## GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

July 11, 2021

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the "road less traveled." Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, is not always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take.



Today is the feast of our Holy Father Saint Benedict! In celebration of his life and ministry we share with you this short synopsis of his life. We hope you enjoy it! Happy Feast day! For more than one thousand five hundred years, Benedictine monks have framed all of their lives, all of their being, around a tiny set of guidelines: The Rule of St. Benedict. But where did the Rule come from? Who is St. Benedict? Born in the year 480 to Roman nobles, Benedict of Norcia was raised in a time of upheaval – The Roman empire had fallen and

licentiousness and conflict ruled the day. Disillusioned during his studies, he struck out from Rome entering the wild, seeking solitude.

In his youth, he had already performed miracles. The simple mending of a plate -- a foretelling of greater things to come.

Traveling alone to the east, traversing the Apennine Mountains, he came upon a cave at Subiaco. There, he lived as a hermit sustained only by the secret kindness of the monk, Saint Romanus, who lowered bread by a rope to Benedict's cliffside home.

After battling temptation and the devil for three years in his mountain cave, a group of monks pleaded with him to lead their community. Over time, the monks grew to resent his radical way of life, and sought to dispose of him by poisoning his wine. Upon blessing the wine, the glass shattered and the monks' treachery was revealed. St. Benedict departed again to seek God alone in the wilderness.

As time wore on he sought to share his love of Christ with others, founding twelve monasteries, ultimately settling in Monte Cassino. He began writing a set of principles for his monks to live by, having the knowledge of a life of seeking Christ. thus was born The Rule. At the base of Monte Cassino, St. Benedict's twin sister, St. Scholastica, established the first Benedictine community of women. At the age of 67, St. Benedict was struck with a fever. Knowing his hour was approaching, he summoned monks to pray by his side, and on March 21, 547, St. Benedict died as his brothers raised his arms in one final prayer as he passed from this life.

From this seed, Benedictine monasticism spread throughout Europe. As the Barbarian invasions wreaked havoc, Benedictine monks set about tirelessly deciphering and copying texts, clinging to the Christian call as civilization devolved around them, retaining a culture that would be planted again as the tumultuousness of society began to calm.

Today, St. Benedict is hailed as the father of western monasticism. He is the patron Saint of Europe and of a happy death, and the Holy Father of the Benedictine Order. What would western civilization look like without St. Benedict? It is impossible to say – but for more than one thousand five hundred years monks across the world have carried on his great work forever living his directive, that in all things God may be glorified.

## Faith in Marriage

### Question:

What kind of religious practices should we begin, once we marry, to help us practice our faith each day?

### Answer:

Your spiritual life as a couple is important. The sacrament of Marriage is a gift and a grace, but living it well isn't always easy! It requires intentionality and perseverance. Growing your spiritual life as a couple also requires a plan. Life can be incredibly busy. There's never "enough time" for everything we want to do. But we can live by our priorities. If we don't prioritize prayer, we'll find it slowly disappear from our lives.

If you're not already praying individually, that's a good place to start. If your schedules are similar, take some quiet time at the same time to help hold each other accountable. Praying together is also important! You could start by looking at the religious practices of your family and of families around you that you respect. Talk with your spouse about the ones who make the deepest impression on you or were most meaningful when you were young. Think about what you want your future children to experience. Making faith a commitment now will mean it is engrained habit when you grow your family. Ultimately, these faith practices should help us grow in our love for God and for one another.

## EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

### What We Carry from Town to Town

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't.

People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.

### Anointing of the Sick

**Question:**  
If it isn't only for people who are dying, when should someone receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick?

**Answer:**  
One of the unfortunate realities in the Church today is that so few people understand the meaning and value of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, largely because so many people still mistakenly think of this sacrament as "Last Rites" or "Extreme Unction."

In his life and ministry, Jesus healed the sick. In this sacrament, the Church continues the healing mission of Jesus and, in hope, prays that God will grant healing to the person who is suffering. But even if there is no physical healing, the sacrament offers spiritual healing through the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. And so, anyone who is living with serious illness (including emotional or psychological illness) and the elderly are encouraged to celebrate this sacrament when it is needed.

The ritual for Anointing of the Sick does also include special prayers and blessings for those who are facing death, including viaticum (communion given to the dying, trusting that the Lord Jesus will be their companion along the way, as they make their final journey).

### St. Peter Parish Prayer Group



Our intent is to pray as a group (in Church or in our homes) at the same time every week. Monday's will be the day set aside for our group. There will be two times to accommodate everyone. We will pray as a group following the 7:45am morning mass and again at 7:00pm at our St. Peter Worship Site. **LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION:** Gladly given to registered parishioners (at least three months) who have received the Sacraments of Initiation, practice their faith regularly, and support the parish.


