# 22<sup>nd</sup> Sunday IN ORDINARY TIME

"Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but  
the things that come out from within are what defile." - Mk 7:15



*Fr. Marlon's Reflections - 22<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time (Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23)*

At the start of the class, a teacher told her kiddie pupils to close their eyes as they prayed. At the end of the prayer, one child said, “Ma’am, during the prayer, all the others did not close their eyes at all. I was the only one with closed eyes.” We wonder how the child ever found out! But what is to be noted here is the emphasis the child placed on the teacher’s instruction rather than on the prayer itself – on the external rather than the essential.

We should not be surprised if children put much regard to externals. After all, when they are told to do or avoid doing certain things, they are not yet told why. They are still too young to understand, we say. But the problem is adults do the same, especially regarding what are often called traditions, including our superstitions. For example, in the Philippines, young couples do not schedule their weddings in February because it has fewer days. Neither do they do so when the date of the calendar points downwards (1, 4, 7, 9, 11, 14, 17, 19, 21, 24, 27, 29 and 31). They like to choose the dates 8, 10, 18, 20, 28, 30 because they believed that these dates mean eternity. I do not know if here in America couples do the same superstitious belief. As if any of these has anything to do with the future success or failure of a marriage. For what really matters in marriage is the heart – that it is full of good will, generosity and caring; that is so full of love that the couple are willing to commit themselves to each other for life, come hell or high water. This is what is essential in marriage. The rest like the wedding entourage and party are just trimmings.

In the gospel, we see the Scribes and the Pharisees observing how Jesus’ disciples, tired and hungry from their labors, ate without first washing their hands. They also noticed how the disciples disregarded other Jewish traditions. So they asked Jesus, “Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?”

Jesus, seeing how their traditions have dulled their spiritual values and priorities, responded to the Scribes and Pharisees, “Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written, ‘This people honors me with their lips but their hearts are far from me.’” In short, what Jesus was telling them was: “Focus on the essentials.” As one writer has aptly said, “In absolutizing the minutiae of the law, the Pharisees had insulated themselves against the ‘bread of life,’ the cups and dishes rather than the food.”

How did this sad development come about? The law Moses gave to the Chosen People originated from their experience of God’s nearness and presence during their wandering in the desert. They saw him involved in their day-to-day life. For example, when they were hungry, he sent them manna; when they were thirsty, he ordered Moses to make water flow from a rock by merely striking it with his staff. This experience of the nearness of God was the inspiration underlying the law. And to preserve its purity, Moses ordered the people, not to add to what I command . . . nor subtract from it (Dt. 4:2). But over the centuries, the powerful experience of God became just a memory. Meanwhile, the Scribes and Pharisees added all kinds of details to the law contrary to the order of Moses. Not only that, they also made them as binding as the Mosaic Law and declared those who did not observe them “unclean.” In face of this, Jesus told them, “You disregard God’s commandment but cling to human tradition.”

The same will happen to us when we put more emphasis on the trappings of our faith rather than on its spirit. Then we will be so bound by externals that we forget the essentials. Then we will focus on the evil others do rather than what is good in them; on what we see them do rather than on their motive in doing so. Closer to home, we find ourselves doing things so as to impress others and thus think well of us rather than to do what God wants and pleases him.

Jesus told the Scribes and the Pharisees what made a person impure or unclean, “Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person, but the things that come out from within are what defile.” He condemns a religion of outward appearances. He rejects pious display. The word he used for this was “hypocrisy” and we know that Jesus had no kind words for hypocrisy. Certainly, Jesus does not want us to be counted among them. Rather, he wants us to act from a heart animated with love and to serve him and people in sincerity and truth.

So that Jesus will not say of us as he did of the Scribes and Pharisees, namely, “you disregard God’s commandment but cling to human tradition” let us act from a faith-inspired code of conduct which springs from the depths of our heart and permeates with love everything we do; and which urges us to express our faith in the service of our brothers and sisters in need.

**DOERS OF THE WORD**

The second reading for today begins a five-week series of selections from James, a letter that is classified among the so-called “catholic” (or universal) epistles because they are addressed to a general audience rather than to one particular community. Today’s text offers important advice for Christians of every generation. God is first cited as the author of all gifts and in particular, reference is made to the gift of baptism by which we have been made the “first fruits” of the new creation.

What follows is advice based on a very Jewish understanding of the “word” as an active force, operative in the world. We are reminded that unless we, too, become “doers” of the word, our claim to faith is empty. Today and in subsequent weeks, the author reminds us that it is equally important to do the “works” of love, for example, by caring for the “orphans and widows in their affliction.”

**INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK**

What makes a person wise and intelligent? Certainly it is not the ability to memorize facts of minute details about a situation. What makes a person wise and intelligent is when their words and actions harmoniously unite and produce virtue. A person can know many facts and even do the right actions but still have a grave flaw in their character. We sometimes want to delude ourselves into thinking that as long as we are “doing” everything correctly, we are automatically in right relationship with all. Such is sadly not the case in the kingdom of God. We are called not to be just hearers of the Word but doers as well. That means getting to the heart of what laws and rituals are meant to signify and nurture. If we do not bring the actions home, where they belong and allow them to speak of the goodness, mercy, compassion and love of God, then they are simply empty worthless gestures. Welcome the Word that has been planted within you so that you can be a truly wise and intelligent disciple of Jesus Christ.

**PRACTICE OF CHARITY**

The Second Reading and the Gospel touch on the essence of Jesus’ teaching to care for the marginalized. Pope Francis echoes this teaching when he urges his brother priests to go out as shepherds where there is suffering and brokenness so that they have the “odor of the sheep.” All of us are called to be “doers of the word and not hearers only” and to care for the most vulnerable in our midst.


