GOSPEL MEDITATION Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Jesus tells his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you." The peace that Jesus gives is far different than the kind that comes from the absence of war, conflict, or affliction. The peace that God offers is found alongside suffering and hardship, not necessarily in their absence. St. Teresa of Avila offers us a bit of wisdom regarding peace: "May today there be peace within. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content knowing you are a child of God. Let this presence settle into your bones and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise, and love. It is there for each and every one of us."

In order for us to experience the divine peace that Jesus offers, we have to allow God's presence to settle into our bones! It is only when this happens that we can be truly taught by the Holy Spirit to discern the true path to peace and find ourselves with untroubled hearts. The world and our lives are so unpredictable and changeable. If we look for a source of lasting and real peace only there, our search will never be satisfied. Something will always unsettle and disturb us. The Jewish disciples could really relate to what Jesus was saying about peace (shalom). They already knew that it was more a matter of achieving wholeness and wellbeing than anything else.

Wholeness and wellbeing are precisely what is uncovered when we begin to really see and know the height, depth, and breadth of God's presence and promise. The elegance of God's Divine life flows through our blood and the marrow in our bones. It is that close and deep. As we breathe in and exhale God's life, peace becomes what we know within and what is exhaled out. This remains in the midst of intense conflict, persecution, suffering, rejection, and even death.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

ENCOURAGING THE ENCOURAGER

I remember brother John today. We called him Brother J. Everyone knew him in our church then, especially members of the parish's Charismatic Movement prayer group. He was an encourager. If he knew of someone with a need, he would not rest until he met it or until he got someone who could. He was not a priest, nor was he one of the leaders in the Charismatic Movement, but he would have passed for any of those. He visited, counseled, and prayed for people. No one could miss our prayer meetings two weeks in a row without having Brother J visit him. He was one smiling, energetic brother who was always smiling and available. He did not seem to have a care in the world. As busy as he always was helping people, I never heard him complain about anyone. I had seen him respond to the most abrasive insults with good-natured jokes and sweet laughter.

I returned from school when I was in college, and at my first prayer meeting, I noticed that Brother J was not there. I asked some of his 'friends' why, and they could not give me a definite answer. One said maybe he had traveled to see his family. Another said maybe he was busy doing something important. All I got was a bunch of "maybes" and more maybes from his 'besties.' I asked some guys who had been helped by brother J, and they could not tell me anything useful. Even those in leader-ship could not tell me anything important.

During the week, I decided to look for Brother J. It took me two days to find his house. I was shocked. This gracious brother was living in the most inhospitable condition. A boy showed me his room, the room he used to live in. Brother J had died four months earlier. None of his brethren was aware. Not even those he helped. This gracious brother had fallen on hard times in the past eighteen months and had lost so much. This made him move to this terrible neighborhood of gangs, living in unsanitary conditions. He had been asthmatic, but his trials and living conditions aggravated his ill health. Brother J was sick and was in his room for a week. He died in that room.

The boy that took me to his room told me Brother J sent him to one of the brothers in his church group at the height of his sickness. That one said he would tell the others. My investigation revealed that he told a couple of people, and they all agreed to visit him sometime. They never did. His neighbors took his body to the morgue and did what they could to find his extended family members. Brother J had been quietly forgotten by the people he loved. I cried.

My dear friends, do not ever think that the people around you who seem to be very strong do not need encouragement. The brethren who neglected Brother J were probably good people who took his strength for granted. They believed Brother J was usually fine and would be okay this time as well. You know that smooth presumption that makes you think, "I know it is too late, and daddy should be home by now, but I am sure he can take care of himself. Let us go to sleep"?

Encouragers need encouragement. To encourage you, they sometimes have to ignore their own troubles, which may be much bigger than yours. You may think they are very rich, but they may have issues in their lives that money cannot handle. You may think they are always happy, but they are only smiling for you. They may be trying to lift you up while they are down. Those who are strong for others sometimes need someone to be strong for them. The people you go to when you feel like giving up on life, when you are neck deep in financial or marital challenges, who leave everything to spend hours with you on the phone, pray with you, visit you and nurse your battered confidence back to health, they need encouragement too.

Your mother, father, brother, or pastor may be the strongest person you have ever known. Most times, what they have shielded you from had hit them hard in the past and left some marks on them. You do not know about these because they chose not to tell you. Sometimes the minor errors they commit are due to the pressures on them. You sometimes judge them too harshly because you have not been where they have been.

I call on you today to encourage your encouragers. Call them and thank them. Tell them how much you appreciate them. Tell them you have not taken them for granted and pray for them. Some of us are alive today because of those who left their challenges to attend to our troubles. Do not abandon your Brother J. He is probably battling a giant now that a word from you can help him defeat. Letting him know you care for him may be all he or she needs to hear. Don't be offended if he seems to have withdrawn from you. He is probably hiding his challenges from you, not wanting to burden you with his troubles.

Again, encourage your encourager. Remain blessed.

PRAYER FOR PRIESTS



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

Everyone wants to experience peace. When we look to the world to provide this for us, we can easily get disappointed. We associate peace with an absence of war and conflict, good relationships between neighbors and coworkers, the achievement of success and even the absence of noise! While all of these are worthy endeavors, pursuing them exclusively as a path to experiencing peace sets us up for failure. When we look for peace outside of ourselves, it will never be found. True and lasting peace is something that comes from within and not something we can produce on our own or receive from others. Peace is discovered when we experience an inner wholeness and harmony. It is born of a sense of connectedness with a God who is larger and greater than ourselves, gifting us with His presence. It is the only the peace offered by the Risen Christ that can settle our hearts and calm our fears. Regardless of the degree of turmoil around us, this sense of completeness that Jesus gives anchors our boats and prevents us from sinking.
