

I'm not a criminal. Why do I have to prove it?

The welfare of children, youth and vulnerable adults is the focus and the goal of the safe environment program.

Everything we do, we do for them.

This isn't the way it has been done before.

Differences in how these requirements have been enforced from parish to parish and pastor to pastor have led to confusion. Our **Safe Environment Coordinator** will be working with each organization and event coordinators to identify and assist each volunteer as needed to reach 100% compliance.

I don't have a computer/internet access.

The entire Safe Environment process can be accessed through VIRTUSONLINE.ORG. At this time, the Protecting God's Children and Mandated Reporter Training are both available only online. Those without internet access can register on the database and complete the clearance applications with the assistance of the Safe Environment Coordinator by phone. Online training sessions can be completed at our office by appointment. For information, questions, or to begin the process contact Jeannie at 412-751-0663.Thank you!



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
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
