ANOINTING: Communal anointing offered twice a year, any time by appointment.


CÓMMUNION TO THE SICK: By appointment with a priest. Frequent Spiritual Communion is strongly encouraged.

- 2) If married, marriage must be recognized by the Catholic Church.
- 3) Attend Mass and receive communion regularly.
- 4) Be an active parishioner for at least the past three months. NOTE: An active parishioner is one who is enrolled on the parish census files and supports the Sunday offertory.

Ponderings & Pontifications of the Pastor

Hello dear friends, and a very Happy New Year to you all!

Beginning this new year of 2022, we find ourselves in the midst of the Christmas season, which is actually pretty short this year. On Sunday, January 9th, we celebrate the **Baptism of the Lord**, and then we return to the season of Ordinary Time. However, we still have a number of very special liturgical days to commemorate before that day.

First of all, on January 1st, not only do we ring in the New Year, but we take the first day of a brand-new year and dedicate it to the most Blessed Virgin Mary. The title of Our Lady that we commercate on January 1st is the first and most important title of Mary...**Mother of God**. In theological terms, we honor Mary under her Greek title of **Theotokos** (which means "God-bearer") and the Latin equivalent translation, **Sancta Dei Genitrix**, which means roughly the same thing. This title of Mary was solemnly declared and defined at the Council of Ephesus in 431 AD, after great controversy arose in the early church about the two natures of Christ (fully human and fully divine). What the church teaches about the Blessed Virgin Mary.

On Saturday evening (January 1st) and Sunday (January 2nd), the **Feast of the Epiphany** is commemorated. This feast day usually falls on January 6th and brings to a close the 12 days of Christmas. However, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has often moved the Feast of the Epiphany from a weekday to the nearest Sunday, so that people will celebrate the feast within the context of the weekend Mass.

The feast of the Epiphany of the Lord actually commemorates 3 distinct events in the earthly life of Jesus. First (and for us in the West, we tend to focus on this one the most), the Epiphany heralds the arrival of the **magi** and their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. This day has also become known as "Little Christmas" in some cultures. Second, the Epiphany also focuses on the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan (even though that event is also commemorated later, on the following Sunday). Third and finally, the Feast of the Epiphany commemorates the first miracle of the Lord, namely, the changing of the water into wine during the wedding feast at Cana. In the East (both Catholic and Orthodox) the Epiphany focuses on these 3 events; however, they tend to emphasize the baptism of Jesus much more.

One of the ancient customs of the church was to solemnly announce the dates of the major feast days for the coming liturgical year. This custom was always traditionally carried out on the Feast of the Epiphany, being chanted by a priest or deacon, as part of the Mass. Here are the words of the solemn **Epiphany Proclamation**.

Know, dear brothers and sisters, that, as we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, so by leave of God's mercy, we announce to you also the joy of His Resurrection, who is our Savior. On the <u>2nd day of March</u> will fall <u>Ash Wednesday</u>, and the beginning of the fast of the most sacred Lenten season. On the <u>17th day of April</u>, you will celebrate with joy <u>Easter Day</u>, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ. On the <u>26th day of May</u> will be the <u>Ascension</u> of our Lord Jesus Christ. On the <u>5th day of June</u>, the feast of <u>Pentecost</u>. On the <u>19th day of June</u>, the feast of the <u>Most</u> <u>Holy Body and Blood of Christ</u>. On the <u>27th day of November</u>, the <u>First Sunday of the Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ</u>, to whom is honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen! Masks are Required! Daily Mass is at 8:00 am. Eucharistic Adoration begins on Wednesday at 8:30 am through Thursday at 9:00 pm

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. (Is 60:1)


Psalm:

"Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage."






The Church extends itself on Epiphany to the homes of the faithful. The Custom of blessing the home probably grew up on account of the words in the Gospel,

"And entering into the house, they found the Child with Mary, His Mother, and falling down they adored Him."

The father or eldest of the family blesses the house. He leads the family (and any other guests who may have been invited for the occasion) from room to room, blessing each and inscribing the three Magi (Casper, Melchior and Balthasar) above the doors with chalk. The doors of at least the main entrance are inscribed with the following:

20 + C + M + B + 22

The initials are separated by crosses and the year above the door. The initials CMB also stand for the words "*Christus Mansionem Benedicat*" which means "May Christ bless this house". The inscription above the entry of our house should be a reminder to us that we should be with and go to Christ in all our comings and goings.



The Epiphany of the Lord

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.
