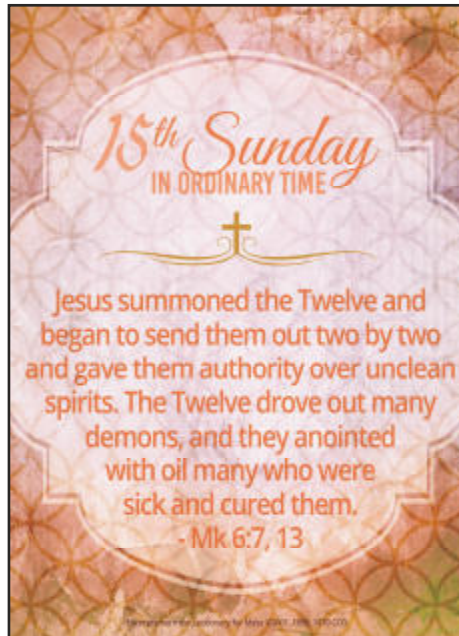
Our Lady of Lourdes

A Vicarious Descant

Today we are called to seek wisdom that we might better discern the two ways—either living as slaves of sin or servants of God. Our words (that is, “Lord, Lord” as we heard in today’s Gospel) must be in harmony with our actions (that is, doing the will of God). Within the words of the Epistle and Gospel today lies a message of patient watchfulness.

Prophets do not simply tell the future. Those familiar with scripture know that a true prophet points out how individuals and nations must change in order to avert what will necessarily follow the evil they are doing. A true prophet succeeded when what he had foretold did not come to pass. That is because the people heeded the prophet and turned from their evil ways. The Ninevites were able to do this—averting the destruction of their city which was to occur in 40 days. And they didn’t even know who the Lord was, they simply repented of what they already knew in their hearts was evil. God did not demand of them that which they did not yet know. But God did call them to return to what was already written on their hearts.

False prophets—and the term should not be lightly or unjustly used—present teachings that might appear to be in harmony with the Faith—they blend in with the sheep. They promote what appears to be reasonable and even compatible with the Faith, but it is a greater evil than simply being wrong about something because their message is often worded in ways that plants doubt in the minds of the hearers. Mixing truth with what is false is evil.



The simile that our Lord uses for plants and trees includes time. It takes time to bear fruit. For grape plants in a vineyard it takes several years before they produce fruit that can be used. Once established, a vineyard can then produce fruit for over a century.

The Church has never encouraged us to go in search of hidden information or recent prophesy and use that to guide our lives. If it is from the Lord, it will be in harmony with the Lord’s words and the words today call us to realize that knowing the truth requires listening and discerning over long periods of time. Think of the perfect example of this: Sacred Scripture itself: the Word of God has endured all these millennia. Likewise with the approved apparitions of Our Lady—it was years before the Church presented the messages to the Faithful, just as God had intended.

In 2 Chronicles we read that Solomon began building the temple of the Lord in the fourth year of his reign—he would have been in his early 20s. When it was finished, as we read in chapter six, he dedicated it to the Lord and offered a lengthy prayer of petition asking God that no matter what evil the people faced or sin the people committed, if they would come to this temple and pray for protection or forgiveness, that God would grant their petition. Solomon named all the major evils of his day in that prayer and petitioned the Lord that whoever presented himself in prayer at the temple would have his prayer answered.

That very night our Lord appeared to Solomon and repeated part of the very words of Solomon’s prayer. The Lord said “When I shut up the heavens so that there is no rain, or command the locust to devour the land, or send pestilence among my people, if my people who are called by my name humble themselves, and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land” (2 Chron 7:13-14).

St. James tells us, “The prayer of a righteous man has great power in its effects” and “whoever brings back a sinner from the error of his way will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins” (James 5:16/20).

The 19th century Benedictine Dom Gueranger spoke of the message of scripture for today’s Holy Mass and Divine Office quite bluntly. He wrote, “There are many souls in hell who have gone through more fatigue and pain to procure their

