A Vicarious Descant

The Second Book of Kings in the Old Testament (which is the Fourth Book of Kings in the Douay-Rheims Bible) relates how Naaman the Syrian was healed of leprosy by plunging seven times into the Jordan river. He did this after reconsidering his anger at being told to do such a simple thing. Naaman expected Elisha to manifest in his presence whatever divine power Elisha possessed—healing him as he looked on, that is, on his terms.

He was disappointed. The prophet did not even appear in Naaman's presence—which even points indirectly to today's gospel reading, where the ten lepers call out to the Lord from a distance and the Lord does not beckon them to approach Him, He simply sends them off to the priests to follow what the Law prescribed. Unlike most others petitioning the Lord, they did not ask directly to be healed and the Lord never said "Be healed." In a way, the general request from the lepers was met by a general command by the Lord.

In Naaman's case, Elisha simply sent a messenger, probably his rather mischievous servant Gehazi to tell him to go plunge seven times in the River Jordan and he will be healed. As a side note, Gehazi even though he was Elisha's longtime servant, would himself be afflicted with leprosy shortly after Naaman's departure as a punishment by God for his lying and avarice.

The slaves of Naaman are to be credited with bringing him to the waters of the Jordan, since his pride had prevented him from doing so initially. They convinced him to do as the prophet said by simply reasoning with him in a very practical way. "If the prophet had told you to do something extraordinary, would you not have done it? All the more now, since he said to you, 'Wash and be clean,' should you do as he said" (2 Kings 5:13b). Humility brings healing especially when it comes to the confession of sin.

Of course, seven times is a number of fullness or totality. Here it was a prophesy—a fulfillment relating to cleansing and healing that would take place in the Jordan.

Historians and geographers generally agree that the Jordan river is practically worthless as far as rivers go. It is murky, full of silt, shallow, and too low to be used for easy irrigation. At its highest point, the Jordan river is 700 feet below sea level. But when the Lord created the Jordan River, He created it for His purposes. Two of these purposes are found in Scripture: it is a place of separation and a place of cleansing. And its waters were sanctified when our Lord was baptized in the Jordan at the very place where Joshua had led the people across the Jordan into the Promised Land 1400 years earlier.

The lepers healed today were nine ungrateful Israelites and one Samaritan. "As they were going they were cleansed." The nine had no problem presenting themselves to the priest. The Samaritan did. He was forbidden from entering the presence of the priests of Jerusalem. The Jews had nothing to do with the Samaritans. They wouldn't even approach a Samaritan left half-dead

Jesus then said to the Twelve, "Do you also want to leave."

Sirron Peter answered him, "Master, to whom shall we go?

You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe

from robbers on the road to Jericho, why would the priests admit a leper into their presence?

But, without knowing it, the Samaritan did carry out the command by presenting himself before the true High Priest: Our Lord Himself.

When we beg the Lord to have mercy on us, or to grant a dire petition, we often do not receive a dramatic answer, but just the simple command, "Show yourselves the priests."

Clearly, the Sacraments are symbolically foreshadowed as our Lord orders the ten to present themselves to the priests. This is Baptism, Anointing of the Sick, Confession and Holy Communion—all administered by priests and all for the purposes of restoring what is lost by birth or disease or free will.

The Lord gave the command, but it was the free will of but one who came and gave thanks to God. God accomplishes so much for each of us—do we present ourselves before Him each week to give thanks?

account—in the original Greek of the Gospel, the lepers use the same word we use at the penitential rite—"eleison"—mercy and the Samaritan "fell on his face" before the Lord and "gave thanks"—the Greek word used is *eucharistein* pointing to the Holy Eucharist—the "source and summit of Christian life."

We've been asking our Lord to have mercy on us and on our country for years. Let us keep showing ourselves to the priests in Confession and Holy Communion but also continuously giving thanks for all that God is quietly accomplishing in our hearts and minds. We must keep going—carrying out our work and duties and obligations knowing that God is accomplishing great things in our midst on His terms, not ours.

Today is also the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary on the "old" calendar. It closes an Octave in honor of Our Lady that began on the Assumption. Let us realize that we have a powerful Mediatrix who petitions on our behalf. We turned with great love and confidence to Our Lady last week as we honored her Assumption, let us continue to beg her help and protection in these increasingly serious times.


