Parish Outreach Ministry. A number of years ago, with Fr. Joe's approval, members of the Events Committee formed a sub-committee whose responsibility is to organize personal care items donated by our parishioners and to then deliver these items to various agencies.



The agencies we have supported include Catholic Charities, St. Girard's Place, St. Gianna's Outreach Center, Response to Love, St. Luke's Mission of Mercy, and the Veteran's Hospital. Program coordinators from these agencies have overwhelmingly expressed their gratitude for your generosity and have, over the years, sent notes expressing how much they and their clients appreciate our efforts.

Suggested adult items include body soap and lotion, toothbrushes and toothpaste, deodorant, shaving cream and razors, feminine hygiene items, hairbrushes and combs, Q-tips, and small tissue packs. Children's items such as baby wash, shampoo, lotion, baby wipes, and diapers are suggested for the little ones. It is important that you remember we can accept new, unopened, unused items only. We cannot accept any items that have an expiration date that has passed.

We are seeking help with this important ministry, especially one or two adults to head up our efforts.

We are truly grateful to those who have given in the past and to those who have continued to donate during the pandemic. PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT, On February 28, 2020, The Diocese of Buffalo N.Y., ("Diocese") filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the "Bankruptcy Code").

The Bankruptcy Court has established August 14, 2021 at 11:59 p.m. (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the "Bar Date").

If you have a claim against the Diocese, including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date.

A FEW WORDS FROM YOUR PASTOR

When I was in college seminary at Wadhams Hall in Ogdensburg, NY, I worked one of those years at a hospital in nearby Watertown, NY. The supervisor of the pastoral care program there wanted us to learn how to exactly repeat the conversations that took place as we made our rounds of patients. This was about five years before I was a priest. I think that the point of that was to help us learn how to listen more deeply to others. I don't know about you, but I am finding that the older I become, the more precisely I remember stories that my parents and grandparents told me long ago...

One such story I heard from my stepfather, who was from a small town east of Rome, Italy. He said that on a nearby farm there was a tiny stone chapel, which had not been used in many years. So, we might say that it had been abandoned. But the story that I can still hear him re-telling was how a donkey, when walking through that field, would stop when passing by that small chapel, and temporarily kneel, facing the chapel. No amount of coaxing could stop that donkey from repeating this routine each time it passed that chapel. My stepfather's conviction was that that donkey, that mere beast of burden, was somehow aware that at one time, in that small chapel, the Eucharist had been celebrated on the tiny altar within the chapel...and that the donkey was genuflecting in adoration.

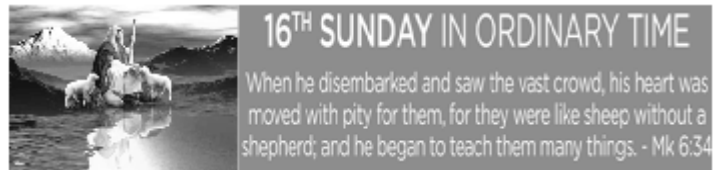
Why do I today remember this story from so long ago? Well, the coronavirus pandemic has perhaps taught each of us many things, not the least of which may include the value of life itself, the preciousness of human community, the unique value of so many activities we had sort of cavalierly assumed would always be available to us. With the re-opening of the economy, many of our habitual activities have now resumed, though not exactly.

While grocery stores never stopped being frequented, and while restaurants have now become full once again (I recently travelled with a friend to five different places until we found one with a table available), churches are nowhere near where we were before the pandemic began. Certainly, those with underlying medical conditions are always excused. Yet, a complete stranger approached me recently to tell me how accustomed she has become to simply watching Mass online. I wonder if I as a priest, or if we as a Church throughout the country, have somehow failed to appreciate and communicate the Real Presence of Jesus in Eucharist? How did it come to this, that watching Mass on a computer screen would be preferable to actively participating in the Mass as a community of believers? Did we somehow fail to invite one another into the mystery of Emmanuel – “God is with us” – at each and every Eucharist?

Simply put, how is it that a mere donkey, a beast of burden, would mysteriously kneel before an altar where Eucharist had been celebrated years before, while so many people – the crown jewel of God's creation – seem to have no memory of being in church before the pandemic began? How do we continue to invite our families and friends back?
