

So a friend of mine asked me if I had met the new Bishop, Michael Fisher, and what I thought of him. I have not and I'm hoping for the best.

When I asked her what she thought, she was decidedly low-key. If I was not talking on the telephone to her I suppose I would have seen her shrug her shoulders as a kind of "no big deal" response. And she said as much.

I guess she does not have high expectations because of what the past has brought the Buffalo Diocese. But we need to balance out the fact that it has not all been bad!

The main lesson many of us have taken away from the failure of the institutional church in Buffalo over the last half-century is that, in many ways, we have to rely on ourselves rather than the Diocese which has mishandled financial and spiritual resources and covered up the sexual exploitation and abuse of children.

What we could really benefit from would be a "blue-collar" bishop. Perhaps Bishop Mike will be such a shepherd.

The fact that he was appointed a bishop by Pope Francis and has worked with Cardinal Archbishop Wilton Gregory are very positive. He is a CPA and, prior to his seminary studies, he worked in the Finance Department of a Psychiatric Facility. So that qualifies him to be bishop of the Diocese of Buffalo & WNY.

If anything, I would ask you to pray for Bishop Mike, that God will give him the strength and guidance to be a great bishop for us. And pray for Vocations to the Priesthood in the Diocese of Buffalo.

While we have had many good, holy and hard-working Vocations Directors, there have been other elements at work which have undermined many of their efforts. Consequently, from the time of Bishop Mansell until now, the Buffalo Diocese has put many of its resources towards acquiring international priests rather than cultivating local vocations from our own area. Pray for Vocations!

On Friday, January 15, Bishop Fisher will be installed at 2pm at St. Joseph's Cathedral. It will be broadcast live on WKBW TV Ch 7. I will be joining the anchors to provide commentary for the Mass.

Thank you again for your kindness and generosity to me personally at the Parish and thanks to those committed parishioners who made our celebrations joyful and beautiful!

Pope at Angelus: Let Christ's light shine in love for one another

Pope Francis prays the Angelus on the Solemnity of the Epiphany, and invites us to proclaim the Gospel by allowing God's light of love to shine for others to see.

As the Church marks the feast of the Epiphany on Wednesday, Pope Francis joined Catholics around the world in praying the Angelus in live-streaming. Standing in the library of the Apostolic Palace, the Pope reflected on the light which the liturgical feast brings to our world.

He said Epiphany celebrates the same mystery as Christmas—the birth of Christ—but from the perspective of light and the manifestation of the Lord to all peoples. That light, the Pope noted, should be “welcomed in faith and the light to bring to others in charity, through witness, in the proclamation of the Gospel.”

Light in darkness

Reflecting on Isaiah's vision (60:1-6), Pope Francis said the prophet's description of his time is more relevant than ever: “darkness covers the earth, and thick darkness the peoples.”

In such obscurity, the prophet Isaiah announced the coming of “the light given by God to Jerusalem and destined to shine on the path of all the peoples.”

The Pope said this attractive vision invites hope, and reminds us that God's light overcomes all shadow of darkness.

Star on the horizon

Turning to Matthew's telling of the Magi adoring Jesus (Mt 2:1-12), Pope Francis pointed out that the light foreseen by Isaiah was the Babe of Bethlehem, even if not everyone accepted His kingship.

“He is the star who appeared on the horizon, the awaited Messiah, the One through whom God would inaugurate His kingdom of love, of justice and of peace,” said the Pope. “He was born not only for some, but for all men and women, for all peoples.”

Shining through us

But how, asked Pope Francis, does Christ's light come to shine everywhere and on everyone? “Through the proclamation of the Gospel,” he said.

God, he added, used this same “method” to come to us. In the Incarnation, God draws near to the other and assumes “the reality of the other.”

“The star is Christ,” he said, “but we too can and must also be the star for our brothers and sisters, as witnesses of the treasures of goodness and infinite mercy that the Redeemer offers freely to everyone.”


Guided by Christ

Pope Francis then urged everyone to welcome the light of Christ on this Epiphany, and allow ourselves to be guided—like the Magi—and converted by Christ.

“This is the journey of faith, through prayer and the contemplation of God's works, which continually fill us with every new joy and wonder.”

Youth Ministry Reflection: the Many Times Spent

I recently had to go out to run a few errands. Driving past our church on my way to the Post Office I passed a man walking the opposite way down South Abbott. I completed my few errands in about 45 minutes and headed home. When I turned back onto S. Abbott, about 100 yards past the corner, I passed the same man walking back on the other side of the road this time. As I passed him a second time, I thought about the different ways we choose to spend the time we have. There was a slight pang of jealousy that I would rather have spent my time outside than going to do a few things on a day off from work at the parish.

But as I thought about it more, I recognized that the Lord had me where he needed me. There are an infinite number of things you and I could do with the time we have, but there are probably only a few or even one best thing that we can do right now. The difficulty I find is recognizing the situation of life that I am in right now, and what the Lord wants of me right there.

I know the Lord has called me to be a husband and a father, and to work at Saint Bernadette's, so when I have obligations to those vocations, that is usually the right thing! But then there are all those "down times" or gaps in my schedule where time is just floating. The one extreme would say that I must be using all of that time to pray and become holy, and the other would say take a break, but it would really mean veg out on the couch and browse the internet with all my free time. But most of us I think are called to something in the middle. We are called to holiness, and so we must use our time to grow in relationship with God through prayer and the Word and Sacraments. But we also must take care of ourselves physically, mentally and emotionally, so rest and recreation are of great importance. All of these things can and should be approached in love.

Anytime you and I compare the way we use our time with the way others do, it is usually from a place of insecurity or jealousy. Let us allow the Lord to grow confidence and courage within us, so that we may spend our time well, looking at the call(s) the Lord has given to us, and the people He has placed in our midst. Let us seek to do all things for the Lord and be thankful for all that He has given us, even the errands.



 - * Support a co-op, or a local or family-owned business
 - * Choose stores or services in your community that support local groups.
 - * Volunteer for a group that assists low-income people.
 - * Donate to the general fund of Catholic Campaign for Human Development.
 - * Hunger is a year-round issue, and forces families to choose between food and other expenses. Donate goods to pantries.
 - * Assist low-income students to find college funding, through sources in your community.
 - * Call the organizations or agencies in your area for a list of their most wanted items. Distribute the list to family and friends to join the effort.
 - * Choose your words wisely-making generalizations about people who are living in poverty works against people who are trying to get back on their feet. Instead, talk with people who are struggling and listen to their stories.
 - * Work is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. Be respectful of people's occupation and considerate of all types of workers we encounter every day.
 - * Get involved at the USCCB Action Center


