We are called to use these talents to respond to the needs of others through prayer, action, outreach, hospitality and stewardship. Guided by the Holy Spirit and nourished by the Eucharist, we share our faith by personal witness to the Gospel through acts of charity, justice, mercy and forgiveness.

BAPTISMS: Congratulations! A new child is a blessing! Parents, please call the office four months prior to the anticipated birth of the child to schedule a Baptismal class to learn more about this most important sacrament. As you prepare to have your child baptized, begin to pray about who would be good and holy Godparents to help your child grow in the faith. A Godparent in the Catholic tradition is someone who participates at Liturgy regularly, has been Confirmed, and lives a life in accord with the Catholic Church. All prospective Godparents must receive a letter of approval from their pastor.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS: Is the Holy Spirit calling you to become Catholic? Call the Parish Office for more information.

CARE OF THE SICK: Anyone seriously ill or entering the hospital in anticipation of surgery may receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Please contact the parish office to make arrangements.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY: Best wishes! Couples seeking a Catholic marriage, please contact the Pastor at least six months prior to a planned wedding day. Attendance at a marriage preparation program (Pre-Cana) is required.

EUCCHARIST TO THE SICK AND SHUT-INS: If ill or shut-in, please call the parish office if you wish that the Blessed Sacrament be brought to you.

JOINING OUR PARISH: New members and families are warmly welcomed. Contact the parish office to register, and please introduce yourself to the pastor when you join us for Liturgy. Know that you are always welcome and we are blessed to have your presence.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION: One of the great ways to live out our call as disciples is to help others grow in the faith. Being asked to serve as a Godparent or Sponsor for Confirmation is a great honor and responsibility. As we raise our children in the tradition of the Church, it is our duty to set a good example for them. Prospective Godparents and Sponsors are to be individuals who regularly participates at Liturgy and have been Confirmed. For those who are married, their marriage must be validly recognized by the Catholic Church. For those who have children, their children must be enrolled in Faith Formation at St. Pius X Parish. Grace and Peace of Our Lord Jesus Christ...

"And immediately the man's ears were opened."



In 1955, St. Teresa of Calcutta founded the Missionaries of Charity, an order of religious sisters that seek to care for the dying and destitute of the world. In her book *In the Heart of the World*, Mother Teresa describes her spirituality: "Seeking the face of God in everything, everyone, all the time, and his hand in every happening; this is what it means to be contemplative in the heart of the world. Seeing and adoring the presence of Jesus, especially in the lowly appearance of bread, and in the distressing disguise of the poor." So often, it can be difficult for us to recognize Jesus in the people in front of us, especially if their "distressing disguise" is one of poverty or of mental or physical illness. And yet, with these 'poorest of the poor', we find the beloved of God.

In the second reading, St. James urges the early Christian community to examine their habit of treating the rich and poor differently. He accuses them of making "distinctions" based on social class and thus becoming "judges with evil designs." James points to God's habit of choosing "those who are poor in the world" as the ones who are "to be rich in faith and heirs to the kingdom." Throughout salvation history, God invited the vulnerable and powerless to be His greatest collaborators – from David, a lowly shepherd boy, the youngest of seven brothers who becomes the king of Israel, to Mary, a young peasant woman who bears the son of God to the world.

In today's gospel, Jesus heals a deaf man by using the word "Ephphatha" meaning "Be opened!" We might also make this our prayer, that in everything our Lord might open our senses to find and serve Him in all those we meet.

As we approach the end of Summer and the beginning of the Fall season, let's keep our focus upon seeing God in everything, everyone, and all that we do. Let us strive to work together so as to re-immersion from a difficult year and bear fruit that will produce the quality of the kingdom being present in our midst. I look forward to collaborating with all our groups and organizations striving to bring us back to life in living out our mission. Thank you for all that you do for the parish.

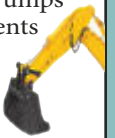
