A Vicarious Descant

here was only one Old Testament prophet who actually lived to see the fulfillment of what all the other prophets had prophesied. The prophets had foretold some aspect of the coming of the Messiah, but the last prophet, St. John the Baptist, was the only one to actually see the Messiah and witness the fulfillment of his own prophesy of the Messiah. And this fulfillment took place when St. John spoke the words, "Behold the Lamb of God!" and "The one who has the bride is the bridegroom; the best man, who stands and listens to him, rejoices greatly at the bridegroom's voice. So this joy of mine has been made complete. He must increase. I must decrease" (John 3:29-30).

It is interesting that the Prophet Isaiah was called to begin his prophetic mission in the year 740 BC—just about the same time that the city of Rome was founded. It was Isaiah who prophesied that the Messiah would be heralded by one crying out in the wilderness.

In the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, immediately after Isaiah prophesies about the coming of the Messiah, we find the very passage that Jesus would proclaim when he stood up in the synagogue in Nazareth and was handed a scroll containing the Book of the prophet Isaiah (Luke 4:16ff).: "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord hath anointed me: he hath sent me to preach to the meek, to heal the contrite of heart, and to preach a release to the captives, and deliverance to them that are shut up" (Is 41:1)

St. John the Baptist was the herald of the Messiah and of all the things that God could have instructed this last prophet of the Old Testament to do, it was to perform a baptism of repentance. We must take note that Jesus did not begin his ministry until John the Baptist could no longer baptize. So, in other words, the proclamation of the Good News had to follow the preparation of hearts to hear the Good News. It is no different today as the Church teaches the Faith before each Sacrament is received.

The baptism of repentance that John preached was known by the Scribes and Pharisees to be one of the signs that the Messiah had come. From the prophet Ezekiel, they knew that the Messiah's arrival would involve both water and repentance, but they did not know how the two would be related. This is why they question John the Baptist so rigorously in John chapter one, verses 19ff.

In accordance with God's plan of salvation, we read in St. Mark, "Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: 'This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:14-15) The voice of the herald will certainly fall silent when the one who he announces has arrived.

The Baptism of John was a baptism of repentance that pointed toward the baptism in Jesus Christ. It did not itself cause any interior sacramental change. The baptism instituted by Jesus Christ is one of water and the Spirit and takes

away all sin. John's baptism was not only an immediate foreshadowing of the baptism by water and the Spirit, but also a bridge between the Old and New Covenants. The waters of baptism were sanctified by the Messiah.

St. John the Baptist's birth is celebrated six months before the birth of Christ. It comes at the point where the number of hours of daylight begin to decrease, compared with the birth of Christ, at a time in the year when the number of hours of daylight begin to increase. We have all noticed our shortening daylight hours by now—let them be a gentle reminder that time is short and God calls us be vigilant and watchful!

The Letter to the Hebrews, chapter 11, says, "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). The patriarchs, "...died in faith. They did not receive what had been promised but saw it and greeted it from afar and acknowledged themselves to be strangers and aliens on earth..." (Heb 11:14). The patriarchs and prophets, the Letter to the Hebrews tells us, "endured mockery, scourging, even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, sawed in two, put to death at sword's point; they went about in skins of sheep or goats, needy, afflicted, tormented. They wandered about in deserts and on mountains, in caves and in crevices on the earth. Yet all these, though approved because of their faith, did not receive what had been promised" (Heb 11:36-40). All that is, up until John the Baptist. It was the redemption of Christ that won for the prophets and

New Banners for Our Lady




