# Catechetical Corner A Weekly Faith Growing Bulletin Corner

# **Ordinary Time**

Ordinary Time (derived from the word ordinal, meaning "numbered"), refers

to all of those weeks of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. During Ordinary Time, the Church focus on the Mystery of Christ in its fullness. It encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar — the Season following Christmas until the beginning of Lent, and the Season immediately following Easter until the beginning of the Church year, the First Sunday of Advent. The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green. In any given year, there are either 33 or 34 Sundays in Ordinary Time because Easter is a moveable feast. Thus, the Lent and Easter Seasons "float" from year to year, and the number of Sundays in each period of Ordinary Time vary from the other period as well as from year to year.

GOD CLAIMS US

Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. At Baptism, God claims us as His own and provides us with the ASHIS OWN identity and purpose we need to properly live life. It requires our coop-

eration. When we make decisions based on core Gospel truths, we really act as Christ Himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how you live your Baptism. It can be difficult. We need God's mercy and assistance to help us fulfill our life's purpose and make decisions based upon God's wisdom and guidance. He alone is the One who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for Catholic principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Catholicity was popular? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, you have the Lord as your anchor to steady you in the tempests of life. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.

# HOW DOES ONE BECOME A SAINT?

There are four steps for one to be declared a Saint. After a considerate time after an individual has died, the Bishop of that Diocese can open an investigation into the life of the person to see whether they lived their life with sufficient holiness and virtue for Sainthood. If so, the Bishop submits the recommendation to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints for permission to open the case. Once the case is accepted, the individual can be called "A SERVANT OF GOD." If the Congregation for the Causes of Saints approves the case, it is passed to the Pope. If the Pope decides that the person lived a life of "heroic virtue," they can be called "VENERABLE." To reach next stage, beatification, a miracle needs to be attributed to prayers made to the individual after death. After beatification, the individual is given the title "BLESSED." Canonization is the final step in declaring a deceased person a Saint. A second miracle normally needs to be attributed to prayers made to the candidate after they have been beatified. Then the Pope declares that person a "SAINT" at a special canonization ceremony.

# ST, HILARY OF POITIERS (JAN, 13TH)

Raised a pagan, St. Hilary (315-368), converted to Christianity when he met his God of nature in the Scriptures. His wife was still living when he was chosen, against his will, to be the Bishop of Poi-

tiers in France. He was soon taken up with battling what became the scourge of the Fourth Century, Arianism, which denied the divinity of Christ. The heresy spread rapidly, with St. Athanasius being the Lord's mouthpiece for the truth. St. Hilary was banished from France to far off Phrygia, and was ultimately called the "Athanasius of the West." While writing in exile, he was invited by some semi-Arians (hoping for reconciliation) to a Council the Emperor called to counteract the Council of Nicaea. St. Hilary predictably defended the Church, and when he sought public debate with the heretical Bishop who had exiled him, the Arians, dreading the meeting and its outcome, pleaded with the Emperor to send this "troublemaker" home. He was then welcomed by his people.
