
Our Lady of Lourdes

A Vicarious Descant

You would think that after such a miraculous healing, the deaf mute and the witnesses would be quick to honor the command of our Lord not to speak about it. After all, it is much easier to say nothing than to go about the countryside proclaiming freely what the Lord had done. The man was not ordered to show himself to the priests or carry out some difficult task in return for the healing. He and the witnesses were simply ordered not to tell anyone.

Yet, as St. Mark records, “the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it.” St. Augustine comments on this apparent disobedience saying, “If however, He (Jesus), as one Who knew the present and the future wills of men, knew that they would proclaim Him the more in proportion as He forbade them, why did He give them this command?” In other words, God told them not to do something that He already knew that they would do. St. Augustine answers: because “He wished to prove to men who are idle, how much more joyfully, with how much greater obedience, they whom *He commands to proclaim Him* should preach, when they who were forbidden could not hold their peace” (Augustine, *Catena*). The Psalm versicle that begins the hours of the Divine Office is “O Lord, Thou wilt open my lips, and my mouth shall declare Thy praise” (Ps. 50:17).

How obediently and joyfully are we proclaiming the Lord Jesus to others? Not only with our words, but our actions: how we worship, how we greet and treat each



other, how we express concern for the salvation of souls?

Why do we recount the miracles of Christ today? What has happened in having heard this account of the healing of the deaf mute? Some of us have heard this account in one of the Gospels several times a year for the past 50 years—which is how long we’ve had the revised lectionary and the new Mass.

We could ask, “Why do we read Sacred Scripture and proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ?” There are many reasons. First, the miracles that Our Lord performed are incredibly miraculous. Again, as with many other miracles that the Lord performed, he not only removed the impediment from the deaf mute, but he instantly infused the knowledge of how to speak and hear and

understand. Think about it: the original Latin says “surdos and mutos,” “deaf and dumb.” Being mute or to use the more archaic word “dumb” is not an impediment, it is silence—being unable to speak—the man was likely born deaf and never heard how to speak at all. When our Lord healed his deafness, he also infused into his mind the knowledge required to speak—to use his tongue and vocal cords—something that normally takes a child years to learn.

We recount these events in the Gospels because they are an imitation of what those who witnessed them did. As St. Augustine said, they couldn’t contain themselves—they had to proclaim how good God is. We want to share in their praise of God by doing the same thing. We glorify God in so doing, mindful of our Lord’s words to the Pharisees as he entered Jerusalem, the people were crying out, “Hosanna in the highest!” The Lord said that if they were silent, the stones themselves would cry out (Luke 19:40).

We proclaim these miraculous events because each time we hear the Word of God, we are somehow changed, if we so desire to be. A single word, a single verse, an account of a miracle, a teaching of Our Lord, the witness of His disciples—all these things encourage us in our journey. It unites us as a people. It renews our hope and instills in us a longing to be like those who believed and lived all for Christ. No doubts, no uncertainties, but absolute faith.

Miracles abound around us to this very day, but we are not always aware of them. The Church has recorded many as part of




