FAITH FORMATION

Gospel Reflection

We have another big weekend this week. A two-fer! Saturday is the Feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God and Sunday we celebrate the Epiphany. We all know the story of the Magi, the three kings who come bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh for the infant according to the gospel of Matthew. But what of Saturday's feast?

What we now call the Feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God has gone by many names. In grade school when I first memorized the "holydays of obligation", it was the Feast of the Circumcision, and I had only a vague idea of what that entailed. It has been known as simply the Octave of Christmas. A few years ago, I recall, we were praying for world peace on this day.

Poor Mary. Even this weekend, most of the focus is on those guys and their highly symbolic, but largely unpractical gifts. I betcha that will be what the homilies are about.

But, is it not true that the first gift Jesus received, he received from Mary? Her very body. It was her body that kept him warm and fed and protected for nine months. It was her body whose birth pangs gave him his first gasp of air. And it was her body that gave him his First Supper!

Two thousand years later, Jesus has no need of gold, frankincense and myrrh, if he ever did. But he does have need of our bodies. As we contemplate our own gifts to Jesus, let us remember the words of St. Teresa of Avila:

"Christ has no body but yours, No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes with which he looks Compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good. Yours are the hands with which he blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet Yours are the eyes, you are his body. Christ has no body now but yours..."

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life." If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.





but by me" (John 14:6). Eternal life comes through Him.

Death. None of us escapes death. Yet, in the Resurrection,

lesus defeated death for us. It didn't hold Him and He offers the gift of life to each of us if we live in Him. Sin. Even the holiest of us sins. Without lesus, what becomes of us? He gave himself as a ransom for all" (1 Timothy 2:6). If we don't accept His price, our sins come back to us for eternity.

Suffering. Modern science can alleviate but not eliminate some of the world's suffering. Jesus provides comfort and healing to those who trust Him and surrender to Him.

Why do Catholics pray to Mary?

Catholics don't pray to Mary, but instead ask her worship Mary, we honor her as lesus' mother. On the Cross, Jesus gave her to us as our own mother (John 19:27). We can approach her with our needs and concerns and ask her to present them to Her Son. Mary always leads us to Him.

Three tips to boost your prayer

Prayer fuels our spiritual life, but praying effectively can be challenging. Even the saints had dry spells. Among these was the mystic and Carmelite reformer, St. Teresa of Avila. Try these suggestions from her to enliven your prayer.

Become aware of God's presence. It may feel as if God is distant, but He is so close. St. Teresa began by enjoying God's nearness. Know that He is with you and wants your company.

Bring a good book. St. Teresa, who struggled with dryness in prayer, kept a book with her. Scripture,

Isaiah's prophecy. But then comes a twist: lesus recounts a time when great prophets were sent to call Israel to repentance and were ignored and persecuted.

The response of faith God was looking for in His

Chosen People was found elsewhere, in the Centiles. Jesus' listeners doubted that He was really the Messiah and were deeply insulted at being reminded that "foreigners" had received God's favor instead of them. In anger, they threw Jesus out of the synagogue and tried to

Be honest. It is said that St. Teresa once fell into the mud and told God bluntly. "If this is how you treat your friends, no wonder you have so few of them!" God wants to you to share all your experiences with Him - good and bad. Entrust your cares to Him and "Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5).

Can you suggest a 2 New Year's resolution to grow in Holiness?

All Christians are called to holiness. "Be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). There are three tools on which every Catholic can rely to attain greater holiness.



Daily prayer. God meets us in a very real and present way when we come to him in prayer. Start in the morning and pray throughout the day.

Weekly Mass. The Mass is a sacrifice and a meal. We receive Jesus' body and blood as real food for our souls. He said, "For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him" (John 6:55-56). That's why we call it, "Communion."

Monthly Confession. Jesus created the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation (Confession) because he knew we would stray. He also knew we would want to come back. Frequent participation in this Sacrament sharpens our sense of sin. holds us accountable for our errors, and gives us the grace to keep trying for holiness.
