Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Below are the second set of questions asked of me by our students for Catholic Schools Week with my responses. Enjoy!

1) Where have you traveled while being a priest?

I have traveled to a lot of places as a priest. I've been to Rome and Ireland. I've also traveled to a lot of places in the United States. I said the wedding Mass for one of my cousins who lives in Hollywood, California. I've visited my uncles who are Benedictine Monks in the state of Oregon; their monastery is called Mount Angel Abbey. I've also visited Florida a few times to visit friends. I have family in Tennessee and also in Pennsylvania, so I've gone there a few times to visit. I am blessed to be able to travel.

2) Did you work very hard to become a priest?

Ultimately God will be the judge of how hard I worked to be a priest; I can tell you that the seminary is a lot of work. A seminary is a school that trains priests. I went to Mt. St. Mary's Seminary of the West in Cincinnati, Ohio. In the seminary we studied a lot of different things. We studied philosophy first, and then studied theology. Philosophy is the study of knowledge; it helps you learn how to think well and how to analyze things. Theology is the study of God. It includes learning about Jesus, the Bible, and the Holy Trinity. Seminary is not only going to class though. We also prayed together every day and went to Mass together every day. I also spent one year at a parish as a seminarian intern before I was ordained a priest. I was blessed to be at St. Thomas Aquinas parish and Good Shepherd parish in the East Side of Toledo.

3) Why can't girls be priests?

When it comes to the Sacraments, the Church must celebrate them in the way in which Jesus intended them to be celebrated. This is because Jesus alone instituted the Sacraments. They weren't created by the Church. Since Jesus is no longer living physically on earth, we must be faithful to what we know of the sacraments from Scripture and from the teachings of the Church. So, for example, we must use wheat bread and grape wine for the celebration of Holy Mass. We can't substitute apple juice for the wine. If we did, it wouldn't be a Mass, because it would not be faithful to how Jesus instituted the Holy Eucharist. Likewise, it is clear that Jesus never chose a woman to be one of His first priests; the Apostles were Jesus' first priests, and they were all men. Likewise, the Apostles never chose women to be priests. In fact, no woman has ever been a priest in the Catholic Church. So, the Church is not free to ordain women priests because Jesus did not include women in the ordained priesthood. Now, this doesn't mean that women are not important in


the Church. You could argue that outside of Jesus Himself, the most important person in the Church is a woman, His Mother Mary. She is absolutely pure, holy, and is the Queen of Heaven. Although she is not a priest, her place is way above us lowly priests. Remember that God will not judge our souls based upon whether we were priests or not but upon the holiness of our lives.

4) Why are priests called priests?

A priest is someone who offers a sacrifice. In the Old Testament, there were priests who served in the Temple in Jerusalem and they offered the sacrifices of lambs brought to the Temple by observant Israelites. Other religions also had priests who offered sacrifices. The priest, then is basically someone who is designated by their religion to offer sacrifices. A Catholic priest is a priest of Jesus Christ. We offer Jesus at the altar during every Mass. This offering is possible because Jesus works through us in a very special way at the altar. Our ordination to the priesthood (when we are made priests by the bishop) makes it possible for Jesus to work through us in this special way. Once a priest is ordained by the bishop, he is a priest forever. A permanent change occurs in his soul. So, when he dies, he will still be a priest in heaven (God-willing). The same kind of change happens at baptism and at confirmation. These sacraments impart a permanent change in the soul of the individual. Catholic priests are called "priests" because we offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, which is the sacrifice of Jesus.

5) Who is your favorite Saint and who was the first Saint you learned about?

My favorite saint and the first saint I learned about are the same person, St. Anthony of Padua. My mom always told me when I was growing up that I was called to be a saint, and told me to pray to St. Anthony, since my first name is Anthony. I got a statue of him for my First Holy Communion from my Godmother and that was very special to me (although my little sister broke that statue, but that's another story (don't worry, I forgave her)). St. Anthony was a Franciscan, so he wears clothes just like St. Francis. He is usually pictured with a Bible because he was a great preacher. He also is pictured with the child Jesus, because someone once saw him in prayer while holding the child Jesus in his arms. My mom always told me to pray to St. Anthony when I lost something, and he always helps me to find what I've lost (try it, it works!). Although St. Anthony is my favorite saint, I have to also make mention of the Blessed Virgin Mary here. She is so special to me and I pray to her every day. I have consecrated my priesthood to her care and she helps me in many ways.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Church, as a voice of the Gospel, proclaims the sacredness of all human life. Everyone created by God is fashioned in God's image and has Divine DNA at the center of their soul. God never leaves what God creates but always remains intimately bound to what he has given form. Everyone has a place and because they have received the gift of Divine Blessing, nobody deserves to feel inferior, unworthy, unwanted, unclean or marginalized. Even the most broken of souls has a place. We, the Body of Christ, have the privilege and responsibility to give voice to the voiceless. The cries of the little one in his or her mother's womb are just as sacred as the cries of one who is homeless and hungry. The migrant deserves our attention as much as the forgotten elderly and even the prisoner, with a heart hardened by anger and resentment, deserves respect and dignity.

The Gospel of Life is often hard to swallow, and we would rather keep those we consider unclean, different or unfixable in a place by themselves. It is hard to see them with us, but they deserve to be. There is far too much violence in this world and the result of that violence is the assault on human life. Many are forced to leave the place they call home in search of safer ground, finding few if any along the way who will help them. How different today's Gospel story would be if Jesus gave in to what was politically correct at that time. The leper would have been turned away and a soul, already beaten down by disease and fear, would have experienced an even deeper wound. Jesus wouldn't have captured much attention from anyone, nor would he have mirrored the Father's compassion and love.

Where do we stand with all of this? Do we at least understand that God's vision is often in conflict with the vision put forth in our world and even the one we advance ourselves? There is no doubt that it is incredibly challenging to find a place for everyone at the table. This challenge is compounded when the systems of operation and structure that are so ingrained in us affirm power and privilege rather than inclusivity and justice. Everything really goes askew when the powerful begin to control who is entitled to wholeness and inclusion, and greed becomes a driving force. Prejudice and entitlement raise their ugly heads and we find ourselves with quite a mess. It's time to admit that things have been a mess for a very long time. The mess needs to be healed, not by erasing it but by allowing God to touch it and make it whole. We need to bring God back to the center of life where God belongs. There are no easy solutions to the world's dilemmas. But, knowing that wholeness, healing, and dignity are worthy pursuits, we can more confidently labor to achieve God's vision. ©LPi





Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund. Growing Minds and Creating Futures with K-8 Tuition Scholarships.

The Northwest Ohio Scholarship Fund (NOSF) provides privately funded scholarships to students from low-income families in grades K-8 to attend a private school such as any Catholic School or for homeschool expenses.

Students can receive up to \$2,000 per year for tuition or \$750 for homeschool expenses. Families must reside in Allen, Crawford, Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Hancock, Henry, Huron, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Putnam, Richland, Sandusky, Seneca, Van Wert, Williams, Wood and Wyandot and are required to pay a minimum of \$500 towards their tuition. (Example: A family of 6 who earns up to \$105,000 will qualify.)

Interested families can find more information about the program and apply online on the NOSF website at www.nosf.org. Once awarded, families can renew their children's scholarship each year if they meet the income eligibility requirements and can also add siblings. 


