A Vicarious Descant

Today's Gospel picks up exactly where last week's Gospel left off. The last sentence then was "And all spoke highly of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth." Seven verses later that changes to "They rose up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town had been built, to hurl him down headlong" (Luke 4:29).

The Gospel last week and today speak of our Lord in his hometown of Nazareth. If you visit Nazareth today, you will find a somewhat unwelcoming land. It is built on a terribly steep hill. There are plenty of places where you can walk to the edge of a path and peer over the edge to a lot of rocks and housetops and other things that would easily prevent you from surviving a fall.

The first reading is the prophesy of Jeremiah which both expresses the authority of the prophet who was sent by God, but also the authority of the Messiah of whom Jeremiah spoke. Later in that Book we read "The days are coming...when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. In those days, at that time, I will make a just shoot spring up for David; he shall do what is right and just in the land. In those days Judah shall be saved and Jerusalem shall dwell safely; this is the name they shall call her: "The LORD our justice" (Jeremiah 33:14ff).

"They will fight against you, but will not prevail over you, for I am with you to deliver you." This is to Jeremiah to strength-



en him against his enemies, but it is also about the Lord walking through the midst of those who would have cast him over the edge of the hill for what he had said to them.

When the Lord was questioned about why he had done no miracles, he referred to two scriptural passages—both of which were clear condemnations of the people who been unfaithful to God and murderous toward the prophets. The Lord God had worked no miracles among His unfaithful people and there was a clear understanding in the Synagogue that Jesus was saying that they, too, were unfaithful.

Elijah had commanded that there be no rain until he gave the word and the entire

When the people in the synagogue heard this, they were all filled with fury. They rose up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town had been built, to hurl him down headlong. But Jesus passed through the midst of them and went away. - Lk 4:28-30

land was in famine. The Lord sent him to a pagan widow and provided for him and the widow and her son until the famine ended. Likewise, the Lord refers to Naaman the Syrian, who was cured of his leprosy when many Israelites were not. Our Lord's words to those at Nazareth were words of rebuke. He was saying, "I have not worked any signs here because you have no faith, just as God worked no signs through His prophets to your ancestors because they had no faith." It was Jezebel and Ahab that had pursued Elijah to kill him after the famine had raged for three years and he had destroyed the false prophets of Baal.

I always wondered at the words, "physician, heal thyself." The people were saying the equivalent of "speak for yourself" or stop telling others what's wrong with them when you're not perfect yourself. The saying meant that they were telling Christ to mind his own business. Obviously, the Lord had been preaching repentance—something the people of his hometown did not want to hear.



Our Lord was clearly preaching repentance—as the prophets had done—and his home town was clearly not listening.

As we approach Lent, we are called to again turn to a closer examination of our conduct, our behavior, our priorities, our prayer, our fasting, our almsdeeds, (works of mercy). May these and all our actions express our desire for God to grant us His favor and blessings.

This Wednesday is Candlemas Day, or "The Presentation of the Lord." The blessing and procession with candles will precede Mass that day. Candles will be available after Mass. You are welcome to bring candles to be blessed as well, as the blessing is longer and quite inclusive. Processional candles will be distributed and then relit and held during the Gospel and throughout the Canon. Our Marian hymn often sung after the Rosary will change to *Ave Regina Cælorum* until Wednesday in Holy Week inclusive.

Thursday is the Feast of St. Blasé. The Blessing of Throats will follow the morning Mass.
