

In today's digital world, do we really need to be face-to-face with a priest to confess our sins? Would FaceTime or Zoom ever be allowed?

The question of whether or not Catholics can celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation virtually (via social media, by phone, or in some other way) is a question that has actually been around for several years. The recent COVID-19 pandemic brought the question back in a new way, especially as many parishes were forced to introduce a sort of "social distanced" confession, with the sacrament being celebrated outdoors.

In reflecting on this question, however, there are a couple points that we want to keep in mind. First, as the Code of Canon Law observes in different places, the faithful have a right to the sacraments of the Church and the Church's ministers have a responsibility to make them accessible. At the same time, however, we always have to be sure that we respect the nature of the sacraments themselves.

Although modern forms of technology and communication can help us in our work of evangelization catechesis, the Pontifical Council for Social Communication has reminded us that, "Virtual reality is no substitute for the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, the sacramental reality of the other sacraments, and shared worship in a flesh and blood human community. There are no sacraments on the internet" (The Church and the Internet, no. 9).

Although our encounters with others on the internet and via social media can be considered "real" in one sense, in the sacraments we encounter Christ in a personal and ecclesial way. It is never just a private experience but is always grounded in the life of the Church and this means that it must truly be personal, including the contact between the confessor and the penitent. While the convenience or ease of online celebrations might be appealing for many reasons, at heart, we always want to keep in mind the fullness of the Church's tradition and the meaning of the sacraments. ©LPi



This week's message from Fr. Dave....

What a great week we have ahead of ourselves. Tomorrow we begin our Consecration to St. Joseph. Hopefully, you have the book and have been reading the e-mails from Taylor, our Youth Minister. Each day we will be doing some reading and praying for the next thirty-three days until March 19th, which is the Feast Day of St. Joseph. The following Sunday, March 21st we will have some prayers after the 11AM Mass. Our hope is to gather around the statue of St. Joseph on the parish grounds (near the exit drive). If the weather cooperates, we will be outside, if not we will do the prayers at the end of Mass in the church. We will also have opportunities for people to come on Zoom at different times during the week to share your thoughts on the Consecration and to reflect on what you have been reading. We will post the Zoom times for you through e-mail.

Ash Wednesday is this week on February 17th. As we have announced at Masses the past two weekends, we will distribute ashes by placing them on top of the head of each person. This sounds strange to us in the western church, but it is the practice in many countries throughout the world. We are distributing ashes this way so that we do not touch anyone. You always have the option not to receive the ashes. I hope you will understand and please know this will not become our regular practice. We are doing this due to the virus and pandemic.

Lent begins and many will try to apply their Lenten practices over the course of the next six weeks. I hope you have considered what you will do for Lent and that it brings a challenge and growth to your spiritual life. Many have told me just to be patient with those whom they have closely lived with over the past year of the pandemic will be their Lenten practice. Others are using the Consecration to St. Joseph to guide them through their Lenten journey. And I have heard others tell me giving up some food, and reducing time spent on social media or in front of screens will be their practice for Lent. Whatever we choose to do, I hope it makes us more empathetic towards others and more conscious of our need for God.

Today's gospel brings us back to the famous healing of the leper. Jesus has no hesitation to bring new life to this man who is suffering. We cannot say strong enough that the healing restores the man's health and his relationships with society and his own family. He will no longer be considered an outsider or social outcast. The

power of this healing also gives rise to Jesus' identity. Once the leper leaves Jesus, even against Jesus' sound advice, the man cannot help but share his story of healing with others. "He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly."

We also know Jesus is aware of this happening. His reputation is spreading wide and quickly. He was in high demand and would have difficulty finding his "own space." As the gospel relates, "He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere." If nothing else, this expresses a desire on the part of many that their lives are incomplete. They come to Jesus because they find he has the most fulfilling offer they have ever encountered. Remember Jesus' first words in Mark's gospel that expresses why he is present and what his ministry is about, "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." Those who clamor for him will discover these words!


All good Christians know this. That is why we pray, offer sacrifice, serve the needy, treat others with respect, show empathy to those who misunderstand us, and even attend worship. By doing this, we become like those who will do anything to clamor for Jesus. I hope this Lent we find ourselves not only searching for Jesus but confidently know he will make a huge difference in our lives.

Next weekend February 20th and 21st is the Annual Catholic Charities Appeal. Catholic Charities is responsible for a large part of our continued outreach to the poor and underprivileged. I hope you consider once again giving to this most worthwhile cause. This past year due to the pandemic our Catholic Charities organization has struggled. Whatever you can do for the diocese is greatly appreciated. Please know I am forever grateful for all the financial support you show to us at Divine Word, the Heart of the Shepherd Campaign for our diocesan seminary, and today for Catholic Charities. Thank you for all you do.

As the week moves forward, I look forward to sharing in the Consecration to St. Joseph beginning Monday, February 15th, and the start of Lent next Sunday, February 21st. Lent is a special time of the year and I pray that you will find it both challenging and faith-filled as we approach Holy Week. Have a great Lent!

"I'll Say a Prayer for You"

Sometimes I find praying is hard. Perhaps I'm not alone. Well, come to think of it, I'm not alone. Three of Jesus' disciples, Peter, James and John, each managed to fall asleep when having been instructed by Jesus to simply "sit here while I pray." They weren't even asked to pray, and they still fell asleep. And this was at the very worst time in Jesus' life – in the Garden of Gethsemane, where his distress was so obvious to them. They not only fell asleep, they fell asleep **three times**, and Jesus had to awaken them the third time as Judas was arriving to betray him.

Finding time to pray can be a challenge, and I've also been known to fall asleep while praying. So I'm trying a few different things.

It's really easy for me to tell someone "I'll say a prayer for you," then fail to do so. And that's so unhelpful, as I know that prayer works. So I'd do best to not imply I'll pray for you if I don't carry it out! Lately I've been trying to say prayers first, then share with people that I prayed for them, rather than to suggest that I plan to pray for them. I just don't want to habitually utter the words "I'll pray for you" only to fail to do so.

I'm also trying less formal, more frequent additions to my prayer life, and to simply do a "shout out" prayer to the Lord from time to time. Like when I feel blessed, or recently when a deer that was about to jump in front of my car from a hillside somehow managed to come to a screeching halt just before doing so. I felt God's protection, and uttered a prayer of thanks. When someone comes to mind that would benefit from prayer, I immediately utter a brief prayer, rather than thinking that I'll remember to pray for them at night. I then try to remember to include them in my "more formal" evening prayers.

Much like focusing my attention on the Mass, enhancing my prayer life is going to take more time and focus. But so many of us benefit from genuine prayer that I'm confident it will prove worth the effort.
