Reflection by Father Daniel Kuyumba Halumo (We Walk Together)

My dear brothers and sisters, Peter is the central figure in our readings today. Let's look back at Peter's actions prior to the resurrection. After journeying with Jesus throughout his public ministry, when Jesus was arrested, Peter denied knowing Jesus three times. Peter was not there as Jesus hung in the cross. Peter, along with the rest of the apostles locked themselves in the upper room out of fear of being arrested. And yet, in the Acts of the Apostles, Peter boldly says, "We must obey God rather than men. God exalted him [Jesus] at his right hand as leader and savior to grant Israel repentance and forgiveness of sins." After being ordered by the Sanhedrin to stop talking about Jesus, Peter and the disciples rejoiced for being "found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name [Jesus]". Why this dramatic change? Saint Peter had encountered the Risen Lord and this encounter transformed his life. Saint Peter had also experienced the outpouring of the Holy Spirit that brings boldness.

In today's Gospel, unsure of what to do after finding the empty tomb, Peter returns to what is comfortable fishing. While the disciples are in their boats, Jesus appears on the shore to his disciples. Jesus has been busy cooking fish and bread over a charcoal fire. He also helps the disciples haul in a miraculous catch of fish. Jesus meets Simon Peter where he is. Jesus recognizes the uncertainty with which Simon Peter is now living. Three times Jesus asks Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Simon Peter responds each time, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus is meeting Peter in his fear, in his doubt, and in his guilt for denying Him three times. Peter denied him by a charcoal fire and now by another charcoal fire, Peter professes his love for Jesus. The beauty of Christ's death and resurrection is that no matter your sin, no matter how you have denied Jesus in your past, Jesus will meet you and simply ask you, "Do you love me?" Your yes begins a journey of love, forgiveness, grace, and mercy. Jesus loves you unconditionally. He simply needs your "yes" so that He can say again and again, "Follow me."

Week 1, April 24th: Reflection on the Vision Theme: **Disciple**

The first vision theme is very ambitious and maybe a bit intimidating. It describes what is expected of me as a disciple in this community. I have a long way to go, but it made me think about what it takes to be a true disciple of Jesus. I have a good start, because like you, I am graced by my Baptism.

This theme reminded me that being a disciple is a life-long journey. My personal relationship with Jesus needs continuous nurturing and renewal. The Apostle Peter didn't go from being a simple fisherman to building Christ's church overnight. He made mistakes and had to learn and grow, just as I do. Above all, I am not alone on this journey. I am empowered by the Holy Spirit and all of you, who live and share your faith.

One final thought about this theme. There are three challenges: to claim our discipleship, to live the Fruits of the Spirit and to be "priest, prophet and king." The power in these may be the new seed that transforms and inspires us and the next generation of disciples to joyfully live and share the gospel!

Week 2, May 1st: Reflection on the Vision Theme: Family

We frequently hear the phrase "our Ascension family" and newcomers often say Ascension feels like home. This vision theme calls us into a deeper connection with each other. It's about "being" family, every individual, every family or group within our community, drawn together by our faith. People are accepted and loved because they are part of the family, not because of who they are or what they can do.

As family we focus on loving, nurturing and strengthening each other. This includes those who are regularly with us, those whose circumstances may keep them at home and those who may be in assisted living situations. Being a family also means sacrifice. For others to grow or be strengthened I may need to give up a personal preference or desire.

A key focus in the Family theme is the emphasis on building and strengthening generational and diverse relationships. Imagine what our worship, ministries and social outreach would be like and what we might experience if everyone, children, youth, young adults, young families and seniors, learned from each other and served together.

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration for the week

What prevents us from seeing the Lord? We are not used to seeing Jesus in the ordinary, everyday events of our lives. We expect some kind of startling, extraordinary revelation to occur that definitely and unmistakably sends a signal that God wants our attention. We don't expect a visit from Jesus while we are having breakfast, doing the dishes, running after the kids, negotiating a deal at work, or taking a shower! Sometimes when God simply stands on the shore of our lives casually looking for us, we don't recognize him. Did we ever stop and think that God is really and truly interested in the routine, run of the mill events of our lives? So, "what did you do today?" God may ask. Maybe we don't think that God is concerned about such things, or we are so consumed with life's demands that we give it little if any thought. Perhaps we are determined to achieve our own success, desire to control things ourselves or not really sure what God cares about. God is there. One day, out of the blue, God will get our attention and ask, "Do you love me?"

SAINT OF THE WEEK

The story of St. Rose of Venerini (February 9, 1656 – May 7, 1728) is one of having faith in God and his calling in your life. Born in Italy in 1656, she was the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé, she entered a convent in the hopes of becoming a nun, but soon returned home to care for her mother after the death of her father. In an effort to keep up her spiritual side, St. Rose invited women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, and together they formed a sodality.

Unsure of where her life was headed, she sought the spiritual guidance of a Jesuit priest. After much contemplation, she admitted to feeling called to be a teacher in the world, rather than a nun in a convent. Eventually, she moved ahead and opened a free school for girls in 1685. Eventually, she was invited to oversee the training of teachers and the administration of schools in the Diocese of Montefiascone, which then led to being called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome.

St. Rose died in Rome in 1728 amid a number of miracles that many credit to her. The group of women she first prayed with in her home eventually became known as the Venerini Sisters, found in the United States and working among Italian immigrants. St. Rose was beatified in 1952 and canonized in 2006.
