A Godparent in the Catholic tradition is someone who participates at Liturgy regularly, has been Confirmed, and lives a life in accord with the Catholic Church. All prospective Godparents must receive a letter of approval from their pastor.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS: Is the Holy Spirit calling you to become Catholic? Call the Parish Office for more information.


CARE OF THE SICK: Anyone seriously ill or entering the hospital in anticipation of surgery may receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Please contact the parish office to make arrangements.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY: Best wishes! Couples seeking a Catholic marriage, please contact the Pastor at least six months prior to a planned wedding day. Attendance at a marriage preparation program (Pre-Cana) is required.

EUCCHARIST TO THE SICK AND SHUT-INS: If ill or shut-in, please call the parish office if you wish that the Blessed Sacrament be brought to you.

JOINING OUR PARISH: New members and families are warmly welcomed. Contact the parish office to register, and please introduce yourself to the pastor when you join us for Liturgy. Know that you are always welcome and we are blessed to have your presence.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION: One of the great ways to live out our call as disciples is to help others grow in the faith. Being asked to serve as a Godparent or Sponsor for Confirmation is a great honor and responsibility. As we raise our children in the tradition of the Church, it is our duty to set a good example for them. Prospective Godparents and Sponsors are to be individuals who regularly participates at Liturgy and have been Confirmed. For those who are married, their marriage must be validly recognized by the Catholic Church. For those who have children, their children must be enrolled in Faith Formation at St. Pius X Parish. Grace and Peace of Our Lord Jesus Christ...

"Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you."



Today's second reading is from the Letter of St. James. We will be journeying with James' Epistle for the next five weeks of Ordinary Time. Some have likened his Letter to the Old Testament's wisdom literature. It is considered a "universal letter" written to the entire early church instead of to a specific community or person. It provides insight to help us in our daily lives of discipleship. Today's reading begins by reminding us of the gracious God who supplies us with "every perfect gift" and in whom there is "no alteration or shadow caused by change."

Knowing the constancy and generosity of God, our gift-giver, we are invited to "humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you." James' metaphor to gardening is apt for the spiritual life. Some of our annual plants in our gardens have already seen better days. To flourish as Christians, we need to nourish and protect the seed of faith that we have received. Yet, this is not all. James continues by invoking us to "be doers" of the word and "not hearers only."

St. Francis of Assisi is famous for stating, "Preach the gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words." While our call to evangelization definitely requires the use of words, this quote – and James' injunction – reminds us that our words mean nothing if they are not supported and lived out by our action. It is not enough to hear the words of God. We must allow these words to become fully rooted within us; when we do, our whole life changes. We become more loving, more giving, humble, more Christ-like. This week let us consider: How do we receive the word of God as the greatest gift in our lives? And after receiving this gift: How do we strive to enact these words in all that we do and speak?

"Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you." If you haven't already begun to allow God's word to touch your life, let me, make a simple suggestion. Take the gospel for next Sunday and sit with for a few minutes each day until you hear it opened for you in liturgy. Take that word and plant it deep inside of you so that it may bear fruit in your life beyond our expectations.

Then, following the reception of Holy Communion, we will call you forward to receive the pyx before praying over you as a community so you can immediately take the Blessed Sacrament to the ill members of our community.

"From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit,

licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly.

All these evils come from within and they defile."
