Icon of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10)

Lessons of the Story of Zacchaeus

- 1. Zacchaeus teaches us that when you make a solid effort to experience Jesus, you are rewarded. It means seeking him with all your heart and doing everything he would have you do!
- 2. Don't make a judgment based on appearance. Far too often we make a judgment about someone based on how someone looks or acts. This makes us impotent to help someone change their lives.
- 3. Don't make a judgment based on reputation. People gain a reputation for better or worse from the lives they have lived and the reports that have been spread about them. When you hear a negative report from someone, ask God to help you withhold judgment.
- 4. Practice looking into a person's heart. Can you see someone's heart? God will help you

- with that! The closer we follow Jesus, the more we are able to see into someone's heart.
- 5. Ask God to help you see what might take place! When Ananias was asked to go see Saul, he objected because he was afraid. Saul had been relentlessly persecuting the church. But God revealed to Ananias the heart of Saul. He was then willing and was used to bring about a complete change in Saul's (Paul's) life. Read the story in Acts 9.
- 6. Focus on seeking and saving the lost. We are surrounded by people who don't know or follow Jesus. I am convinced that the very best life comes to us when we follow him. Are you? I want to help people find that life. When we do that, God changes lives and we become participants in that transformation!.




THE THREE HOLY HIERARCHS

—Who They Were and What They Did—




St. Basil the Great
Bishop of Caesarea in Cappadocia
330-379 AD
Feast Day: January 1

St. Basil is called Great because he kept the correct faith, took care of he poor and needy, build monasteries, and explained the doctrines of the Church. St. Basil wrote the text for the Divine Liturgy, which the Church uses ten times a year (mostly during the Great Lent).



St. Gregory the Theologian
Archbishop of Constantinople
329-389 AD
Feast Days: January 25
January 17 (translation of his relics)

St. Gregory is called Theologian because he explained the Holy Trinity as One God in Three Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. According to one of his biographers, St. Gregory is a Theologian because he prayed truly. He was a great poet and wrote over 400 poems containing more than 18,000 verses.



St. John Chrysostom
Archbishop of Constantinople
347-407 AD
Feast Days: November 13
January 27 (translation of his relics)

St. John is called Chrysostom because of the sweetness of his words (Chrysostom means golden mouth.)

Why they are Holy Fathers of the Church

They were bishops of our Church.

They wrote many books to explain the Faith to the people and helped them live a life in Christ.

They set rules to live and worship.

They fought against heresies (false teachings).

They took care of everyone, obeying our Lord's commandments.



As you heard today, we are off and running with the Synodal process. Please give your utmost attention to our lay representatives **Shalimar Masters and Ted Chuparkoff.** Information will be coming to you at a fast pace over the course of the next several weeks. The information sent to you from the chancery in my e-mail blast on Friday is meant to help prepare you prayerfully for the task that lies ahead. **Bishop Milan** has chosen The Beatitudes as the guideposts for this. (During the synodal process the cantors have been asked to sing the beatitudes instead of the usual Sunday antiphons.)

The **Finance Commission** and **Catering Committee** met last week to go over the contract with **Catering by Verba's**. There's a few lingering points of negotiation that need to be addressed and that should happen this week at a meeting with representatives from Verba's. Also, a small group of parishioners will meet this week to discuss with Verba's the new name for what we'll be calling our "event center" (because it will include the Activity Center and pavilion). February 2:

Presentation of Jesus in the Temple



On Wednesday we celebrate the meeting of Jesus with Simeon in the Temple. The gospel reads: "Then he took him up in his arms, and blessed God, and said, Lord, now let your servant depart in peace..." (Luke 2:28-29)

In this beautiful scene, the aged Simeon takes the Baby Jesus in his arms and expresses his delight and joy to God in a brief prayer. We often picture Jesus taking little children in his arms but this thought of another receiving Jesus into his arms is much less familiar to us.

Taking Jesus into his arms was an act of will by Simeon. The Spirit had prepared him to meet Jesus at the correct moment and had providentially brought them together. There are critical moments in life when everything depends upon immediate submission to the impulse of the Spirit. The impulse may come as a voice, or as a feeling of right or wrong. But the voice does not

always give the answer we expect or hope to hear. More often it presents a challenge which we may or may not choose to answer. The decision is always ours. Simeon was driven under the impulse of the Spirit to hurry into the Temple, and when he was confronted with the Christ Child, he accepted Him into his arms immediately overlooking the poverty, the humility, or the apparent insignificance of the family. The impulse of the Spirit told him this was to be his only opportunity to see Christ. He seized it.

This was the end of his long vigil of waiting. "Lord, now let our servant depart in peace." Are we waiting for a closer relationship with Christ? We must, like Simeon, seize the many opportunities the Church gives us to worship Him, to learn about Him, and to share our love and knowledge of Him with others so that we may repeat with Simeon: "Lord, now let your servant depart in peace."
