

Why are Catholic and Protestant Bibles different?

Since the earliest days of the Church, Christians used a Greek translation of the

Old Testament known as the Septuagint. This collection of the texts of the Hebrew Scriptures included 46 books. At the time of the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s, the Protestant reformers began to create their own translations of the Bible (into local languages) and some began to question why the Jewish Scriptures would have included texts that were written in Greek, because, they assumed, the only valid Jewish Scriptures would have been written in Hebrew. And so, they decided to remove seven books from the Old Testament: Baruch, Sirach, 1 and 2 Maccabees, Tobit, Judith and Wisdom (as well as portions of the Books of Daniel and Esther). This means that the Protestant Old Testament only includes 39 books, while Catholic Bibles continue to include those original 46 books. Both Catholic and Protestant Bibles include 27 books and letters in the New Testament. ©LPi



This week's message from Fr. Dave....



The words of the bishops in the state of Ohio come with great joy, but also with some with concern. As we received the word that the dispensation from the

obligation to attend Sunday Mass has been lifted, we know that life is returning closer to "normal." Starting the weekend of June 4th and 5th, we will no longer have to wear masks and we can take the ropes off the pews in the church.

As was the case when we first heard these restrictions would be in place in March of 2020, many felt these were too restrictive and others who thought more restrictions should be in place. Several people have already said the lifting of the restrictions is coming too early. We will leave the section in the west side of the church closest to the chairs with the ropes still in place where people can be distanced from each other. If you still want to wear a mask that is fine.

I, for one, who has been full vaccinated, yet still with some caution from my doctors because of my cancer, have been looking forward to the day we can put these restrictions behind us. I will still be cautious in my life, but I know many of us want some normalcy back to our existence. If anyone has any concerns, please let me know!

We will be placing the music books back in the pews and I hope that many will join in the singing. You must thank Becky, our music minister, for the hard work of providing music through the last fifteen months. We will also begin Mass with our procession in and we will return the Sign of Peace to it rightful place before Communion. If you are still hesitant about the Sign of Peace, you need not shake hands, but a bow or acknowledgement of your neighbor is sufficient.

As we begin the transition of coming out of the pandemic, I hope we can reflect on how this last year has impacted our faith. It was a crazy and at times difficult year for many. I think of all the people who have struggled with illnesses that did not have the comfort of family. I reflect on the people who have stayed home and students not gathering at their schools. However the last fifteen months has affected you, I hope it causes us to move deeper into our faith and to see the comforting hand of God's presence with all of us.

Today is that powerful moment in the life of the Church when the Holy Spirit descends upon the apostles. This Pentecost is where the Church still finds itself. As we await the return of Christ, the Holy Spirit has filled the void. I am one never to underestimate the working of the Holy Spirit in the life of the world. Where I go wrong is I don't have my eyes opened enough to perceptively see how the Holy Spirit is working. My eyes opening can come rather often at times when I least expect it, and then I wonder where I went wrong. And upon reflection I realize that very often God's ways are not my ways. He works as he wills, and not like I expect him to work. The only aspect of this dynamic in my spiritual life is to submit to the working of God as his Holy Spirit continues to influence a world in need. I wonder if this is how it all worked out for the disciples commissioned to further the mission of Christ?

Are you interested in learning a little more about Mass (Liturgy)? I will be offering, on the five Wednesdays of June (June 2nd, 9th, 16th, 23rd, and 30th), an exploration into the different parts of the Mass. I am going to also examine a comparison between the experience of Sunday Mass and the weekday Masses we celebrate. I will be doing this in Hanson Hall with all restrictions in place and to offer Zoom for anyone who might feel uncomfortable with gathering on these Wednesdays of June from 9:15-10:30AM. Call me if you have any questions. We will have a sign-up in the Gathering Area or call the parish office to let us know if you will attend in person or will be on Zoom.

Our first monthly support group meeting for widows and widowers will be Tuesday, May 25th at 7PM in Hanson Hall. Anyone who has lost a spouse is welcome to attend. Come and share your story and life and provide healing for others. Call the parish office for more information.

Every third Monday evening of the month we have a gathering of our Cancer Support Group. This group has been together for over two years. This past week three new people joined us due to a diagnosis of cancer. We don't have a set agenda but try to be supportive of each other through listening and responding to where each person might be in their lives. We also have several persons who have lost their spouse to cancer. We grow through their life without their spouse and offer them our support and care. If you would like to join us do not hesitate to call me at the parish office.

Continue to pray for our parish, our families, our Kirtland community, our diocese, our nation, and our world as we strive to move out of the pandemic in a good way. I pray that we can transition in this time to remember what is important to us. I pray that we see many people over the summer months that we have not seen since the beginning of the pandemic. I pray that you once again feel comfortable in our church. The precious and powerful gift of the Eucharist is our greatest connect to Christ. Have a great week as we celebrate Pentecost!
