What is the difference between a chastisement and a punishment?

The distinction between chastisement and punishment is, in many ways, a subtle one, but which is still relevant in our Catholic tradition.

First, chastisement is a concept that is grounded in Sacred Scripture. Here, we see chastisement as a response by God to people's actions that is intended to teach a lesson. As St. John Paul II observed, "chastisement appears to be ... a kind of divine pedagogy, in which the last word is reserved to mercy: He scourges and then shows mercy, casts down to the depths of the nether world, and he brings up from the great abyss" (Tobit 13:2). The idea here is that in order to capture our attention or to highlight how we have not lived out our covenant-relationship with God as we should, there are times when God uses events in life to draw us back to the quality of relationship or faith that we should have.

The concept of punishment, however, has a different sense. The Catechism of the Church observes that punishment is the consequence of a damaging action that "has the primary aim of redressing the disorder" and to protect the community and the common good from further damage or harm (see no. 2266). Although we always hope that someone who is being punished for a crime or some other harmful action will learn from their actions, punishment isn't necessarily intended to teach a lesson in the same way that a chastisement is.

Ultimately, how we make the distinction between chastisement and punishment is a matter of discernment. As with almost everything in life, our experiences can be an opportunity for grace — or for something less — depending on how open we are to recognizing the movement of God's Spirit within them. ©LPi



This week's message from Fr. Dave....

Are we happy that 2021 is here? Many have said they wanted the year 2020 behind them. Well, we still have some ways to go in dealing with the aftermath of last year. I do not want to just write off the last year, but want to take time to see what we have learned about our world, country, and ourselves. I know from my own perspective and from what some have shared about the experience of 2020, most of us have been challenged in our growth and spirit. The question I must ask is now that we are in 2021, "Where do we go from here?"

I met with several people from the parish on Tuesday, December 15th on a Zoom call to discuss what can we as a parish do in response to COVID and the challenges it has brought into our lives. I found our discussion to be productive and with some good possibilities for your involvement, even though we cannot meet in person. We talked about how COVID has impacted all of us. Some of us have felt the effects directly and most of us have seen the mental, relational, and spiritual strain it has caused in many lives. Our usual way of living has been disrupted in ways we never could imagine.

Our thoughts centered on this year as Pope Francis has declared it the Year of St. Joseph. 2021 will be guided by the prominence of St. Joseph. If you remember he takes Mary on faith as his wife, even with the miraculous circumstance of her pregnancy. We do not know much of Joseph, except he is faithful to Mary and will join her in raising Jesus in his early years. He is not mentioned many times in scripture and according to our tradition blends into the background of Jesus' and Mary's lives. Joseph is Jesus' link to the ancestral heritage of David from the Old Testament. This is of high importance, especially to the Jewish community.

A few months ago, we received the huge statue now placed near the exit drive. That is Joseph and he is a prominent figure now on our property. There has always been a powerful devotion to St. Joseph in our diocese. Several parishes, especially on the west side of Cleveland, have been named after St. Joseph. His spirit is one of simplicity, faith, hard work, devotion to Mary and Jesus, and doing the will of God. Joseph was a heroically pure and just man. As a patron of the

Church his fatherly love and protection are virtues to be developed in this life.

Our thought was to have parishioners join in a consecration to St. Joseph. This is a thirty-three day devotional with a few prayers and some reading. This will take no more than six or seven minutes each day. The devotional reading and prayers lead up to one of the feast days of St. Joseph. The reason I like this idea is the consecration is not time-consuming. It requires our attention for a short period of time each of the thirty-three days. We will learn about Joseph as a saint and protector of Jesus and Mary.


The Feast of St. Joseph is March 19th which means we will begin the prayers and devotional starting on February 15th. The formal consecration will be near the Feast of St. Joseph and we will do part of the consecration near the statue of St. Joseph on our property (weather permitting!). To be a part of the consecration will require you to purchase a book to guide our prayers. We will have a sign-up or you can call the parish office and we will purchase the book for you.

I cannot believe we are here in 2021. I know many of us are happy with 2020 being behind us. There seems to be a glimmer of light for the upcoming year and hopefully a downward spiral of the effects of the pandemic. We pray that St. Joseph, known as a protector, will give us strength to continue with a fervent faith no matter what we must face this next year.

My prayer is that all of us can continue to seek God in our lives and be given the strength to move forward. I pray your family is safe and healthy throughout this year. If anything becomes difficult for you or your family, let us know if I or anyone on our parish staff can help. May St. Joseph watch over and protect us throughout this coming year.

Have a safe and healthy New Year and remember to nourish your life with prayer and worship! Keep the Faith.






Humor from the Caddyshack

The Psalms



I've most recently been reading the Book of Psalms. I always love the Responsorial Psalm sung at Mass (and I continue to miss singing along). And the Psalms can be so soothing in times of trouble. How many times have you heard the 23rd Psalm read to someone as they're readying to transition to everlasting life or at a funeral? So, I selected the Psalms

to read thinking that I'd benefit from a bit of soothing these days. By the way, there are 150 Chapters in the Book of Psalms – in both the Catholic and Protestant Bibles. I'm less than a quarter of the way through, but have been struck by something.

Even by the fourth verse of the first short chapter, it's clear that we're not going to get through life without trials and foes and sometimes finding ourselves surrounded by wicked people. And it seems the more Godly we become, the more foes may endeavor to attack us. I guess I was a little taken aback, as I've not read Psalms from beginning to end for years, and I was thinking it was all going to be inspiring, loving, and soothing. By the second Chapter, we find notice that the Lord will break the wicked with a rod of iron and dash them into pieces like pottery. (Not recalling singing **that** chorus in a Responsorial Psalm.) However, after every less-inspiring, not-so-loving, and non-soothing verse, there are soothing words, such as: *"But you, Lord, are a shield around me, my glory, the One who lifts my head high."* *"Blessed are all who take refuge in him."* *"But whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on his law day and night -- that person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither- whatever they do prospers."* *"In peace I will lie down and sleep, for you alone, Lord, make me dwell in safety."* *"But let all who take refuge in you be glad; let them ever sing for joy."*

Being a Christian doesn't mean evil and bad things can't or won't occur in our lives. It simply means that we have a rock to cling to when they occur. Which reminds me -- I'm seeing the Lord referred to as a rock a lot in the Psalms. I like thinking of Him as my rock. I still have a hard time imagining how non-believers get through life, even on the best of days -- let alone in the worst of times -- without a rock to cling to.

As we enter into 2021, let's continue to support one another with love and prayers, and to grow nearer and to hold tighter to our faith and our rock.
