

Gospel Reflection

Reflecting on the Scriptures

The lectionary gives us two options for the gospel reading today. We may hear the story of the raising of the daughter of Jairus unbroken in its entirety. Or we may hear the first part of that story, then the telling of the healing of the woman who had been afflicted with hemorrhage for twelve years, then, finally, the conclusion of the little girl's story. Had the author of this gospel submitted it in this form to an editor it would have been returned with the critique, "One story at a time, please!"

The two events are very different from each other. The little girl is restored to life after her father has actively sought Jesus. The sick woman acts on her own behalf. In the first story Jesus takes the child by the hand. He reaches out and touches her. But in the woman's story he does not even know who has touched his clothes. Her initiative is rewarded by an instant cure and his words "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction."

Why does the lectionary gives us both for this Sunday? Maybe a clue can be found in the first reading from Wisdom: "God did not make death, nor does God rejoice in the destruction of the living." God is on the side of health and wholeness.

We live in an imperfect world and death and disease are a part of it. But in both of these events in the gospel Jesus acts to mend something which was broken, to restore something that was lost.

The little girl is restored to her family. Yes, one day she will grow old and die. But for today she is given back to her family and to life with strict orders that she get something to eat!

And the poor woman who has suffered for 12 years, ritually unclean and unable to participate in the life of her community is restored to health and to that communal life again.

If we are to walk in Jesus's footsteps... where might we mend what is broken, restore something that has been lost? Take a prayerful look at your relationships, the people in your life. Where might you make bring peace, wholeness?

And the bigger picture? Where might you make a difference in civil society to mend what is broken with your voice, with your time, with your vote?

None of us can do everything but each of us can do something.

Preschool (age 3 to PreK) on Thursday mornings (9:00-11:00am), Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. CGS is a Montessori-based program which combines the teaching of Hebrew scholars, Scripture studies, and Roman Catholic Liturgy and doctrine. The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd strives to cultivate the natural bond already between God and the young child and produce a life-long desire for them to draw near to God.

Kindergarten and grades 1-8 on Monday evenings (6:45-8:00pm), in our Traditional PSR (Parish School of Religion) program. Peer groups in grade specific classrooms explore the religion curriculum as articulated by the Diocese of Cleveland. By the witness of their own lives volunteer adult catechists and classroom aides share their love Jesus each week with the children. Training, resources, guidelines, and support provided by the parish staff.

Grades 3-7, on Sunday mornings at 10:10am (typically the 2nd Sunday of the month), Family Catechesis, our homeschool study model with a once-a-month session for parents and children to attend together. Students use a textbook and online resources to complete grade level specific content at home with parents. As a family, they come in for thematic lessons/activities with the large group once a month.

Our God of second chances

The bad news is that at some point in our lives-probably way more than we would like to admit-we are going to make choices that

hurt our relationship with God.

The good news is that our God is a God of forgiveness and second chances. Here are some suggestions for using God's second chances in your own life.

Come to your

senses. The Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-52) left the embrace of his father

and ruined himself with bad choices. He finally "came to his senses" and returned home. Realize and admit your own mistakes and come back to your Father's embrace.

Avoid bad company. "Walk with

wise men and you will become wise, but the companion of fools will fare badly" (Proverbs 13:20). Surround yourself with people who will support your Gospel values.

Stay close. Closeness to God comes through prayer, Scripture study, regular Mass participation and living a Gospel-centered life. Don't give up. Jesus spent three years teaching twelve people how to live as His followers. They didn't always get it right (and they lived with Him!), but they kept trying. When you

mess up, remember what Jesus said to the woman caught in the act of adultery. "Neither do I condemn you ... from now on do not sin anymore" (John 8:11). Pick yourself up and start again.



Why do Catholics

Catholics wear scapulars as a sign of their devotion to Mary and their commitment to a Christian life. The scapular, particularly the Brown Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, symbolizes Mary's protection and promises spiritual benefits to



the wearer. Tradition holds that those who wear it faithfully will receive Mary's special protection and will not suffer eternal damnation. It serves as a daily reminder to live virtuously and is often associated with spiritual affiliation to religious orders like the Carmelites.

July 3 – St. Thomas, Apostle (First Century): Despite being known as "doubting Thomas," he made a beautiful profession of faith when he received proof of Jesus' Resurrection: "My Lord and My God" (John 20:28). Tradition says Thomas evangelized the Parthians, Medes, and Persians, and ultimately reached India.

July 5 – St. Elizabeth of Portugal (1336): The daughter of King Peter III of Aragon, she married King Denis of Portugal. She became known as "the Peacemaker" for resolving political the souls in purgatory and believers on earth. That's powerful company.



Q Why are& Catholics askedA to dress modestly?

Catholics are encouraged to dress modestly, firstly in church, to honor and respect the sanctity of the liturgy. This practice keeps the focus on prayer and the Eucharist, free from distractions. And, dressing modestly is a way to show respect and honor to God.

In general, modesty in attire reflects the dignity of the human body, recognizing it as made in God's image. By dressing with discretion, we display humility and

purity, following scriptural teachings. Conforming to common standards of decency promotes unity and mutual respect.

Beyond church, modest dressing aligns with Catholic values of chastity and humility, guiding us to live our faith daily and publicly. It demonstrates self-respect and respect for others, acknowledging every person's dignity. Modest attire minimizes temptations and scandals, fostering purity in interactions. Moreover, it sets a positive example for others, especially the youth, reinforcing values of decency and virtue.

In essence, modest dress in church and everyday life cultivates an atmosphere of respect, reverence, and virtue, embodying and demonstrating our Catholic beliefs and values.