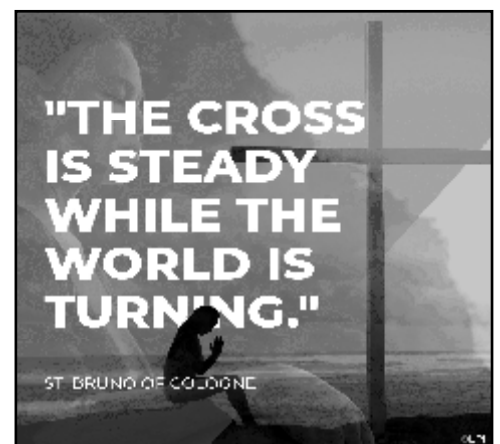
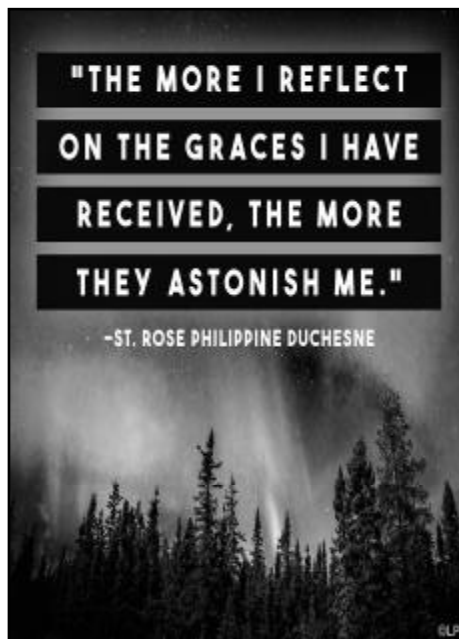

damnation than even the martyrs endured for Christ; and even with all that, never attaining the object they sought to obtain in this world! So true is it that the fools who are the most subservient to satan’s wishes do not always succeed in enjoying, even for a single day, the vile rewards he promises his slaves” (Gueranger, vol 11, p. 178)

The pious Gueranger goes on to say that the life of divine union grows on the high ground of justice; it rests on justice as a flower does on its stem. ‘He that possesses justice,’ says Sacred Scripture, ‘shall lay hold of wisdom’ he shall find delights in that divine wisdom, which surpasses all that earth could procure (p. 179).

To attain this wisdom, we must serve justice. The book of Ecclesiasticus teaches us that if we desire wisdom, then keep justice. Justice is kept through the Commandments of God—the Ten Commandments, but also those given to us by Our Lord and His Church.

On this seventh Sunday after Pentecost, holy Mother Church places before us the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit and, in particular, the gift of wisdom. The offertory verse points to the thousand sacrifices offered by Solomon in the first days of his reign—after which the Lord appeared to him and said, “Ask what thou will and I will give it to you.” Solomon asked for wisdom, and God granted him wisdom in a measure unlike any man before him or after him.

May God grant us and those for whom we pray much wisdom that we may bear good fruit, and through the intercession of Our Lady, Seat of Wisdom, may we one day come to share in that eternal joy of our heavenly kingdom.

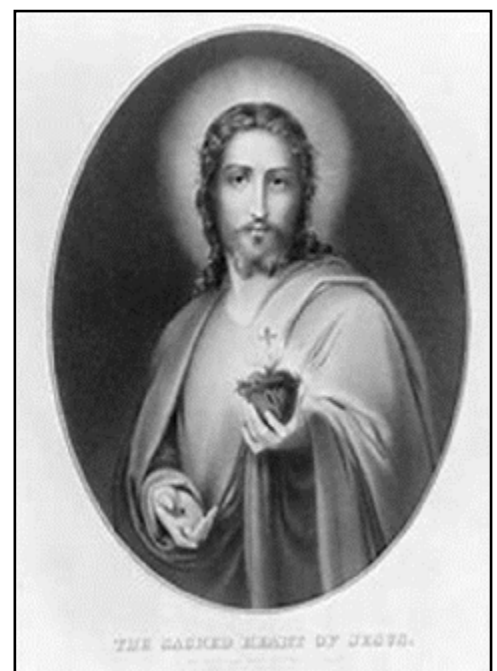
that are not well below the knee, sleeveless blouses and other such dress are inappropriate for worship.

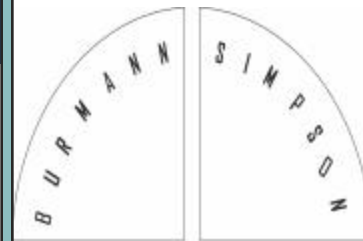

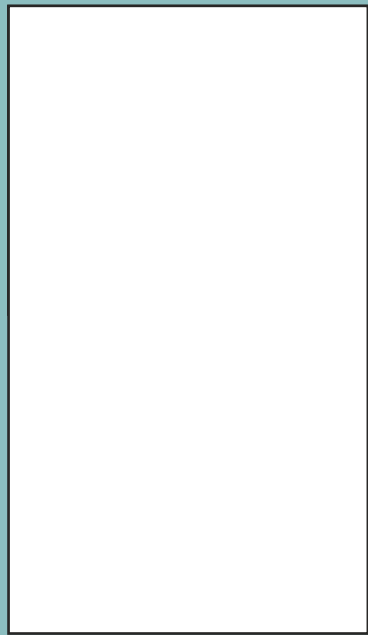
